Hansford woman works toward speaking circuit . . .

Stedje turns dream into reality

... After Dinner Speaker

She's all smile and wide eyes and that's not bad for a Hansford County gal turned after dinner speaker -- a life-long ambition come true for Gruver's Jan Stedje.

Born, bred and raised in a quiet rural setting, Jan brings her own special brand of country-flavored humor to her after dinner talks, speeches she has put together drawing upon true-life situations among her family and friends.

A self-professed optimist, the Hansford County native looks for the bright side of every event and it shows through in her demeanor, whether it's an emcee for an event or in the more formal air of a dinner of banquet.

"Everybody has their own problems -- some have lists," she smilingly notes. "I feel like it's my job to help them to forget those problems, even if it's just for a few minutes."

Already popular in Gruver and Hansford County, Jan is working toward the after-dinner circuit, moving from "free" to "fee" as she puts it.

The transition from being popular in your home-town area to gaining recognition for your work on either a state-wide or national basis, however, is not something which comes overnight.

In fact, for Hansford's pretty speechmaker, it's the culmination of a life-long desire.

"I guess I knew I enjoyed talking in front of people from the first grade in reading class," she laughs. "And it really became evident in high school and college."

In fact, her major in college was speech, this coming as Panhandle State University in Goodwell, Ok., just a few miles up the road from Gruver.

While most of her work to date has been for civic groups, not only as a speaker but as a working volunteer in many of the organizations, Jan began moving toward the professional circuit about two years ago when she became a member of the National Speaker's Association.

As the name would imply, the

group consists of speakers from across the nation who specialize in many areas, from motivational to humorous and almost every aspect inbetween.

"When I called and told them I'd like to become a member, they sent me this form and it asked what kind of speaker I was," she remembers. "Then they had this long, long list of possibilities. I couldn't believe there were so many."

She remembers reading down the list and selecting humorous as her type of speaking.

Through the NSA, Jan has attended two national conferences and a pair of speakers workshops, the latest one this summer in Nashville, Tenn. with her oldest daughter, Krista.

"You get a lot out of listening to other speakers," she notes. "The most important thing I've learned is something all the speakers make mention of -- you can't copy another speaker, you just have to be yourself."

Her attempts to move into the after-dinner circuit obviously have

the support of her family, otherwise Jan wouldn't be making the attempt.

She and her husband, Lynn, have three children ranging from Krista who is a junior at Gruver High School, to Jill who is in the eighth grade and, finally, Lee, who is a sixth grader in the Gruver school system.

"My family is important to me and I wouldn't even be attempting this if they weren't supporting me," she declares.

Most of Jan's work -- her speeches, that is -- are centered around family life and children in particular. Her speeches are naturals for educational groups although they are general enough for just about any audience.

Her talents shine through, however, no matter where she is speaking. And Jan's honest and open sincerity is probably the most engaging aspect she projects.

This summer she was asked to give a 7-minute speech to the members of the NSA at the

Hospital district ends year on positive note

The Hansford Hospital District wound up their 1986-87 fiscal year on a positive note despite ending the year with a deficit, Al La Rochelle, hospital administrator, told board members last Thursday.

The Hansford medical institution -- projecting a \$325,000 year end cash deficit, wound up using only \$212,000 of a \$325,000 line of credit in finishing out the year which ended Sept. 30, La Rochelle reports.

The hospital district has operated on a deficit budget for the past two years and just finished going through a round of meetings to increase the hospital tax rate above state mandated percentages.

According to the Hansford administrator, the new tax rate will eliminate the deficit problem the hospital has been faced with over the past few years if the hospital census can be maintained around 26 percent occupancy.

Thursday's regular board meeting was the first of the new fiscal year for the Hansford hospital board and included a synopsis of the monthly income and expenditures for September as well as a wrap up of the year.

The hospital came out of the 1985-86 fiscal year some \$325,000 in the red and wound up with a total deficit of \$583,822.54 for the 1986-87 year just ended.

Coupled with Hansford Manor losses this past year and losses from operation of doctor's clinics in the county, the Hospital District wound up with an approximate total deficit of \$843,000, the hospital administrator told board members.

The loss had been projected at \$875,000 just two months earlier.

La Rochelle also voiced positive trends for the upcoming year to board members, noting Hansford Manor revenue as the main bright spot in the projections.

Last year during the construction phase of the newly enlarged nursing home facility, Hansford Manor suffered through a loss of \$239,492.

In its last two months of operation -- July and September --

Lynxettes ranked 4th in class AA state girls polls

The Spearman Lynxette cross country team claimed fourth place in the Lubbock meet held this past Saturday as the SHS girls competed with 16 other teams in this West Texas classic.

Nazareth won the event followed by Abernathy and Floydada in second in third, respectively.

In state rankings released this week, the Spearman girls were ranked fourth among Texas class AA schools.

Nazareth headed up the state class AA rankings followed by Savinal and Little Elm, reports Lynxette cross country coach Richard North.

This Saturday, Krista Kirkland once again paced the Lynxettes to their strong finish as she ran fourth

Spearman city councilmembers were appraised of potential problems concerning the city's municipal dump by city manager Jim Murray during their regular meeting held Tuesday evening in the Spearman city hall.

