Hansford woman is busy volunteer

What began as an agreement to attend one meeting over a decade ago has turned into a long list of civic activities for Rosa Lee Butt of Spearman.

In addition to her ongoing and almost continuous civic duties, Rosa Lee is one of only two Hansford County women who hold political office.

Rosa Lee is on the board of the Hansford County Hospital District and Ila Jo Hart is a city commissioner at Gruver. These two ladies have joined a group of female political activists across the state who are sharing their talents with the public at large.

For Rosa Lee, at least, the so-called political job is just one of a long list of activities she's been performing for well over a decade and those activities have spelled a boon to both organizations and individuals across the county.

With a quick smile and ready wit, Rosa Lee downplays her efforts but doesn't shirk the responsibilities she's voluntarily taken on.

"I've never been one to read or watch much TV," she relates. So, I've got to do something to keep busy.

That something includes a list of activities, from church related groups to civic groups -- and at least one personal responsibility, that being daily visits to her mother who is a resident in Hansford Manor nursing home.

Currently, this one-woman volunteer group is serving out the last two and one-half years of an unexpired term on the Hansford Hospital District board of directors.

She was appointed to this position which was left vacant by the death of the late Dwight Hutchinson late in 1986.

Rosa Lee admits that she didn't really get involved in many community activities until after she had raised her three children. When she did get started, it began slowly and seems to have snowballed over the years.

Today she is either involved in or sits on some 10 different activities or organizations within the Hansford County community.

"I enjoy what I'm doing and I'm happy at it," she notes. "And it doesn't take that much time, although it can get kind of hectic at times.

Her 'career' in volunteer work began somewhat inauspiciously some 10 or 12 years ago when she was asked to attend a meeting to discuss the formation of a senior citizen's center in Spearman.

Today she is a charter member of the board of directors of the Golden Spread Senior Citizen's Center and

she also heads up the activities committee there.

Active in her church, Rosa Lee also heads up the activity committee at the First United Methodist Church where she also serves on the administrative board.

She's active in the "We Care" ministry of the church which takes food to invalids and shut ins in the community.

In addition to that, she serves as a member of the Hansford Hospital Auxillary, she's on the board of the Spearman Housing Authority which is responsible for a government apartment complex in Spearman;

She serves on the health committee for the Spearman Chamber of Commerce and helps with bingo every Tuesday night at the Hansford Manor.

Suicide ruled in Sunday shooting Burial was in Gruver Cemetery

dead on arrival at Hansford Hospital Sunday morning from a single gun shot wound to the head, reports the Hansford county sherriff's office.

Billy Don Adkins, 33, was found in a trailer home located on the grounds of Palo Duro Feeders by members of the Hansford sherriff's office around 10:41 a.m. Sunday.

While the case is still under investigation, officers at the scene report finding a note in the deceased's handwriting, but positive identification had not been made at presstime.

Hansford Justice of the peace for precinct 1, Johnny P. Vernon, has ruled the death was caused by a self-inflicted wound.

Both Gruver police and the Hansford sheriff's office received a call around 10:22 Sunday morning, with the caller apparently identifying himself as Adkins, reports

The caller requested law enforcment assistance, stating there had been a shooting, notes investigating officer, Jim Brown, of the Hansford sheriff's office.

When members of the sheriff's and the Gruver Emergency Medical Service arrived at the scene. Adkins body was discovered. EMT's worked on Adkins while transporting him to the hospital in Spearman where he was reported dead at the hospital after revival efforts failed.

Funeral services for Mr. Adkins were held Tuesday morning at the Gruver United Methodist Church with the Rev. Kerry Hurst and Frank Buzzard officating.

Tuesday election to be light

in droves from an off-year constitutional amendment election next Tuesday with a forecast of less than 12 percent of registered voters exercising their voting priveledge - and it appears Hansford County will be no exception to that forecast.

