

## First-ever awards for county publications . . . Hansford papers capture honors

A pair of Hansford County publications -- and, indirectly, a third publication -- were honored by their peers in the newspaper industry this weekend when they were awarded four separate honors at the annual Panhandle Press Association's convention held in Amarillo.

The Hansford Plainsman and the Spearman Reporter received one second place award and three third place honors in the annual competition which has weekly publications from across the Panhandle area vying for top places in several different categories.

The newspapers' second place award came in the special edition category where the 1987 Hansford County Football Review was the Reporter's winning entry.

In addition, the Hansford County publication received third place in feature writing, sports writing and community service.

As far as can be determined by records at the news office and

through conversation with individuals associated with the paper for numerous years, these are the first awards ever won by any Hansford County publication.

"It's always nice to be recognized for your efforts, and doubly so when you're recognized by your peers," notes James Jarrett who has served as publisher of the two newspapers for the past year.

"We're pleased with the reception our colleagues in the news industry have given us," he continues. "But the real credit belongs to the people of Spearman and Hansford County who have given us the opportunity to present our publications, and who have been so patient with us as we made ourselves familiar with the communities and its peoples."

The PPA community service third place award was given to the Reporter for its efforts in helping raise funds for both the Hansford Manor Fund and the Operation Christmas Greeting which is spon-

sored by the Hansford Hospital Ladies Auxiliary.

A total of three feature stories were required to enter the feature writing portion of the PPA contest. The Reporter-Plainsman entries included one on Ernest Newcomb, Lucille Hagerman and on the archeological diggings at the PDRA dam site area.

Judge's comments read as follows: "A fine feature story on a worthy feature subject, Lucille Hagerman. She raised eight children while holding an interesting variety of jobs."

"One of the best overall feature stories in the contest was on Ernest Newcomb, an 85-year old camera buff who takes pictures of town events and gives prints of the pictures as gifts."

"The archeology story is not as good a 'pure feature', but gives some interesting background to readers."

Accolades for the Hansford County Football Review were

equally complimentary.

"Many strong points about this special supplement: nice front cover; an introduction laying out what's in store; editorial space laid out in complete units, with ads sold only in uniform sizes; 'Some bright writing; and a good, focused subject that, while not original, is important to this part of the country.'"

In sportswriting, a series of stories on Spearman Lynx football was entered in the contest.

Here judges found the stories "steady and easy to read", but found fault with the fact there were no player or coach's quotes in any of the stories.

The three feature articles entered in the Panhandle Press Association's contest were printed in September and November, 1987.

Newcomb's feature article appeared in the Plainsman on Sept. 27, Mrs. Hagerman's in the Plainsman on Sept. 6 and the archeological feature in the Reporter on Nov. 26.

## Commissioners agree to further study of 9-1-1

Hansford county commissioners agreed to a feasibility study of an enhanced 9-1-1 emergency telephone service, but withheld any decision on funding at their regular monthly meeting Monday.

The 9-1-1 enhanced service is currently being examined by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo. Work on the special regional emergency telephone service has been going on for the better part of a year.

State laws allow for a charge of up to 50 cents per telephone line and up to 1/2 of one percent surcharge on all intrastate long distance calls to be assessed in order to pay for the special service.

Commissioners agreed in princi-

pal to further study of the special 9-1-1 service, but declined to offer any funding at this time.

In other action, they voted to allow jurisdiction in certain cases to officers of the Panhandle Regional Narcotics Trafficking Task Force out of Amarillo.

The special narcotics division is a special segment of the Amarillo Police Force which will be utilized in working with law enforcement agencies throughout the Panhandle area in dealing with drug arrests.

The interlocal assistance agreement which was okayed by county commissioners Monday will allow the special task force from Amarillo jurisdiction in Hansford county for drug-related crimes.

## Steve Cross wins GOP 84th DA nomination

The votes are in and the decisions are made with Democratic and Republican contenders now ready to do political battle in the November general election following Tuesday's runoff decisions.

In the only local race on either ballot, Steve Cross defeated Phil Black to gain the Republican nomination for 84th District Attorney.

Cross tallied wins in both Hansford and Hutchinson counties which are served by the DA's office. He outpolled Black by a 245-143 count in Hansford and by a 1,023 to 836

count in Hutchinson counties.

In other races, Hansford county voters pretty well followed the trend in the state with Mel Phillips gaining the nod over Brian Poff for the Democratic nomination for Texas State Senator of District 31. Phillips got 81 votes in Hansford county while Poff received 75.

Beau Boulter also carried Hansford county as well as Texas, receiving 364 votes here to 30 for Houstonian Wes Gilbreath.

Larry Milner didn't fare as well in Hansford county as he did across the remainder of the Panhandle area. Bob Price outdistanced Milner by a 218-177 count, however Milner won the overall race.