The city is currently engaged in

an enlargement of the city's waste disposal site and, in preparation of permitting the newly acquired land for the city's land fill, Murray was told by the state's licensing office of pending federal regulations which would, in effect, make any waste burning illegal at the city's dump.

"If we're not allowed to burn the waste it could cut two-thirds of the life off our waste area," he told councilmembers. "Right now, with burning, we're looking at the new area we have lasting some 60 years. If we can't burn, it may only last 20 years."

The federal guidelines come out of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and define any burning in an open trench as open pit burning, which is illegal.

Spearman currently carries a permit on existing waste disposal lands for controlled burning of waste. The new federal definition, however, would make Spearman fall under the open pit designation.

Over 30 communities in the Texas Panhandle will be reclassified under the new federal regulations, Murray told councilmembers.

"The Texas Air Control board has already certified through permits that the Panhandle does not have an air pollution problem, nor will our burning of waste create an

Lynx, Greyhounds clash in intra-county grid contest

The Spearman Lynx football crew--fresh off a week's rest from an open date -- will renew their 1987 district title race when they go to Gruver to take on the Greyhounds in what has become an intra-county gridiron classic.

Game time for Friday district 1-AA clash is set for 7:30 p.m. in Greyhound Stadium.

As the Lynx renew their quest for the district crown, only one team in 1-AA remains unbeaten -- the White Deer Bucks who owns a 2-0 mark courtesy of wins over Spearman and Gruver.

Stratford upset West Texas Consolidated this past week in a 20-7 win. That game put the Elks at 2-1 in district and dropped the Comanches mark to 2-1.

Panhandle mauled Highland Park by a 42-8 score as the

Panthers stretched their record to 2-1 while Highland Park has yet to gain a win at 0-3.

Going into Friday's Hansford County Classic, the Lynx are 1-1 in district play while Gruver owns a 1-2 1-AA record.

Looking down the line, Spearman will have to win each of their remaining four games to have a clear shot at the district 1-AA title.

Following the Greyhounds they will face West Texas Consolidated here, go to Panhandle, then host Highland Park in the regular season finale.

A single loss could still see them in post-season play since both the first and second place team from each district now advances to post-season playoffs.

However, an additional loss would put them in a position of having to

wait for other 1-AA teams to be bumped off in order for the Lynx to advance -- in short, their shot at post-season play is taken out of their hands.

The Lynx -- who started the 1987 season strong with wins over Memphis and Hooker -- have stumbled twice this year in games which area pollsters ranked them as solid favorites.

Spearman suffered through a 13-13 tie with upstart Sunray then fell to White Deer in their only district loss.

Both games saw the opposing teams jump to an early first-half lead that the Lynx were unable to overcome despite a strong second-half surge.

In their four remaining games, the Lynx will be hard-pressed to

Okayed the monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports and paid bills.

The stolen vehicle had been left parked in front of a home in East Spearman with the keys in the ignition, notes Raper.

SISD moves closer to new building bond issue

The Spearman Independent School District will move one step closer to a bond election during a special noon meeting today (Thursday) in the SISD board room at Spearman High School.

That meeting will be to set the date for the bond election and to hear reports from the bond firm which the school district has hired to help sell the issue if it is okayed by SISD voters.

Among the items to be discussed by the board and the bond firm will be possible interest rates, the funding period and the tax rate which will be required to retire the bond indebtedness.

SISD trustees held their regular monthly meeting this past Monday during a fairly routine session.

The board official drafted a resolution for the upcoming bond issue and looked over a proposed debt service schedule.

They also voted to reappoint Roy Bulls to the Hansford County Appraisal District and appointed a textbook committee for the current school year.

In other action, the school board heard a report from SISD superintendent Larry Butler concerning a district 1-AA meeting held recently.

Butler noted that district officials were asking district 1-AA member schools to leave the week of UIL literary contests free of track meets so the schools could field greater participation in those events.

Monthly gasoline bids were accepted from Spearman Super Service and Wirt Davis Oil. The bids -- devoid of state and federal taxes which schools do not pay -- were for \$.8075 and \$.8150 per gallon, respectively.

put together four solid quarters of gridiron play in each and every contest.

The first leg of that journey into the heady reaches of post-season play begins this Friday in Gruver.

Gruver -- 1-5 on the year and 1-2 in district -- boasts a stronger team than their season record would indicate.

Their long suit in the Greyhounds past few games has been their defense where Gruver has managed to put together at least one strong goal-line stand against both Stratford and White Deer.

That defense, however, has also proven vulnerable to big plays. The Greyhounds have proven stingy on long-drives, thwarting them time and time again, only to have a long gainer break their concentration as opposing teams move in to score.

Led by junior Brent Wagner, the Gruver offense sparks at times in an aerial bombardment which will have the Lynx secondary under almost constant attack this Friday evening.

Wagner's favorite receiver, Tim Fletcher, however will not see action this week as he recovers from a broken hand -- an injury he received in practices two weeks earlier.

