

Damages around Gruver, At Waka . . .

Spring storm generates high winds

A spring thunderstorm generated a flurry of tornado reports over Hansford county Monday evening, with high winds causing some severe and isolated damage to barns and out-buildings near Gruver while a mobile home was overturned and trees were blown over at Waka, north of Spearman.

"I've never seen anything like this," declares Hansford Sheriff R.L. McFarlin. "I've been in storms where you'll see a tornado dip down, but I counted 14 funnels coming out of the sky at different times Monday evening."

Weather watchers across the county reported several sightings and there were reports of tornadoes touching down in open country. Most of the damage reported across the county was due to high winds, reports the Hansford sheriff's office.

All damage was isolated to out-buildings and barns except for two vacant mobile homes which were blown over. One was at Waka, the other south of Gruver.

The only tragedy came at Lake Meredith where National Park Rangers are still searching the lake for a Spearman man who is reported missing after a boat he and some companions were riding capsized Monday evening.

Richard Dean Pierce, 25 of Spear-

man was still listed as missing at press time Wednesday, reports Larry Nielson, chief ranger at the Lake Meredith headquarters near Sanford.

The missing man, and five companions were skiing when the storm broke over the lake. Pierce jumped into the lake to help a companion. Two others, Joe Robert Grayson and Traci White, both of Spearman, jumped in to help Pierce, but were unable to get him back to the boat, according to Nielson's report.

Meanwhile, in Hansford county, damage was reported at the Gruver airport where a hangar garage on the Pete Maupin place was blown away.

The only damage reported at press time in Gruver was the destruction of a concession stand at the youth baseball park in the southeast part of town.

At Waka, just north of the Hansford county line, a vacant trailer owned by O.E. Drake was overturned. In addition several trees, poles and towers across the community fell before the high winds created by a funnel nearing the ground.

One Spearman couple -- Craig and Cindy Clyburn -- and their two young children escaped serious injury when the pickup they were riding was picked up off the highway and deposited on the far bank of a bar ditch on FM 2018.

"My door window imploded and we

were showered with broken glass," reports Clyburn of the incident. "Highline poles were snapping all around us and I went into the bar ditch and drove for a little bit before I got back on the highway. Then the wind picked up the truck and set us down across the highway on the far side of the bar ditch with the front of the pickup down in the ditch."

The foursome found shelter in a combine nearby to get out of the rain and the falling power lines. They were later picked up by Sheriff McFarlin.

Electrical power to all of Hansford county was affected and the three power companies servicing the county had crews out most of the night Monday and early Tuesday repairing damages.

North Plains Electrical Cooperative out of Spearman suffered tornado damage at a station near Waka and at See "WEATHER", p-2

Following the big Memorial day storm, we got the chance to meet Pete. Fran was just leaving for her Amarillo trip and Pete was seeing her off. He was to meet her there in a few days after he sold some cattle.

We were there to take some pictures of his detached garage. At the time it was detached over some 100 yards out behind his house just east of Gruver.

Needless to say it was a pretty bleak time for the hardy Panhandle veteran. The sky was probably no more overcast than his mood. He had lost his garage, his pickup was damaged and a favorite tree out back had been torn asunder.

Topping all that off, he was having to say goodbye to Fran for a couple of days. It has to hurt to wish that much happiness goodbye, even if it is only for a few days.

But Pete greeted us in typical

Panhandle style, with a smile, a "Howdy", and a firm handshake.

Being no stranger to the Panhandle, Pete has seen more than one hard time come and go. And he's lived through them in that same typical Panhandle fashion. Like the land, he endures.

You've got to admire and respect people like the Maupins. Many will come to love them as I did in those few short minutes.

Spearman man missing at Lake Meredith

A 25-year old Spearman man remains on the missing persons list at Lake Meredith following a Memorial Day boating accident on the Panhandle lake Monday evening, reports National Park Service rangers.

Richard Dean Pierce of Spearman and five companions were skiing on the lake when the storm struck, says Larry Nielson, chief ranger at the Lake Meredith facilities.

Pierce and five companions -- Thomas Wesley Brown, Keith Goodman, Joe Robert Grayson and Traci White, all of Spearman, and Pierce's cousin, Jamie Pierce of Amarillo -- were skiing near the south side of the lake up from Cedar Canyon.

"The weather was deteriorating rapidly and the group had been warned just minutes before by park personnel to vacate the lake," reports Nielson. "They decided to make one more skiing run before returning to shore."

Goodman was in the lake waiting to be towed when Pierce dived into the water to help him, according to the chief ranger's report.