Hansford voters chose Ed Emmett over P.S. "Sam" Ervin for railroad commissioner by a 186-133 count while Ronald S. Block garnered 189 votes for Justice of the Supreme court, place 2 over Nathan Hecht with 109.

## Commodity distribution set

The second surplus commodity distribution for 1988 will be held next Wednesday at the Hansford county courthouse in Spearman from 1 to 5 p.m.

Distribution will be made from the Hansford county judge's office on the first floor of the courthouse.

Those eligible for commodities include recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children, those receiving food stamps, medical assistance only, or supplemental security income.

## Meeting in Dumas Friday to decide . . . Cities may bail out PDRA project

A special meeting between members of the Palo Duro River Authority and councilmen of member cities will be held in Dumas Friday afternoon in an attempt to work out a solution to a \$3.2-million cost overrun in the Hansford county-based dam project.

The meeting will begin at 5 p.m. in the Dumas Noon Lions Club building located at West Sixth and Porter Streets in Dumas. A catered meal will precede the discussion.

Earlier reports from the PDRA indicated the deficit on the dam construction was \$1.2-million. However, in the PDRA board meeting Tuesday, cost over-runs on archeological surveys were added to the deficit and contingency money was set aside to bring the total \$3.2-million.

Money to fund the deficit is available from the Texas Water Commission, PDRA general manager Johnnie Lee told board members at their Tuesday meeting. But the Spearman-based water authority must be able to show the ability to repay the funds.

Concern for the project began when bids for construction of the dam came in with low bid at \$17,206,200 -- well above the \$16-million earmarked for the project.

It was explained at Tuesday's

meeting that the \$16-million budget figure also included contingency monies of \$900,000 which could not be spent for initial construction.

That put the deficit at \$2.1-million instead of the earlier report of \$1.2-million.

Spearman city councilmen agreed to table a resolution on limiting the number of animals which may be kept in a specified area when a group of individuals appeared to question the ordinance at Tuesday's regular city meeting.

Councilmembers heard from several residents and land owners who would be adversely affected by the new ordinance and agreed to table the matter pending further study.

According to residents who appeared before the city commission Tuesday evening, the move to enact the ordinance apparently came about when rumors that a horse feed lot was going to be established in an area which was zoned for light industrial use.

"I got the word that I was

Contingency fees of \$200,000 had to be added to the project since it came in over engineering estimates to boost the total to \$2.3-million.

Then, an archeological budget which had been pegged at \$100,000 came in at \$1,048,000 -- more than

10 times what had been expected. That additional \$900,000 cost overrun brings the total deficit to \$3.2-million.

Cities will be asked to beat the financial responsibility of repaying the additional funds by purchasing See "CITIES" p-2

putting in a feedlot," city landowner Jim Aiken told city father. "But all I use it (his land) for is to unload and let a driver rest overnight. The most I ever have there is three or four, maybe five horses at a time."

Aiken is a livestock buyer and owns property in the area which would have been affected by the new ordinance.

The new ordinance would have

covered property which is zoned for light or heavy industrial or agriculture use. Currently, no property within the Spearman city limits carries an agricultural designation, however.

Several other land owners also visited with the council at Tuesday's meeting, expressing their thoughts on the matter.

## SISD board moves step closer to bid project

Spearman ISD trustees came a step closer to advertising for bids on the junior high construction project at their regular meeting Monday evening by approving minor changes in the plans.

All that remains to complete pre-bid requirements is approval of specifications which are expected later this week or early next week, reports school superintendent Larry Butler.

The board will meet in special session to consider specifications and to authorize advertisements for bid on the construction project which is estimated at \$2.185-million.

In other action, Allen Alford was named to replace retiring business manager Orville Latham. Alford is currently principal at the Spearman elementary school.

The new business manager will take over in early June. Meanwhile, school officials will study the position at the elementary school before making a decision there.

Trustees were informed that recent evaluations in property located within the ISD may pare another seven to 10 percent off expected revenues for the upcoming fiscal year.

The bulk of that is expected as a result of declining oil and gas prices affect mineral values within the Spearman ISD boundaries.

Trustees also heard a proposal from Texas School Services on the programs they have available to help schools finance capital outlay expenditures.

Currently the SISD is looking at ways to purchase activity buses for the school system. No action was taken.

In other routine business, trustees voted to move future board meetings to 8 p.m. to coincide with Daylight savings time; and they set absentee voting for the upcoming school election to open April 18 and run through May 3.

the reservoir pump station intake structure which will provide the cities with water once constructed.

There is considerable consternation within the PDRA board where members are still puzzling over the engineering mistake which has caused the problem.

"We're all embarrassed about the situation," Lee said in Tuesday's board meeting. "We've just got to make the best of a bad situation."

