While the Association is here they will be donating American flags to the Spearman and Gruver School systems. These flags flew over the U.S. Capitol Building in Washington, D.c.

Relief Disaster President Sent

The House and Senate on Friday (Aug. 4) adopted a conference committee version of U.S. Rep. Bill Sarpalius' disaster-relief bill and sent it to President Bush.

Sarpalius urged the president to sign the bill immediately so agriculture producers who lost crops and rangeland to severe weather can be compensated quickly for

their losses. "Time is of the essence now," said Sarpalius, D-Amarillo. hope the president understands that. Many producers lost their entire crops and have received no

income this year. "Entire economies depend on farmers receiving paychecks for those crops. Local banks, implement and seed dealers, grocery stores -- you name it -- are at risk because of the weather disaster. We need this bill signed quickly to protect the economy of the 13th District and all rural America," he

The conference committee report contains some changes to H.R. 2251, the disaster-relief bill pushed through the House in June by House Agriculture Committee Chairman E (Kika) de la Garza, Sarpalius and numerous other farm-state congressmen. Specifi-

cally, the report: * removes the higher level of payments for farmers who lost 75

percent of their crops. Report language calls for all farmers who lost at least 35 percent of their crop to receive payments equal to 65 percent of the federal target price for their lost crop.

* sets a separate payment system for program farmers who do not have federal crop insurance. Those farmers must lose at least 40 percent of their crops in order to receive disaster-relief payments.

farmers who do not participate in the federal crop reduction program. Most non-program farmers who lose at least 50 percent of their crop will receive 65 percent of the local loan rate for their crop.

* provides payments to ranchers who need water for their

Sarpalius said the changes are "relatively minor." He said the House won the most significant battle, making sure compensation is paid for all types of crops lost to any kind of weather disaster.

The Senate had been bent on restricting the amount of coverage the bill provides, and that could have been an economic disaster,' Sarpalius said. "We got all crops and all weather disasters, and that was the key to bill. We were able to win something big for our ag producers and our ru al economy, and we're very proud of that.'

Sorghum Producers **Elect Directors**

Panhandle Grain sorghum producers are slated to choose two directors to represent them on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB) in an election that is set to conclude September 1. TGSPB is comprised of a 15 member board, elected from five districts, and administers the program of market development, research and education that is funded by the .8 cent per hundredweight sorghum checkoff. Assessments are refundable to the producer upon request.

A total of six directors will be elected from four of the five districts--one in East Texas, one in the Upper Coast region, two in South Texas and the two Panhandle directors. The district not holding elections this year is West

Three men have been nominated for the two Panhandle positions. One director will serve a six year term and the other will sit on the board for two years. The names of the candidates will appear on the ballot in alphabetical order, as follows:

Olan [Jack] Crowl, Morse in Hansford County is currently serving as a TGSPB director and farms 1,500 acres of sorghum. Other farming interests include wheat, corn, popcorn and sunflowers. Crowl is a deacon at First Baptist Church in Morse, a Farm Bureau member and serves on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association Board. He and his wife Ros Marie have two sons.

George G. Reeves, Dalhart, Texas in Dallam County is also a TGSPB director. He has been a sorghum producer for 43 years and has allocated 260 acres to the crop this year. His activities include membership in the Christian Church, the Dalhart Chamber of Commerce and a directorship with the National Grain Sorghum Promotion Federation. He and his wife Elva have two sons.

Troy Sublett, Hereford, Texas in Deaf Smith County has farmed 15 years and has 250 acres devoted to grain sorghum. He has a B.S. in Animal Science from Texas Tech University and is active in Lion's Club, Texas Wheat Producers and the High Plains Water District. Sublett is also a deacon at First Baptist Church in Hereford. He and His wife Susan have two children.

County Commissioner Appointed To Governor's Comn

Governor Bill Clements has announced his selections to 24 regional committees that will review local applications for federal block grants.

"Our 12-member regional Community Development Block Grant Review Committees ensure a strong local voice in the administration of federal funds," Clements said.

Federal block grants typically are used to finance public facilities and provide housing assistance.

The new appointees announced by the governor will serve terms ending Jan. 1 1991.

The regional review committees examine requests for federal Community Block Grant funds appropriated to smaller Texas cities and counties that are not direct recipients of federal money.

The regional recommendations ultimately will be forwarded to the

state Community Development Review Committee for consideration. That panel, in turn, forwards its funding recommendations to the Texas Department of Commerce. The governor has final approval over all federal grants awarded under the program.

The Panhandle region serves 25 counties - Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

Appointees are Jerry Strawn, Carson County commissioner; Don Morrison, Roberts County commissioner; Val Winger, Hansford County commissioner, Meryl Barnett, Borger City councilman; Charlie Purcell, Randall County Judge; and Ray Snead III, Hartley County commissioner.





Got a complaint? When you service, be sure to do it the right developed.

To register a complaint:

*Describe clearly your current problem or complaint. Use facts like dates, costs and problem.

*State exactly what you want the company or agency to do to make things right.

*Print (don't write) your complaint legibly. Better yet, use a typewriter if you have one.

*Use standard paper (81/2 by 11), preferably white. Colored paper often does not photocopy well. Since several people or departments may be involved in handling your complaint, your letter and other documents may be photocopied several times.

*Use a pen with dark ink (blue or black) and medium point so that the letter will be lebigle when

*Include copies (not the originals) of all related documents, purchase receipts, service receipts, past correspondence with service agencies and the manufacturer.

*Date your letters and other documents.

*Provide your daytime telephone number.

*Reread your letter several times before sending. Put yourself in the reader's shoes. Your letter is not a place to vent your anger; only state the facts and what you would like as a resolution to the problem.

*Be polite and remain calm. Customer relations personnel with a company or agency may be instructed not to deal with rude or offensive customers.

*Don't delay providing any additional information that is requested.

*Follow the exact directions for procedures and filling out forms.

*Let the company know immediately of any new developments, such as, the product was repaired complain about a product or or is working, a new problem has

Farm Safety Today

Kids and Farm Safety. . . A Challenging Combination

can seem like a giant playground. However, the dangers facing youngsters growing up on the farm are anything but playful.

One way to begin reducing the alarming number of accidental injuries and deaths to children, according to a Deere & Company safety specialist, is to strictly enforce safety rules around farm equipment.

"One of the most basic rules is 'no riders'," said Dave Schmerse, from the product safety

department at Deere & Company. 'Children often plead for rides, but the operator should never give in to the child's pleading," he advised.

As youngsters become old enough to operate farm equipment, it is important that the child be large enough physically to operate all controls properly, and that they have received complete safety and operating instructions.

We can't keep young people from operating equipment, but we can encourage parents to educate their children before letting them operate the equipment," said Schmerse.

The Deere & Company safety specialist also suggested that before being allowed to operate any

machinery, all young people complete basic tractor and machinery safety courses offered by many schools and extension offices.

The farm work load is significant and youthful energy and strength are often welcome. Before involving children in farm work, parents need to carefully determine the capabilities of the young person and weigh the advantages of their help against the risks involved with their inexperience.

'Children learn good safety habits by watching their parents,' Schmerse said. "Strict enforcement of safety rules around augers, PTO shafts, grinders and harvesting equipment is one way children learn by example from their parents.


