Hansford Manor Expansion Project Underway

Hansford Manor expansion project is moving right along. Above you see the "View from the Terrace" drawing as designed by Cox/Croslin & Associates from Austin. What you are seeing is the south terrace looking into the large day room with fireplace and cathedral ceilings. To the right and left of the day room you can see the two smaller quiet areas. One of the areas will have french doors and can be closed for private visits with family and friends if residents desire.

Other construction will consist of a new and greatly enlarged dining room with doors opening to a large terrace for spring and summer dining as well as cookouts. In the residential section there will be eight suites which are much like large and compatibly equipped hotel suite, there is also a small refrigerator in the rooms. Nine private rooms and eight semi-private rooms, new nurses stations

and support areas complete the expected 2.2 million dollar expansion and renovation project.

At this time a bond issue is tentatively scheduled for December 17, and if passed with a beginning construction date of mid March, 1986 and completion 12 months later. We currently have 30 individuals on our waiting list and it seems to grow every day. There is no question that this expansion is needed and with additional beds it will help to bring the facility into a better financial situation. It is expected that the expansion will generate enough revenue to retire the bond without increasing taxes.

The preliminary drawings are in the administrator's office in the hospital and are available to the public for review and comments. Mr. Dennis Robertson will be glad to answer any questions you might have.

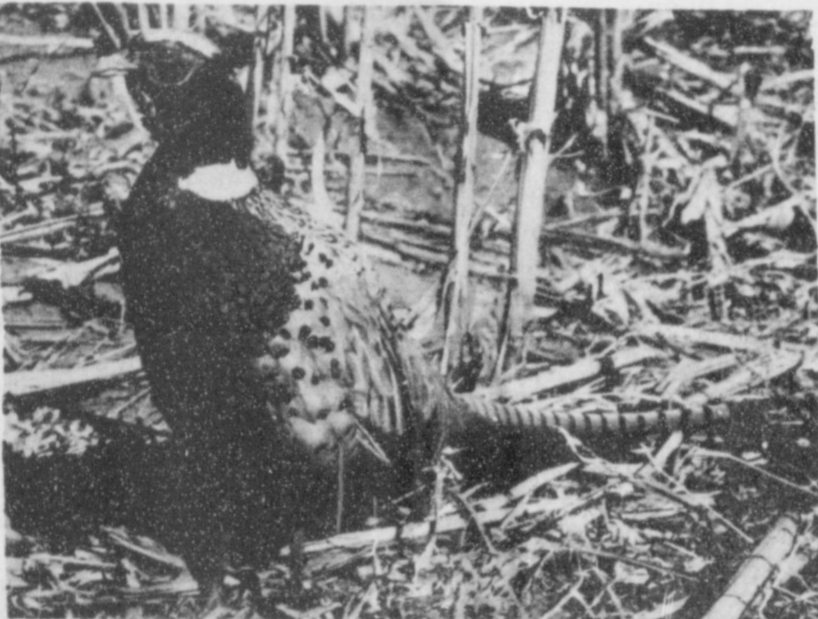

The Pheasants are Coming!!!



Pheasant season will open December 14. Prepare now for an enjoyable hunt by not doing a few things and, simultaneously, protect your soil resource.

Don't burn playas, corn stubble, and grain sorghum stubble. Tall weeds in playas provide excellent winter cover for pheasant. Acre for acre, grain stubble is less suitable winter cover than playa vegetation, but fields of grain stubble contribute many more acres of winter cover throughout the Panhandle.

Don't overgraze playas. Tall, thick, stands of grass and weeds are the qualities that make playas prime winter habitat. Grazing that

reduces the height and thickness of the stand will decrease the value to pheasant.

Don't disk or plow under corn and grain sorghum stubble. Waste grains of corn and grain sorghum are important winter foods for pheasant. Disking or plowing buries most of the grains.

The Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service encourage you to practice good pheasant habitat management. Improving the habitat of the popular game bird will also reduce soil erosion in the Texas Panhandle.

Severe Weather Exercise

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management will hold a severe weather exercise, Twister 11, in Department of Public Safety Region 5 on November 7, 1985.

