

Spearman wins first season swim meet

The Spearman Swim Team started off the year with a victory last Saturday at the Guymon Swim Meet. The team accumulated 452 points to take first place. The win is an even bigger achievement considering that some of the teams they competed against practice all year round. The Spearman team had only 2 weeks of practice before going into the Guymon meet. The teams that competed last Saturday were Spearman, Guymon, Ok; Meade, Ks; Dodge City, Ks; Lakin, Ks; Liberal, Ks; and Ulysses, Ks.

The next meet will be this Saturday in Spearman. At the meet last Saturday, Haley Shieldknight took first place in 400 meter open girls freestyle with a time of 6:00.9. In the boys 400 meter open freestyle Mac Sheppard took second place with the time of 6:05.2. Jana Brock placed first in the 8 and under 50 meter freestyle with a time of 44.4. Michael Lusby and Quentin Shieldknight placed first and second in the 8 and under boys 50 meter freestyle. Lusby took the win in 48.6 followed by Shieldknight with 49.1.

In the 50 meter 9 - 10 girls freestyle, Kelly Shieldknight swam a 38.9 for second place followed by Mandi Lusby in third with a time of 39.0.

Melissa Baker placed third in the 11 - 12 girls 50 meter freestyle with

a time of 40.2. Kristina Poole placed sixth with a time of 44.3.

In the 8 and under boys 50 meter backstroke, Michael Lusby took first with a time of 56.5 followed by Quentin Shieldknight with a time of 1:04.2 for second place.

Phillip Sanders placed second in the 8 - 10 boys 50 meter backstroke. He had a time of 47.4. Coyt Tigrett followed in fourth place with a 57.1.

Melissa Baker won the 11 - 12 girls 1000 meter backstroke. She turned in a time of 1:45.6.

In the girls 100 meter backstroke Suzanne Sanders won the 13 - 14 age division with a time of 1:26.8. Jill Lusby placed third with a time of 1:33.

Haley Shieldknight won the 15 - 18 girls 100 meter backstroke with a time of 1:25.4. In the 15 - 18 boys 100 meter backstroke Mac Sheppard took first place with a 1:27.5.

Jana Brock took first place in the 50 meter girls 8 and under butterfly. She swam the 50 meter distance in 51.1.

Again Quentin Shieldknight and Michael Lusby battled it out for first and second places in the 50 meter 8 and under boys butterfly. Shieldknight took first with a time of 1:07.4 and Lusby took second with a time of 1:15.4.

In the 9 - 10 50 meter girls butterfly Mandi Lusby took first,

Kelly Shieldknight took third and Macy Shieldknight took sixth. Their times were 47.1, 49.7, and 59.3 respectively.

Coyt Tigrett was first in the 50 meter boys 9 - 10 butterfly with a time of 57.4.

Ashley Shieldknight and Melissa Baker took first and fifth with times of 1:39.4 and 2:07.8 respectively in the 11 - 12 girls 100 meter butterfly.

Jill Lusby took second in the 100 meter 13 - 14 girls butterfly with a time of 1:34.6. While Carly Shieldknight took first place in the 15 - 18 100 meter girls butterfly with a time of 1:29.8.

