

Hospital Auxiliary Starts Celebration

The Hansford Hospital Auxiliary started its Christmas celebration Monday by sharing dinner at noon and then proceeding to the hospital and manor to put up Christmas decorations. According to Beth Phelps, about 21 members of the Auxiliary met at the Union Church for a carry-in salad luncheon.

After dinner the members went to the hospital and manor to put up and decorate two seven-foot Christmas trees and to place Christmas greenery above and around the doorways. Besides the decorating, the Auxiliary prepared plaques to display the names of people who donate to the Auxiliary's Operation Christmas Greeting Fund.

This is an annual tradition, where people in the community donate the money they would

expect to spend on Christmas cards to the hospital and manor Auxiliary. The money is used to purchase equipment needed by the hospital and manor.

Money donated last year was used to buy five new wheelchairs for the hospital and manor. Some of the money was used to strengthen the hospital's Memorial Fund. This fund is money donated to the hospital that is invested.

According to Albert LaRoche, hospital administrator, the interest the money earns is all he is allowed to use for hospital operations. The donated money is therefore allowed to grow and work until it becomes a sizeable amount of money. This money can then be used to augment the hospital budget, thereby reducing tax dollars needed.

Elections Held At TFB Meeting

FORT WORTH--S.M. True was re-elected president of the Texas Farm Bureau by 1,066 voting delegates at the organization's 56th annual meeting. The Plainview cotton, grain and cattle producer will serve his eighth consecutive one-year term of office.

Following adjournment of the convention, the TFB Board of Directors elected Don Smith of Sulphur Springs as vice president and Gerald Clark of Edna as secretary-treasurer. Smith replaces Bob Turner of Voss as vice

president and Clark succeeds Steven Bearden of Harlingen as secretary-treasurer.

Re-elected by the delegates to the TFB Board of Directors were Aubrey Rasor of Gruver; C.H. Dowdy of Wichita Falls; Smith; Turner; Russ Arnold of Trinity; Bob Stallman of Columbus; and Bearden.

Bill Tullos of San Angelo was elected to fill the unexpired state director term of Jesse Stephens of Lamesa who died earlier this year.

State resolutions adopted by the voting delegates, representing

327,589 member families, become policy for the entire membership to follow during 1990. National recommendations approved here are forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration at the 71st AFBF annual meeting, Jan. 7-11, at Orlando, Fla.

On the Texas front, several policies were adopted concerning the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). One resolution stated the main purpose of TDA should be to promote agriculture

Discoveries Made Near Dam Site

Archeological discoveries at the Palo Duro Reservoir project north of Spearman may have major significance for understanding the survival strategies of prehistoric people in the Southern High Plains region of the U.S., according to Dr. James Bruseth, deputy State Historic Preservation officer for the Texas Historical Commission in Austin.

Results of recent investigations, conducted with heavy equipment and hand tools, has turned up organic-rich prehistoric soils and pond sediments. Study of the biological fossils in the sediments may contribute to our knowledge of climate and environment and how prehistoric man coped with the extremes of the region.

Project archeologist John Peter-

son, of the firm Archaeological Research, Inc., presented the findings to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the THC. The reservoir is being constructed by the Palo Duro River Authority, which employed the firm to survey the site for possible archeological resources that the reservoir project may negatively affect. The THC's Archeological Planning and Review Department currently is monitoring the results of the testing phase of archeological research. All federally permitted construction projects on public land must undergo THC review.

Palo Duro Canyon, which is located in the Texas Panhandle and extends north into Oklahoma, may be the best locale for studying ancient environment and cli-

matic change in the region, according to Bruseth.

"This is a small portion of the U.S. high plains region, but it is pretty much the same all over," he said. The high plains region extends from the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains east to the Great Plains.

The sediments at Palo Duro are loaded with fossil pollen, diatoms, mollusks, and plant remains that can help scientists to piece together the prehistoric environment of the area. The discovery of these remains also may help to settle a dispute between one group of researchers that believes climate forces people to change their lifeways and another group that believes it is not a significant force.

Officers reporting included Mozelle McClellan, president; Mary Te Beest, vice president; Clementine Renner, secretary, who read the minutes from the previous meeting; and Arbeta Nobles who gave the treasurer's report.

Committee members who gave reports were Dolly McWhorter, public education; Jolene Thompson and Clementine Renner reporting on patient services; and crusade reports given by Georgia Holt and Betty Davis. Joy Henderson and Pat Morley reported on the Great American Smokeout. A newspaper article from the ACS main office in Atlanta, Georgia reports that one in 10 American smokers quit at least for Nov. 16, the day of the Great American Smokeout, according to a poll released by the ACS.

The poll of 1,201 men and women ages 18 and over found that 10.5 percent of cigarette smokers did not smoke at all that day and that 25.4 percent said

they cut down on the amount they usually smoke.

Society officials commissioned the Gallup Organization survey, which found that 35.9 percent, or 17.9 million, of the nation's 50 million smokers participated in the smokeout.

Amy Marshall, field representative of District 15E located in Amarillo, gave staff reports and presented Award of Merit Certificates for exceeding the per capita income goal of the Texas Division in the 1989 Crusade to conquer

cancer through research, education and service.

Other business included the next meeting date to be the latter part of March to begin plans for Cancer Crusade month to be held in April.