All city and county jurisdictions have been invited to participate in the three-hour exercise, and to date 33 governments have indicated they will participate, according to Don Freeman, the Division's training officer. The jurisdictions have a choice of participating in the exercise from 9:00 a.m. to noon, or from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., "whichever is more convenient for them," Freeman said.

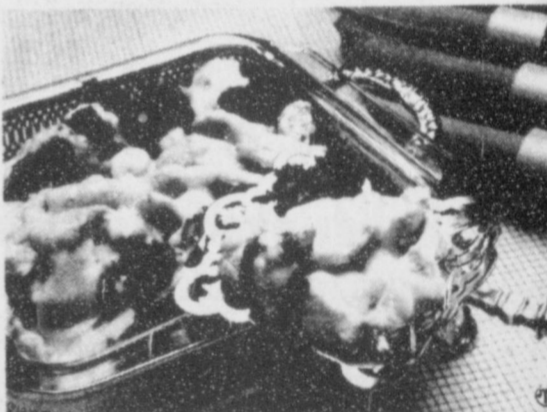
The general scenario call for the

participating governments to deal with the effects of multiple tornadoes and associated severe weather. The cities and counties will be asked to evaluate their emergency management plans for warning and evacuation, and to determine how their community has been affected by the thunderstorms, high winds, and other problems related to such severe weather, Freeman said.

Division staff will conduct the exercise from the Department of Public Safety Emergency Operating Centers in Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls.

Shaking The Salt Habit

LOW-SODIUM CHICKEN DIVAN



If you're one of the four out of ten Americans trying to lower your intake of salt and sodium, you're familiar with the frustrations of trying to make appetizing low-sodium meals. Many of our favorite foods are high in sodium and most frozen or canned prepared main dishes have between 800 to 1400 milligrams sodium per eight ounce or one cup serving. But with a little experimenting and the help of low-sodium flavorings like Seasoned NoSalt salt alternative, good tasting versions of traditional favorites such as Chicken Divan are possible.

CHICKEN DIVAN (Makes 4 Servings)

- 4 ounces Swiss cheese, shredded

Preheat oven to 325°F. Toss Swiss cheese with flour, Seasoned NoSalt and nutmeg. In a small saucepan, bring wine to a boil. Reduce heat and gradually add cheese. Stir over low heat until mixture is thickened. Stir in lemon juice and brandy. In 9-inch pie plate or 9-inch baking pan, arrange broccoli; top with chicken. Spoon cheese mixture over all. If desired, sprinkle with paprika. Bake 15 minutes. Sodium: 153 mg per serving Calories: 272 per serving

Adoption of Water Plan Water

WHEREAS, rapid economic expansion and population growth are taxing the state's existing water resources to their limits; and to meet the current and mid-term needs of the state will require the construction of a least 44 new reservoirs, 200 major wastewater treatment systems and scores of large-scale flood-control projects; and

WHEREAS, city governments, which historically have borne the major part of the responsibility for financing water resource facilities, will be required to carry an even greater share in the future due to reductions in federal aid; and

WHEREAS, the cumulative cost of the water resource facilities that need to be provided between now and the year 2030 could approach \$100 billion -- an amount that far exceeds the ability of local governments to finance without state assistance; and

WHEREAS, the 1985 Texas Legislature approved a new proposed Texas Water Plan that, upon voter adoption, will establish a sound methodology for addressing the state's diverse water problems and

create a major new role for state government in helping finance the solutions to those problems; and

WHEREAS, the new Texas Water Plan will appear on the November 5, 1985 statewide constitutional amendments ballot as Amendments 1 and 2 and, if adopted, would:

(1) Create a \$400 million state fund to guarantee water resource bonds issued by municipal governments, thus saving city taxpayers tens of millions of dollars in interest costs;

(2) Allocate \$400 million in funding for state participation in the cost of oversized capacity of reservoirs and other facilities that exceed immediate local requirements, thus alleviating short-term financial strains on local governments;

