Sheriff R.L. McFarlin of Spearman underwent quadruple bypass surgery at Amarillo's St. Anthony Hospital on Friday, August 4. According to Chief Deputy Gary Evans, he came through the surgery fine and was doing well on Monday.

Sheriff McFarlin complained of feeling ill on Wednesday and went to his doctor in Spearman who sent him to the hospital in Amarillo. He entered the hospital on Thursday and was operated on Friday.

The rodeo is advertised as the World's Largest Non-Pro Rodeo in the country. Some 9,000 people fill the bleachers to watch the top 15 teams with fastest times perform





Each year, it is estimated. approximately two million young children ingest toxic household products. Many youngsters are enticed by the pleasant aromas or bright colorings of such products, and many thousands of these very young boys and girls are injured or killed. As companies more frequently use appealing scents and dyes in common cleaning products, it is becoming increasingly important to protect children from needless injuries.

In response to recent reports, a bill has been introduced in the House, which I have co-sponsored, that would direct the Consumer Product Safety Commission to require the inclusion of denatonium benzoate in certain household, garden and automotive products that are hazardous if ingest-

ed by children. Few parents realize that one of,f the most dangerous, yet one of the most inviting commodities is antifreeze--a sweet-tasting, candycolored liquid that can be lethal in large doses.

Denatatonium benzoate, commonly known as Bitrex, is the world's bitterest flavoring agent


Bluegrass Festival