The Spearman man soon became the object of a rescue himself with Grayson and White entering the water in an attempt to help Pierce.

They were unable to bring him back to the boat, reports Nielson. Meanwhile, the engine had stalled and the boat was drifting further away from the trio in the water.

Grayson and White made it safely back to the boat and the group was unable to locate Pierce.

The boat then capsized and the group managed to stay with it in the 30 to 50-foot deep water near there, Nielson says.

The boat drifted to the north shore near Bugbee Cove and the Spearman group made it to a home located up the hill to call in Park Rangers.

Search and rescue efforts have been hampered by the continuing bad weather, Nielson reported at press time Wednesday. Boats which had gone out at 7 a.m. Tuesday had to be pulled off the lake by 8 o'clock that morning.

Pierce is the nephew of Juanita Pierce of Spearman.

Goodman remains in the Borger hospital following the incident.

Weather

least 30 highline poles were down, reports Pat McAlister, manager.

Power was restored to most of Waka Monday evening with crews working through the night to repair isolated cases, he notes.

Power in Gruver was off momentarily, but was quickly restored by Southwestern Public Service there. Highlines near the city remained down Tuesday morning, however.

At Spearman, residents were without power for approximately 25 minutes, reports Robert Elliott, manager of the Texas-New Mexico power company there.

Reports of hail damage to area crops were beginning to trickle in at prestime Wednesday afternoon, but no assessment of damages had been made.

"Most of the damage that I've heard about is in the west and northwest part of the county," notes Bert Williams, Hansford county extension agent. "I don't know how much damage there is at this point."

Rain from Monday's storm totaled only .77 of an inch according to George Young.

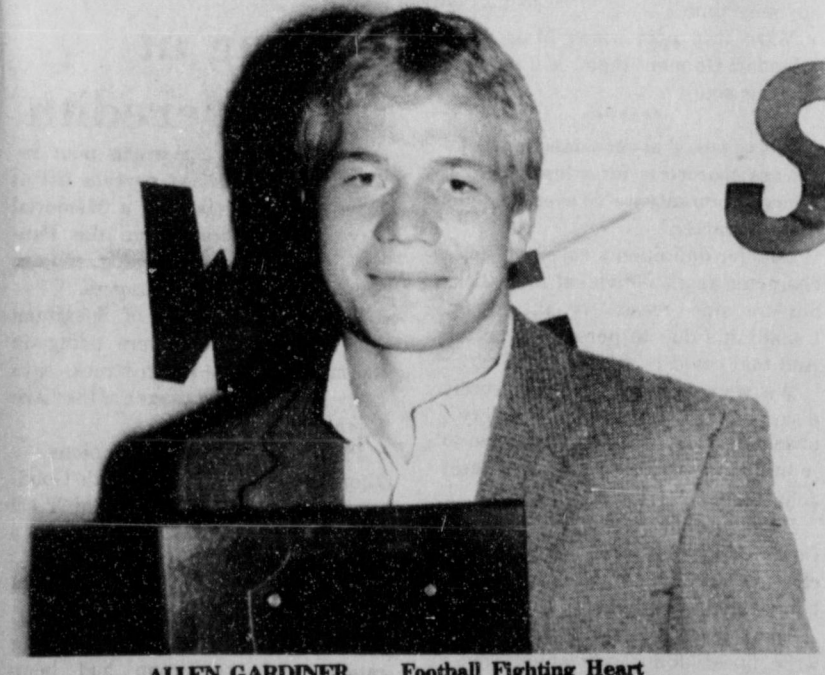

Mr. and Mrs. Danny Knox and family of Odessa spent the memorial day week-end here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don Knox.