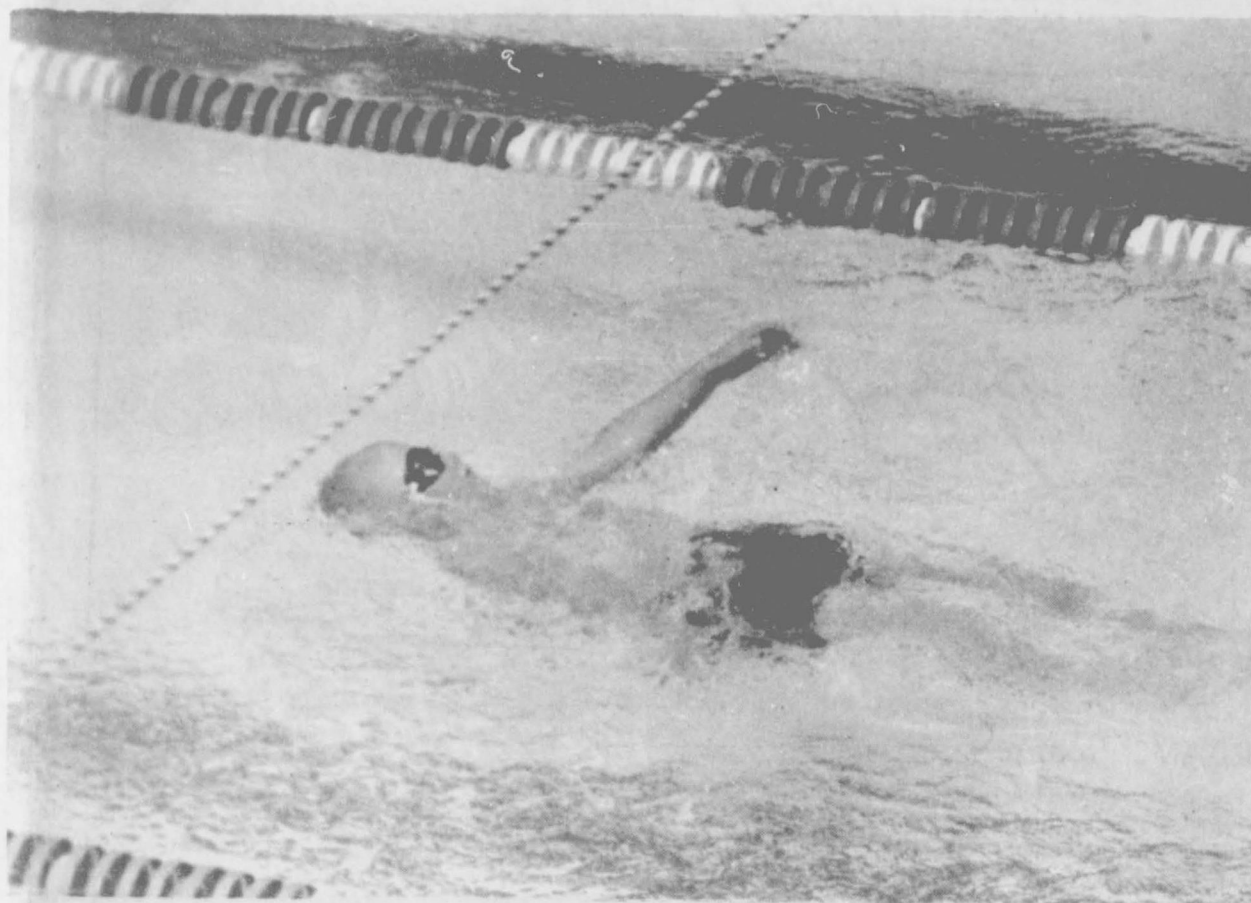
In the 8 and under 50 meter girls breaststroke Kelly Shieldknight took third place followed by Macy Shieldknight in fourth and Mandi Lusby in sixth. Their times were 52.2, 55.1, and 57.1 respectively.

Coyt Tigrett and Martin Sanders took first and second honors in the 9 - 10 boys 50 meter breaststroke. They swam 55.6 and 57.2 times respectively.

The 11 - 12 girls 100 meter breaststroke was won by Ashley Shieldknight. Her time was 1:40.4.

The 13 - 14 girls 100 meter breaststroke was won by Suzanne Sanders with a time of 1:39.9. Jessica Woolley took second with a 1:44.9 and Sonya Tindell took sixth with a time of 1:50.3.

Williams wins scholarship from Houston stock show

Lori Lynette Williams was awarded an \$8,000, four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H scholarship June 9, 1988 in special ceremonies in the Astro-dome.

Lynette, daughter of Lynell and Burton Williams, recently graduated from Spearman High School in the top quarter of her class. She was a member of 4-H for 10 years, serving as club vice president, county council vice chairman and district council member. She received the Gold Star award and showed the area grand champion lamb and summer national breed champion Charolais.

While in high school she was involved in the National Honor Society, Future Homemakers of America and the yearbook staff.

Lynette, who plans to major in agricultural economics at Texas

Tech University, was one of more than 200 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship winners honored.

For the first time in Show history, many of the student recipients sharing in the Show's annual educational commitment exceeding \$1 million were gathered in one place, along with committee volunteers, Show officials and guests.

