

Each year volunteers from the First Baptist Church, in Spearman, go to Matamoros to help with the orphanage. They do such things as building, repairs, and sewing. There are now 7 houses that they help maintain. At the present there are 62 children

Alma Cervantes is originally from Vera Cruz. At 14, she has been at the home for 1 year. Rosa Gonzales, also 14, came to the home at age 2, from Tampico. The two girls, who are best friends, will start to high school this school year in the public school system in Mexico.

Although the girls enjoyed their vacation, they were getting a little homesick. Rosa was a very shy girl. She let Alma do all the talking. Since the girls spoke only Spanish, Diana Cantu came to the Reporter with them to be their interpreter.

Alma, a very vivacious teenager, told me the foods they enjoyed most here were pizza and hamburger. When asked why these foods seemed different in the United States, Alma said, "The mustard here is different

Ever so often I would direct a question to Rosa. She would give me a beautiful smile, look to Alma, and lower her head, her shyness overcoming her.

The girls were allowed to come to Spearman on a limited visiting permit. In January, the pastor of Casa Hogar El Refugio asked Roy Lee, who was helping in Matamoros, if his family would be interested in having a couple of the children vacation at their home in Spearman. After much government "red tape" the two girls were allowed to visit on a one time permit for one month.

Alma looked at me and with much sincerity in her voice said. 'It is so calm and peaceful here. We feel so safe! Even at night we can go for a walk and not be afraid. You can not do this where we live. There are too many

As the girls left, I was so aware of how we take our lives in Spearman for granted. We are well fed, well clothed, and safe. We all need to visit a place less fortunate so we can appreciate how lucky we are to live here. Thanks Alma and Rosa for bringing my attention to this.