As of presstime only four absentee ballots had been received in the county clerk's office in Spearman, reports Amelia Johnson, the Hansford County Clerk.

A total of 3,309 voters are registered in the county and are eligible to vote on the long amendment ballot which contains 25 proposed amendments and two binding referenda -- including one for legalization of pari-mutual wagering in Texas.

Absentee balloting will end at 5 p.m. Friday at the county clerk's office. Polls will then open for balloting next Tuesday morning at 7 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m. that

Hansford County voters have eight voting precincts which are shown on their yellow voter's registration cards, notes the clerk.

Voting precincts have nothing to do with commissioner's precincts and all voters should check their voters registration cards to see which voting precinct they should utilize.

Candidates filing dates moved to December 3

Political aspirants across the state of Texas will find themselves having to file for public office some 30 days earlier for the upcoming political campaigns as primary voting in Texas moves from the traditional first Saturday in May to what has become known as "Super Tuesday' in March -- the second Tuesday of that spring month.

Filing deadlines for the 1988 primary have been moved up accordingly with the opening day to file for political office now Dec. 3 instead of January as it has been in the past.

The final day for filing for public office will be Jan. 4, 1988 rather than the early February date of previous election years.

In county elections, five positions will be open to elections in 1988, including sheriff, tax assessor-collector, a pair of county commissioner seats and the county attorney's office.

Both the district judge position and the district attorney will face relection in the 84th Judicial Dis-

State offices will have both and the 88th state representative post up for grabs as well as the 31st district's state senator's office.

Incumbents have yet to make re-election choices public in Hansford county, but decisions will have to be made soon due to the moving up of the filing deadlines.

Traditionally, public officeholders across Texas have waited until after Thanksgiving to make their re-election announcements but 30 days have been shaved off the filing and campaigning deadlines with the move to the March

Current office holders include Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, tax assesor collector Helen Dry;

County Commissioners Garland Head of precinct one and B.J. Renner of precinct three, and county attorney John L. Hutchison.

District judge J.E. Blackburn and district attorney Gene Compton of Borger will also face re-elec-On the state level, Dick Water-

field (R-Canadian) currently serves as state representative for the 88th district while Bill Sarpalius (D-Canyon) is 31st district state



Spearman city councilmen met behind closed doors Tuesday night to hear a report on employees and recommendations on updating job classifications and pay plan from a management consulting firm.

After coming out of the executive session, councilmembers voted to accept recommendations from the firm and will implement those recommendations at their next meeting in November.

In other action, city fathers adopted a resolution in support of amendment 17 on next Tuesday's constitutional amendment vote. This amendment concerns tort reform in the state and in part would spell out definitions for governmental entities.

City manager Jim Murray was authorized to act as the city's representative in seeking a Texas Community Development Program grant to replace old water lines in a portion of the city.

They also voted to participate in a telephone franchise study committee and joining the Texas Municipal League in the civil action of several groups taking on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in a case involving ramifications on the clean water act.

Commodity certificates have value

Keith Martin, CED of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said generic commodity certificates that have not been exchanged or transferred to another person by the expiration date may be redeemed for a cash percentage of the certificate's face value.

"Original holders (farmers) of expired commodity certificates may submit a written request for cash payment to our office, along with the expired certificates,' Keith said. Certificates must be reedeemed at the same county ASCS office where they were

Generic commodity certificates are issued to farmers and others

According to Keith farmers have until October 31, 1987 to request 85 percent of the face value of commodity certificates which expired between December 31, 1986 and April 30, 1987. Farmers who have certificates with a May 1, 1987, or later expiration date, have 6 months to request 85 percent of the certificate's face value.

"Original certificate holders who miss the October 31 or the 6-month

deadline, have up to 18 months after the expiration date to request 50 percent of the face value of these certificates.'

For instance, Keith said, a commodity certificate with a December 31, 1986, expiration date may be exchanged as late as June 1988 for 50 percent of its' face value. A commodity certificate which expires in December 1987

may be exchanged within 6 months or until June 1988 for 85 percent of its' face value.