"We wanted our 6,000 volunteers, who make this Show and these scholarships possible, to be able to see the results of their efforts," said Show president Hal Hillman. "It's such a thrill to be able to meet these outstanding young people personally. They represent a very promising future for agriculture."

City councilmen held regular session meeting

At the Spearman City Council meeting held last Tuesday night the meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and an invocation.

The minutes of the previous meeting, on May 25, 1988 were approved.

The next item on the agenda was the consideration of ordinance #562. The ordinance amended Chapter 14 planning and zoning of the Spearman Municipal Code. The ordinance was approved for amendment by the council.

The next order of business was the consideration of a contract for reconstruction and extension to the runway at the Spearman Municipal Airport. Other construction needed includes a parallel taxiway, apron overlay, and an access road overlay. It was approved by the council to accept the low bid from Depaw Construction Inc. of Amarillo in the amount of \$989,724.77 upon the contingent approval of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The fifth order of business on the agenda was ordinance #563, establishing residential street lighting standards. This item was tabled for further discussion.

The council approved a contract with Southwest Aerial Services, Inc. to perform aerial application of mosquito control.

Bob Boxwell of Spearman was appointed to attend a meeting of cities of Dallas concerning GTE's rate request.

It was approved by the council to enter into a contract with the Hansford County Appraisal District for 1988-1989 assessment and collection services.

Bob Pearson, Spearman Mayor, was nominated to serve on the Panhandle Regional Review Committee for the 1988 Texas Community Development Program.

The council approved a contract to Moon's Roofing and Sheet Metal Co. of Amarillo to repair City Hall's roof from 1987 hail damage.

Monthly reports from the fire, ambulance, police, Municipal Court and animal control were approved.

Payment of the monthly bills and current cash position were approved and the meeting was adjourned.

Those present at the meeting were Councilman Bob Boxwell, Wilson McClellan, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd, Don Reed, and Mayor Pearson. Others in attendance were Jim Murray, city manager, Cheryl Gibson, city secretary and Joe Raper, chief of police.

Golden Age Center Endowment fund for center

The board of directors of the Golden Spread Senior Citizens Center has set up an endowment foundation. The Golden Spread Endowment Fund is a charitable entity set up for the purpose of supporting the Golden Spread Senior Citizens Center. Once the foundation is funded, the Center will last for generations to come because only the earnings of the foundation will be distributed, not the principle.

The goal for the Endowment Fund is \$500,000 to be attained over the next ten to 15 years. Although the Center is on sure financial footing for the foreseeable future, the reason for the Endowment Fund is to make the Center permanent for future generations. With the fund it will be possible to expand the existing facilities and programs it offers.

After the Endowment Fund's goal is attained the need for fund raising drives and projects will be alleviated because the Endowment will support the Center.

"We don't expect to raise \$500,000 by tomorrow," said Bob Boxwell, vice-president of the Golden Spread Senior Citizens Center board. The project is expected to take ten to 15 years for the

Tuesday night at the Golden Age Center in Spearman. The Center is starting an Endowment Fund to eventually make the Center self sufficient.

Hansford Activity Center Activity Center in need of funds

The Hansford Activity Center is in their yearly sustaining membership drive. The goal this year is \$40,000.

Many people think the center should be self-supporting but it is not. Here's why: Expenses for the first five months of 1988 averaged about \$6,200 per month. This includes salaries, utility bills, insurance, supplies, repairs, etc. There are approximately 1,450 households in Spearman. 626 of the 1,450 families would have to buy a family membership for the Center to have enough income to support itself. The Center has 83 family memberships, 68 adult single memberships, 45 youth memberships and 11 complimentary youth memberships (children whose parents can't afford memberships for

them). No child is turned away. That's part of what the sustaining drive is for. The total yearly income from memberships this year is \$15,615. With expenses at \$6,200 per month this didn't go very far.