(3) Authorize the issuance of \$580 million in state bonds to be used for loans to cities and other local governments, including \$190 million for water supply facilities, \$190 million for water supply facilities, \$190 million for wastewater projects and \$200 million for flood-control facilities; and

(4) Establish a state loan fund to assist farmers with the purchase of water-efficient irrigation equipment, and provide state financing for agricultural water conservation research programs; and

WHEREAS, state legislation that will be implemented upon adoption of Amendments 1 and 2 would enhance the preservation of the state's water resources by establishing safeguards for bays and estuarine areas; providing incentives for water conservation; and by authorizing the creation of voter-approved mechanisms to protect underground water supplies; and

WHEREAS, voter adoption of amendments 1 and 2 is essential to insure the state's future wellbeing and the continued prosperity of Texas cities;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Spearman Chamber of Commerce Inc. of the City of Spearman endorses Amendments No. 1 and 2, and urges their adoption by the citizens of Spearman at the November 5 constitutional amendments election. Adopted this 28th day of October, 1985.

In the commercial private reserve division (less than 100 cases produced), white ribbons went to Fall Creek Vineyards, Tow, for a 1984 Carnelian and La Buena Vida Vineyards, Springtown, for a 1983 Port.

The annual competition is sponsored by Southwest Airlines, the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Grape Growers Association.

