April 15 Deadline

The AAA has set April 15 as the last date on which Texas farmers and ranchmen can sign "work sheets" and thereby indicate that they intend to apply this fall for payment in connection with the 1939 Agricultural Conservation Program.

Set according to a recommendation by the State Agricultural Conservation Committee, the deadline is a month earlier than last year's final sign-up date, and applies mainly to operators who did not receive payments in connection with the programs of 1937 or 1938, E. N. Holmgreen state administrator of the AAA, explained.

Holmgreen said the advanced deadline is possible because acreage allotments this year were distributed much earlier than ever before, this being the first time in the history of the farm program that allotments are reaching Texas producers, generally, ahead of planting time.

It has been estimated at Texas A. and M. College headquarters of the AAA that cash benefits to Texas farmers and ranchmen who take part in this year's program will exceed \$90,000,000.

This Week In Washington

There are three distinct groups one almost might say 3 parties into which the Congress of the United States is divided.

Of the three, the Republican group is the most efficiently organized, under the leadership of Representative "Joe" Martin of Mass.

The other two groups are divided and less sharply unified. One branch of the Democrats are thick-and-thin supporters of President Roosevelt and if they do not actually take their orders from the White House they go along on any matter in which he is believed to be especially interested.

The third group, the old-time Conservative Democrats is a fair together element, composed of Senators and Representatives who regard themselves as the "real" Democrats and reserve a right to take issue with the Administration on any question which does not conform to their ideas of the best interests of their party and the nation.

The real leader of this third group, which holds the balance of power and can by its votes decide the issue on any legislative question, is Vice-President Garner.

Difficult To Agree

All of the Democrats would like to go along with the President, but many of the middle party find it difficult to agree with many of his proposals. Therefore a committee of four Democratic Senators paid a personal call on Mr. Roosevelt a few days ago, to find out just what he really wants of Congress.

few days ago, to find out just what he really wants of Congress. They reported back to their colleagues that the President wants particularly the following items of legislation:

First, the restoration of the \$150,000,000 for WPA which was cut out of the Relief appropriation bill against the Presidential wishes. Then he wants new laws to aid the distressed railroads; an expanded farm tenancy program and more aid for wheat farmers.

The reaction on Capitol Hill to the report made by the President's visitors was that if that was all he wanted he could have it, all but the 150 millions for WPA.

More Defenses Wanted

Defense measures already voted or in process of passage through Congress provide for a modernized Navy at least equal in size to any other, an air force larger than that of any nation, an increase of 40,000 officers and men in the regular Army.

No stronger note of indignation and protest has ever been sent to a foreign nation than that which under-secretary Summer Welles sent to Hitler after consulting with the President.

It was followed up by an order from the State Department increasing by 25 percent the duties imposed on the importation of all merchandise from Germany. That and the note are among the measures short of "war" to which President Roosevelt recently referred as a means of bringing dictators to their senses.

Income tax returns showed a 250 million dollar decrease from last year.

Apricot Whip

Following is a good recipe for an uncooked fruit whip. Although apricots are called for, it is equally good when a cup of prune, peach, or other fruit pulp is used in place of the apricots.

Make a fruit pulp from one-half pound dried apricots. Heat with one-half cup sugar. Fold into the stiffly beaten whites of 3 eggs containing one-fourth teaspoon of salt. Set aside to cool. Whip one cup of heavy cream. Either fold all into the apricot mixture, or fold in one part and save the rest to flavor and serve on top the pudding. Serve at once.

For variation, different flavorings may be added to the fruit pulp before it is added to the whites—a bit of almond extract or a little lemon juice. Grated rind of orange, chopped almonds or other nuts also add a note of interest.

\$3,500,000 Increase Seen For Wheat Growers

Merchants doing business in the wheat sections of the state are expected to start late in April to feel the stimulating effects of an estimated \$3,500,000 increase in the purchasing power of approximately 50,000 Texas wheat farmers eligible to receive wheat price adjustment payments.

Instructions for making applications for the 1939 wheat "parity" payments have been sent from AAA state headquarters here to 132 counties, and it is believed that nine-tenths of this state's wheat farmers will be entitled to payment for acreage reduction this year.

Jess Watson, wheat farmer and state AAA committeeman representing the Wichita Falls area, explained that the wheat price adjustment payment of 11 cents a bushel is made on the average yield of the 1939 allotment, and that it supplements 1939 conservation checks on wheat expected to amount to more than \$5,000,000 to be delivered next winter and spring.

An estimated total of \$3,600,000 in 1938 conservation payments on wheat is now in the process of distribution.