Local Attorneys Hear Supreme Court Justice

Justice Oscar Mauzy spoke to a crowded meeting of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association on November 16 at the Perryton Club. He discussed two problems facing the judges, attorneys and people of the State of Texas.

The first issue he spoke to was how we select people to be judges. The legal system was not created for the benefit of judges and lawyers but for the benefit of the individual citizen to have his/her disputes resolved. Our legal system should allow the defense of citizen's rights in an orderly and efficient manner. In order to achieve the goals of the legal system, it is necessary to select our judges.

We have a controversy in Texas as to whether judges should be elected by the people or selected by some elite groups or individual. Justice Mauzy spoke in favor of the "accountability" of the judiciary to the people in an elective system, and stated he felt that electing judges was the best way to guarantee the responsiveness of the judge to the people. By way of example, he asked if anyone would allow an elite group or individual to select their town mayor, their county sheriff or their state or national legislators. It is abhorrent to the nature of our democratic form of government to have someone who purports to know better than the citizens who should be their judges, presidents or governors, or legislators.

He noted that in 1988 the Democratic Party ran a referendum on the primary ballot asking the Democrats in Texas if their judges should be elected or appointed. Eighty-six percent of those voting in the Democratic primary favored the continued practice of electing our judges. He said he hoped the Republican party would have a similar referendum during this election year, for he felt that a majority of Republicans also favor electing our judges.

There are problems with the way our judges are elected at present. In a suit filed to challenge the "at large" election of appel-

late judges in a 20 county area near Brownsville, the "at large" system of election was found to be unconstitutional by the Federal Court in Brownsville. That decision indicated the need to create single member districts for appellate judge candidates.

There is a suit affecting the way district judges are elected in the nine big city areas of Texas. Judge Bunton of the Federal District Court in Midland held the "at large" system of electing district judges to be unconstitutional. But no proposed remedy has been made yet.

It is good to note that in both these cases, the courts referred the solution to solving the manner in which judges run for office to the Legislature to cure. Public policy should be made by elected members of the Legislature and not by our judges. At present there are three proposals in the Texas Senate and two proposals in the Texas House of Representatives to set up a single member district plan for electing our judges. It was also noted that the constitutional amendment for the November 1990 election only deals with the appellate court races. However, the Texas Legislature can address this problem at their convenience, inasmuch as the Governor does not have to "open the call" of a special session to consider a Constitutional amendment during a special session in order to come up with a single member district plan.

Another difficulty in electing our judges is the lack of knowledge on the part of the average citizen as to the qualifications of the judicial candidates. However, one beneficial result of the challenge to the "at large" system of selecting judges is that judicial candidates will now run for election in smaller districts so that it will be possible for them to meet more of the voters and speak to more of the voters that they will be representing. This shrinking of the geographic area to be campaigned will also reduce the amount of money needed to finance a campaign, and reduce the advantage held by incumbents. The result should be a fairer, cheaper, more efficient judicial election.

Justice Mauzy also addressed

the recent Edgewood case which declared the manner in which Texas finances its school system to be unconstitutional. This case was the first time in 113 years that the Texas Supreme Court was asked to construe Article 7, Section 3 of the Constitution of 1875. This article provides that it is the duty of the Legislature to provide for a system of general public schools that is efficient in nature. Judge Harley Clark, the trial judge who first ruled on the case,

found that the evidence was largely undisputed that the present system was unconstitutional because it was not "efficient" as defined in the Constitution.

This is a decision not to be made lightly and the Austin Appellate Court reversed the trial court's decision. But the Texas Supreme Court ruled on July 5, 1989 that the present school financing system was unconstitutional in a unanimous decision.

in the state. Another called for TDA's new pesticide board to review pesticide regulations instituted during the past five years and amend or delete those guidelines deemed unworkable.

In other state matters, delegates proposed that the Texas Legislature designate the Texas Water Commission as the lead agency for water and water quality, that a public education program should emphasize that the U.S. has the world's safest food supply, and that all governmental agencies responsible for the maintenance of state-owned lands should use all means available to control the Imported Fire Ant.

On the national level, delegates called for a national farm program that provides efficient producers with a profit during years of normal production, and also controls agricultural production at "reasonable levels" needed for domestic and export markets and to prevent a buildup of excess stocks.

Other recommendations called for major changes in the Federal Crop Insurance program, a two-tier dairy price program, and for scientific facts to be used by lawmakers responsible for setting farm program regulations as a basis for setting environmental restrictions on agriculture.

Many other activities were held during the four-day convention, including naming of the Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher and youth contest winners.

Jerry Brorman, a feed grain, wheat and cattle producer from Hereford (Deaf Smith County), and his wife, Martha, received the 1989 TFB Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher Award. The Smiths will receive one year's free use of a 1990 1/2-ton Ford pickup truck, compliments of Bird-Kultgen Ford Co. of Waco, and will also attend the American Farm Bureau Federation's annual meeting.

The other two finalists were Robert Van Winkle Jr. and his wife, Joyce, of Sulphur Springs (Hopkins County); and Tryne Mengers and his wife, Senecia, of Tynan (Bee County).

The Outstanding County Young

Farmer and Rancher Committee Award winner was the Houston County Farm Bureau. Gary Reynolds, as chairman of the Houston County Farm Bureau YF&R Committee, and his wife, Elizabeth, accepted the award on behalf of the county FB. For winning the award, the Reynolds receive one year's free use of a 1990 half-ton Ford pickup, compliments of Bird-Kultgen Ford Co. of Waco.