So the Gruver signal called will look toward Charlie Parrish, a 140-pound senior split end who has proven a solid ball player and steady receiver for the Greyhounds this season.

And Slavin Sparks -- filling in for the injured Fletcher -- proved his talents against White Deer last week when he hauled in four Wagner aeriels.

On the ground, Gruver is led by tailback Pepe Marquez, another 140-pound senior who has proven the Greyhounds strongest running-back during the 1987 gridiron battles.

Ty Seagler, at tight end, has also proven a solid blocker and pass receiver for the Greyhounds.

Anchoring both the offensive and defensive lines for the Greyhounds this season has been Andrew Burgoon, a 200-pound offensive guard and defensive tackle.

Burgoon, however, has been playing with injuries and has seen only limited play the past few

weeks. He should be back in action for Gruver this Friday.

Meanwhile, the Lynx go into Friday's game off an open date which has given them the necessary time to recoup from minor injuries which had been growing as the season went along.

Fresh and healthy, the Lynx once again should be strong favorites in Friday's game in Gruver -- a situation which has proven anything but beneficial for Spearman so far this season.

And Gruver, hungry for a win and hungrier still for a win over Spearman, could prove the spoiler if the Lynx take this game too lightly.

the Manor has shown it's first month of profit, that coming in July the first month the new 84-bed facility was open to new residents.

The September figures showed a small loss when patient levels dipped slightly due to residents improving and leaving the facility along with the death of one resident.

"We're already seeing that the Manor losses are not going to be as great as they were this past year," the hospital administrator told the board. "The key will be our ability to maintain a strong census at the hospital."

Through the first few weeks of October, census at the Spearman based medical facility has been running close to 29 percent.

"It's still to early to say we can maintain this trend," he informed board members. "But if we can, if people will use our facility, then we shouldn't have any repeats of the last two years' performances."

Meanwhile, the transition isn't coming fast or easy as she tries to break into the after dinner circuit.

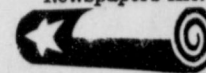
But she is making strides and it shouldn't be long before her entrance into this demanding-type form of entertainment is assured.

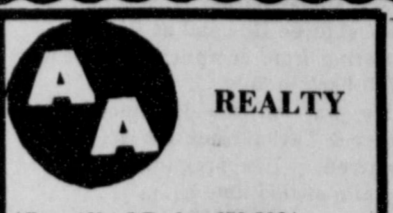

This is their former home. The place where they were raised and raised their children.

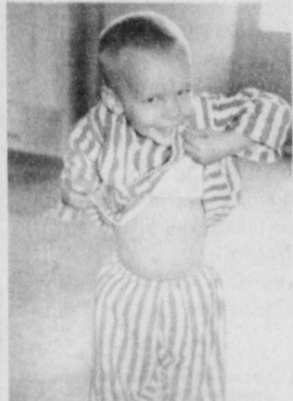
They were guests in the home of her sister Ina and Gordon Cain and for the first time in six years, all her sisters were together, including one sister from Houston.

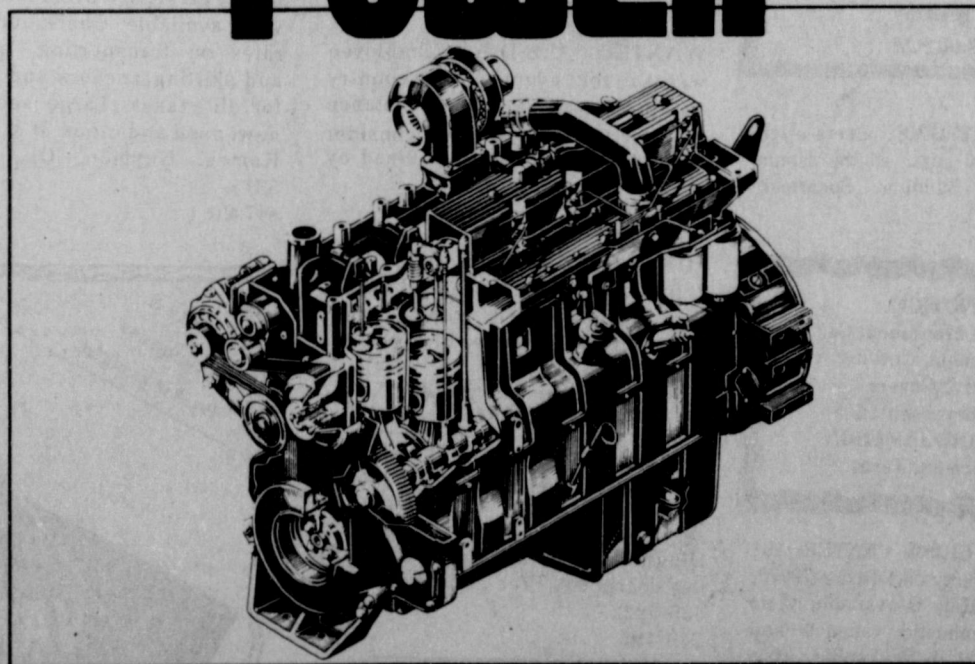
