Agriculture's accidental death rate is five times the national average for all injuries, said Thomas D. Valco, ag ricultural engineer for safety and mechani-
zation with the Texas Agricultural
Extension Service.
Valco sid the Texas safety Valco said the Texas safety
picture parallels the national scene. "The summer and fall months typically are the worst for farm A total of 82 fatalities occurred on Texas farms and ranches in 1988, Valco said. Records of fatalities were obtained from
death certificates and newspaper clippings.
"Most fatalities took place as a result of farm/ranch activities, but several deaths were a result of recreational activities such as
hunting, swimming and horseback riding," he said.
Valco said the highest number of fatalities took place in July, with 13 deaths; while September

The age group between 20 and 29 recorded the highest fatalities with 15 deaths. About 47 percent of these were from gunshot wounds.
Next Next highest age category was
between 60 and 69 years, with 12 deaths recorded. This group was followed by those 70 years or older, whth childreaths. under age 10
"Eight child died as a result of farming accidents. Many resulted from youngsters riding on farm tractors that hit a bump causing the child
to fall under the equipment. to fall under the equipment.
Tractors have only one seat, and extra riders should
mitted, Valco said.
He said tractors and associated muachinery were the cause of 28 of
all the recorded fatalities. Forty-
eight percent of the machinery accidents was the result of people being run over by the tractors and equipment. Another 40 percent of
the fatalities occurred from tractor "Simple rollover structures
could have prevented most of could have prevented mos
these deaths,. Valco said these deaths," Valco said.
Fatalities involving firearms were the next most frequent kille
with 14 deaths. Most happene while hunting, being shot by another hunter or mishandling their firearm.
"Many of these victims lived in urban areas. Ranch owners need
to insure that visitors follow safe hunting rules and require them to take firearm safety training,' Valco said.
High frequency accidents High frequency accidents cate-
gories also were fires and explosions with seven fatalities, three
of which occurred during grass fires. Other farm vehicles, including
pick-up trucks and all-terrain pick-up trucks and all-terrain
vehicles, and highway accidents resulted in seven deaths. Three deaths occurred from resulted from drownings, five from being struck by objects, four
from electric current, three from lightning and two from exposure and insect bites.
Valco said it is estimated that with every fataily, there are 100 end 1.000 injuries that require hospitalization. He said that National Farm Safety Week, as well as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas, wil " Safety on the farm and ranch is a concern for everyone. By reviewing these statistics and incorporating safety into your farming activities, accidents
be prevented," Valco said.