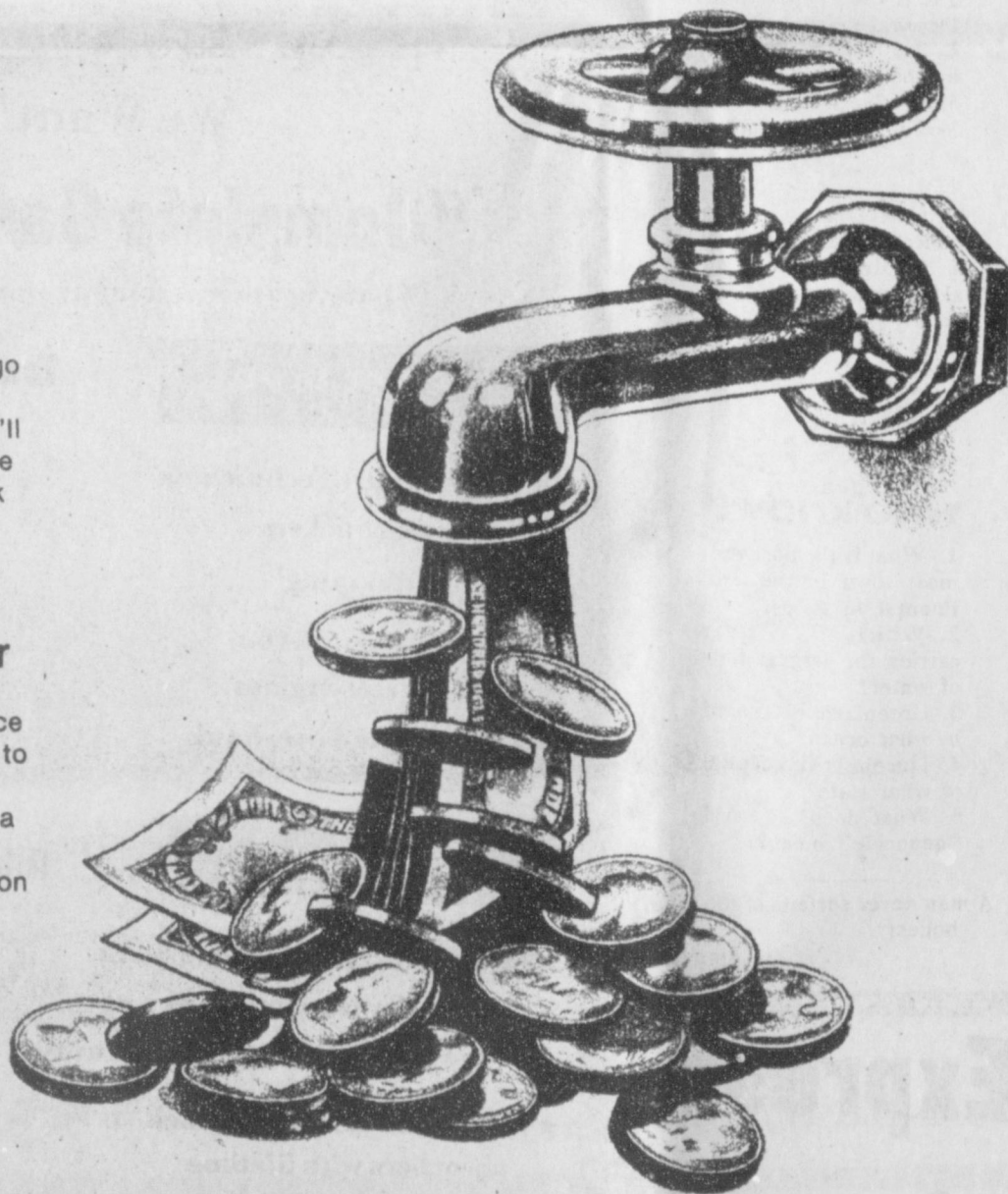

Trick-or-treater's beware

Halloween in most adults' memories seems to have been a safer time 20 or 30 years ago. Childhood recollections of hand-stitched costumes, of giggling goblins ranging through the neighborhood after dark, of benign pranks pulled on tolerant adults who feigned terror while doling out homemade cookies and fruit—all seem like history to those one-time gremlins who now have children of their own.

Was Halloween really safer then? In some ways it was, but according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), today's trick-or-treaters can enjoy a safe Halloween if parents take proper precautions.

Dan Sowards, chief of TDH's Product Safety Division explained, "When we were kids, unless we were personally injured on Halloween, or knew someone who was, we were oblivious to most hazards that were present even then. We were having too much fun.

"The general public didn't wake up to the fact that kids got hurt every year, until only a few years ago when more publicity about accidents, poisonings, and incidents such as people putting needles and razor blades in children's treats got our attention."

Sowards said some simple precautions taken by parents of children who go trick-or-treating would greatly reduce the number of hazards.

First, children should not eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult.

Costumes should be made of brightly colored, fire-resistant material. If a costume is dark, however, it should have some fluorescent or reflective tape on it. Masks should allow clear vision, and hats should be securely attached, he said.

An adult or older child should always go with small children and should carry a flashlight to light the

way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

The children should not enter the home of anyone they do not know, and they should stop only at homes with outside lighting.

Children should stay out of the street, and never run between parked cars. They should not run through yards, or even on sidewalks. All too often, hard-to-see objects are lying in the grass, and slick surfaces can be invisible in poor lighting, Sowards said.

Sowards also has some tips for homeowners who expect trick-or-treaters.

"They should turn on a porch-light, or other outside light, and be sure the lawn is cleared of any objects a trick-or-treater could trip over. And they should keep jack-o-lanterns and candles away from doorsteps and curtains to prevent igniting a costume, or even the house itself," Sowards said.

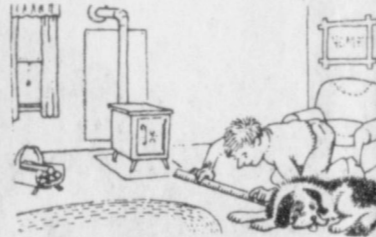

But before you make a selection or start that first fire, consult the Wood Heating Alliance's safety checklist to ensure the safety of your home and your family.



- Choose an appliance that has been safety-tested by a recognized, listed authority
- Check fire and building codes for recommended installation procedures and clearance standards
- Follow all manufacturer's instructions and clearance requirements exactly.
- Use the correct materials to vent your appliance. (Woodstoves and factory-built fireplaces require Class A, All-Fuel Chimneys)
- If you are venting a new fireplace or woodstove through an existing masonry chimney, have it inspected first.
- Don't burn treated woods, liquids, or trash.



- Keep all combustibles away from your heating appliances.
 - Have your chimney cleaned and inspected regularly, and burn small, hot fires to reduce creosote buildup.