Reese and Nichols, engineering firm for the PDRA, came up short in their estimates on construction due to additional costs of hauling rock which will make up the bulk of the earthen dam.

Engineering estimates called for using rock from the construction of the emergency spillway area which will be built adjacent to the dam.

However, bidders found that the rock did not meet specifications and that suitable rock would have to be hauled in from as far as 80 miles away. Purchase and transportation of the material accounted for the greatest portion of the deficit, according to Lee.

"We better have this pegged now," declared PDRA board members Bruce Titus of Stinnett. "You can just go to the well so many times . . . we can't go back to the citizens looking for another one cent tax increase or another 10 cents on water rates again."

Friday's meeting will also have bond experts for the PDRA to explain to member city representa-

ordinance pending further study into the situation.

In other business, General Telephone was awarded a bid for an electronic telephone system for city hall and the Spearman police department.

The council elected to go with their bid because of additional equipment which would be provided by the GTE bid.

The GTE bid was for \$6,167.18. Other bids ranged from a low of \$5,125 by Audio-Video of Amarillo to a high of \$10,151 by RSCII, Inc. of Perryton.

The city also adopted a resolution supporting the planning and establishment of an enhanced 9-1-1 emergency telephone number through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

They also renewed a contract with the Hansford county to operate the municipal swimming pool this summer.

## Varsity edges out West Texas...

# Spearman girls dominate own track meet

Spearman varsity, eighth and seventh grade Lynxettes dominated their portions of the Spearman Invitational Track and Field Meet held this past weekend in Spearman while Spearman boys found tough area competition at the 2-day meet.

The varsity Lynxettes edged out West Texas for the meet title, scoring 152 team points to WT's 150.

In the eighth grade girls events,

Spearman easily doubled their closest competitor, bringing in 210 points to second place Canadian's 201.

In the seventh grade portion of the meet, Spearman was edged out by West Texas with the Lady Comanches scoring 119 to the Lynxette's 114.

Boys action saw the varsity Lynx third in a field of five with 99 points. West Texas won the meet with 156 points while Canadian

was second with 127.

In junior varsity running, Spearman was fourth with 73, behind first place West Texas, 179; second place Sunray, 108 and third place Canadian, 79.

The Spearman eighth grade Lynx fared the best, placing second with 91 points behind first place Guymon who totalled 124½.

The Seventh grade Lynx finished fifth with Guymon winning that title with 147 team points while Stratford was second with 101.

Five meet records fell to the wayside in the weekend meet, three of them coming in field events.

State hopeful Matt Tucker set a new discus mark, besting the old record by almost 1½ feet. The old mark was set at 152-1½ while Tucker's new record is 153-7.

Heather Murrell finished her

the old mark of 6:00.71.

The other two records were set by area girls with Guymon's Newberry setting a new record in eighth grade girls shot put. Her put of 30-¾ beat the old meet record of 29-9.

Also in eighth grade girls action, Stratford's Ellison set a new discus record with a throw of 87-5. The old record was 86-6.

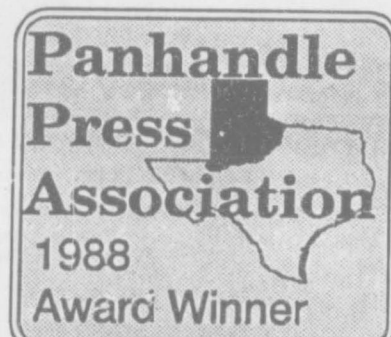

**Onshore petroleum estimates reduced**

In a preliminary report, the United States Geological Survey substantially reduced 1981 estimates of potential onshore petroleum discoveries for this country. The report concluded there is a 50-50 chance that undiscovered crude oil totals 33.4 billion barrels compared to 54.6 billion in its 1981 study. Estimates of natural gas reserves were reduced from 427 trillion cubic feet to 254 trillion cubic feet.

Natural gas spot sales prices have now lost much of the gains experienced in December, January and February.

The newlyweds are students at Panhandle State University. He is a senior and will graduate in May. She is a junior.

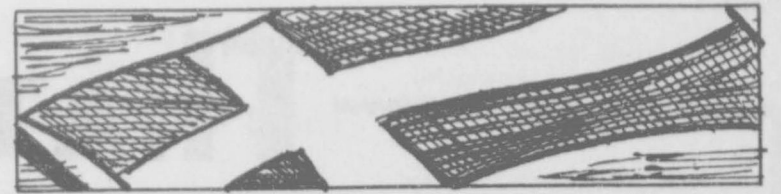

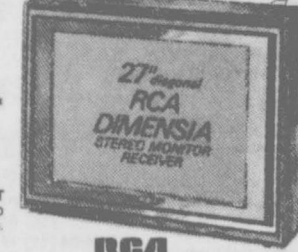
