Blizzard Hits Hansford County Area

Snow began falling in Spearman at 7:00 a.m. Monday morning March 23rd. Old timers say that it was 30 years ago exactly that the blizzard of '57 struck the county. Actually the blizzard of 1957 started March 22nd and lasted through March 24th. The snow that began falling here Monday morning turned into a ground blizzard by noon. Every car owned by the

newspaper and its employees was stuck by 2:00 p.m. Schools were turned out in Spearman at noon and the town of Gruver was without electricity.

The courthouse was closed at noon and before 5:00 p.m. most of the Main Street businesses had also closed.

Winds clocked at 50 miles per hour drove the snow into large drifts

making it impossible to see or drive. Cars were abandoned all over the county.

The entire one-act play; actors, crew and teacher was marooned in Panhandle. All twenty-three of them were still in Panhandle as we go to press Tuesday. However, the roads were cleared by noon Tuesday, and the sun was shining.

City police and sheriffs officers reported that several head of cattle walked into town by sun-down Tuesday. They gathered around the Dairy Queen and Plains Shopping Center. Officials headed the cattle off of the highway and there has been no report of wrecks caused by cattle on the highway.

The storm caused delays in mail delivery. Several of the large mail trucks apparently were buried in snow drifts. Local postmaster Ray Robertson and his crew delivered mail as usual. They did a great job.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reports that their rescue operations continued

throughout the night. He reported rescuing two people from a van and also two men in a truck 18 miles southeast of Spearman.

A special thanks to all of the men and women who maintained such excellent services to Spearman and Gruver during this blizzard.

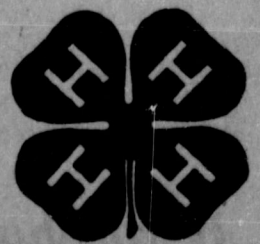

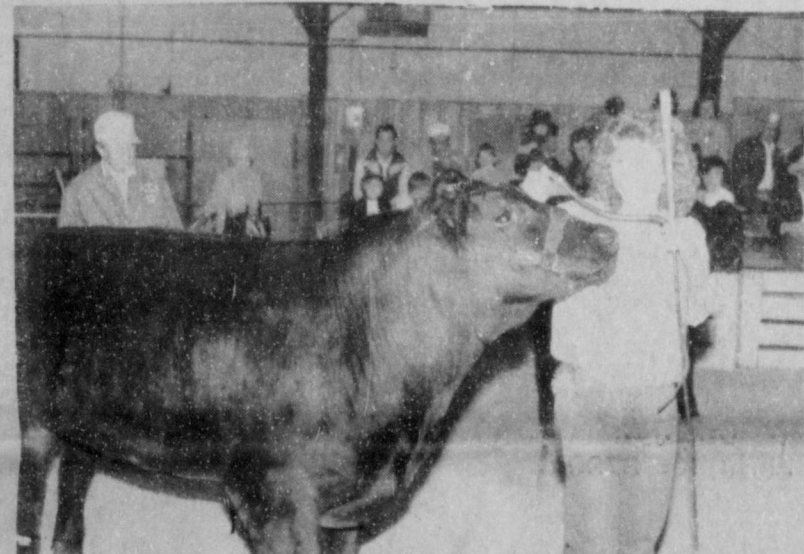