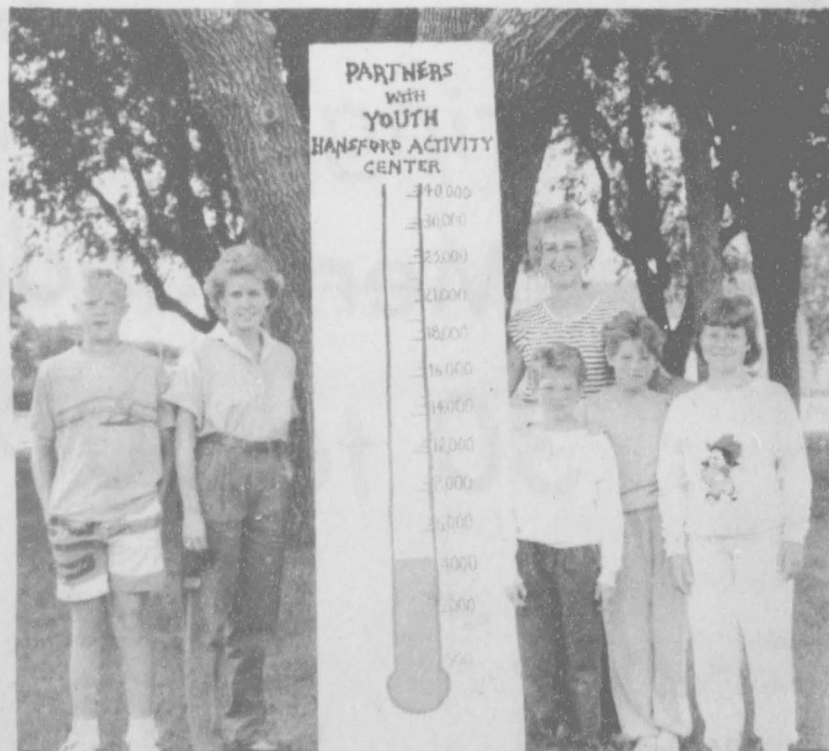

The Center has enough money to stay in operation 2 more months and then, if the sustaining membership drive isn't a success, it will have to close. Donations to date total \$4,480.50.

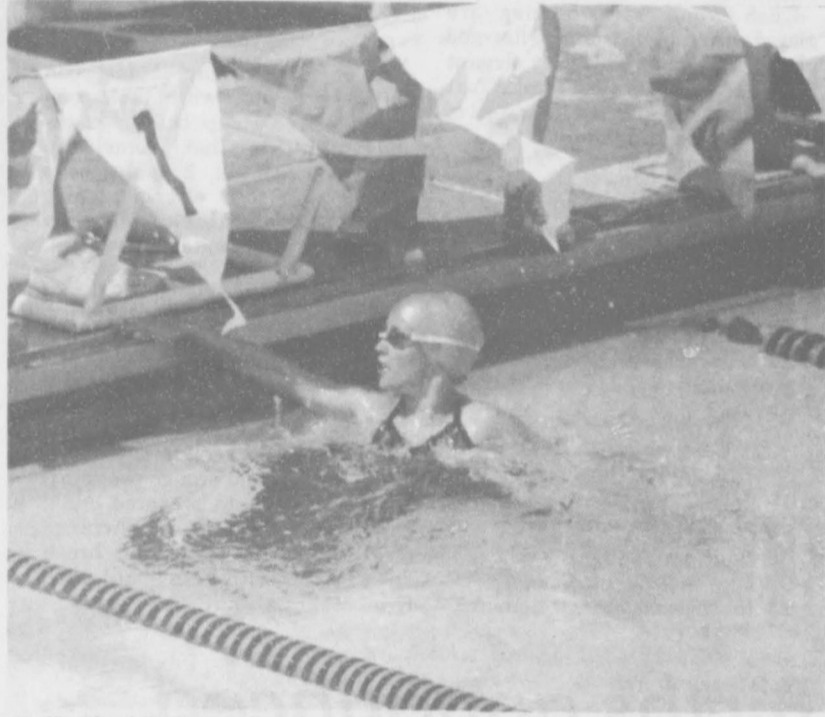
In the 11 - 12 boys 200 meter

More than 1,650 students at Texas Tech University received degrees in the spring 1988 commencement exercises.



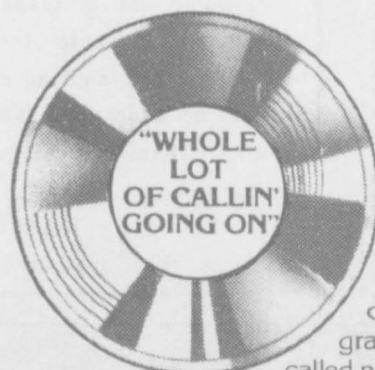
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