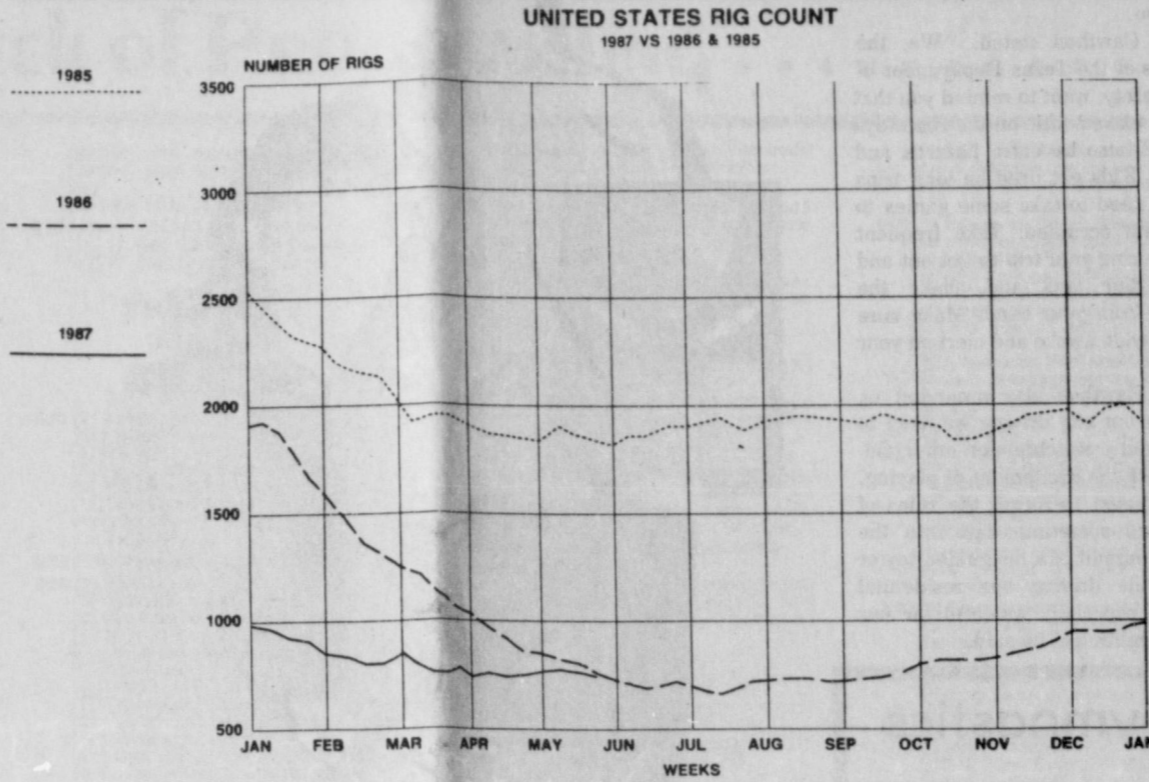

COMMENTS:

The natural gas industry, plagued by surplus gas supplies and low prices for the past several years, is beginning to show signs of improvement. (The Houston Post, May 17.) James Newcomb, associate director and natural gas coordinator for Cambridge Energy Research Associates, said "1986 was pretty tough for the gas industry." He added, "The decline in demand came in the last half of the year in the electricity and industrial sectors."

However, Newcomb said some of those lost markets will be regained this year. "Gas is now a bargain at the burnertip compared to oil and it likely will be that way for the rest of 1987."

Newcomb commented that gas consumption in this country amounted to 16 trillion cubic feet in 1986, down from 17.3 trillion in 1985. He looks for consumption to climb to 16.4 trillion this year.

City enters agreement

Spearman city commissioners agreed to enter into an interlocal purchase agreement with the Hansford-Galveston Area Council in purchasing a new ambulance for the Hansford and Spearman Emergency Medical Service Department.

The agreement will entail a "piggy-back" purchase with the Houston-Galveston Area Council which is in the process of buying 30 of the specialized vehicles.

"This in effect will give us a better cost on the ambulance," Jim Murray, city manager, reported to the commission.

The Houston-Galveston Area Council -- a regional organization

much like the Amarillo-based Panhandle Regional Planning Commission -- is acting as purchasing agent for several EMS units under their immediate jurisdiction.

Through an agreement with the PRPC, member cities of the Amarillo-based commission in the state for a three percent fee.

The Houston-Galveston council already has bids for the special type one walk-through ambulances with the price tag running \$45,905.

The three percent charge back to Spearman and Hansford county would bring the total bill to \$47,282.15, said Murray.

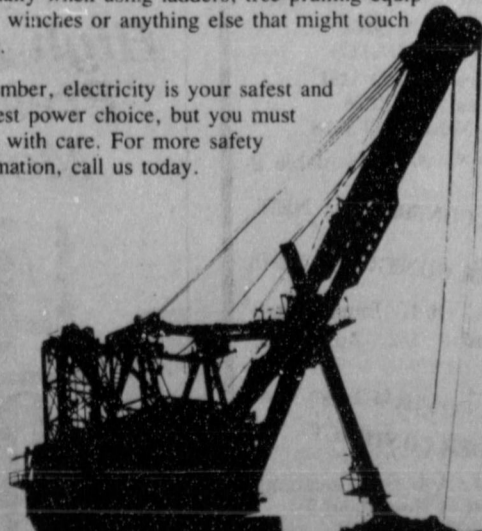