The ASCS official said 4.3 percent will be deducted from cash payments for certificates issued under the 1986 Price Support and Production Adjustment Programs in accordance with the Balanced Budget and the Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

25 amendments face voters Nov. 3

Twenty-five -- count 'em, 25 -proposed amendments to the state's constitution, plus two referendum questions, await voters on Nov. 3.

Various groups and individuals have lined up on both sides of each amendment fence. The League of Women Voters has published a nonpartisan, objective amendment guide, to help shed light on the

Amendment 11 provides for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time. Among the groups which ardently support the measure is Moore County Development Inc. and the Moore county and Dumas chamber of commerce.

The amendment would reinstate as part of the constitution the terms of a statute that had been declared unconstitutional. The "freeport" provision would exempt from local government property taxes such tangible personal property as is brought into the state and then

transported out of the state no later than 175 days thereafter, providing that its detention in the state is for no purpose other than in assembling, storing, manufacturing, processing or fabricating activity.

Sentiment against the measure claims that certain business activities would be given special treatment over others. The against crowd notes that interstate transportation interrupted only by temporary storage or warehousing is easily identifies and already subject to exemption.

Amendment 12 would permit spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship. In the event of death, all or part of community property would become the property of the surviving spouse, if an agreement was made prior to death in writing.


Proponents say the act makes it easier for couples to gain survivorship rights. Opponents charge the amendment would substantially change the community property laws in the state and would cause confusion and uncertainty. A will,

they say, would still be needed to be executed to accomplish passing certain property to the next and successive generations.

Amendment 13 would allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services. The emergency service districts would be in addition to fire prevention districts and would be financed by a maximum of 10 cents per \$100 valuation. It would be a plus for rural counties without emergency medical services.

Amendment 14 would allow the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases. Presently, the constitution prohibits the state from appealing any element of a criminal case except by a petition to the Court of Criminal Appeals for a review of decision of a lower court of appeals on the higher court's own motion.

Amendment 15 would provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces counties.

The USDA has begun a campaign to disallow most payments to corporations, trusts, and estates. Representative Jerry Huckaby (D-La) has introduced legislation that would be slightly less harmful than the USDA's new policies. All of this is harmful to our commun-

In April, the USDA implemented policies to disallow as many of the current devices for splitting payments as possible. This was in response to a critical GAO report done at the request of several congressman who are completely adverse to payments to farmers. These congressmen's concern was due to a large increase in agricultural expenditures over budget levels. The primary reason for this increase in expenditures was the skyrocketing number of entities drawing payments.

The USDA's policy has been implemented by issuing extensive interpretations of the regulations. These interpretations subvert the policy of the Food and Security Act of 1985 change the positions previously taken in the interpretation of these regulations, and prevent the farmer from receiving a fair return on his labor and investment.

Huckaby has proposed legislation of lesser scope. While not as harmful as USDA policies, it would still damage the larger traditional family farms. Generally, an individual might draw his payment and be allocated portions of payments from corporations up to a total of two payment limits. In relation to wives, it also makes provisions for treating wives as separate persons in relation to property brought into the marriage. Still, this would decrease government payments to producers in our area.

The USDA's position devastates grain producers in the Texas Panhandle and throughout the United States. The consequences will have a ripple effect running throughout the economy and will adversely affect all those who supply the producers, those who transport the grain, those who manufacture our supplies.

It will have an adverse effect on our farming community.

Prior legislation has established the goals for American agricultural policy. The major goals are to provide cheap food, and adequate food supply, a fair return to

individual producer, and additionally to balance the trade deficit and provide a bargaining tool in the diplomatic area. The proposed legislation and the USDA's current policies are contrary to all these

The policies of the Department of Agriculture have driven the prices of wheat, corn, and grain sorghum down tremendously in the last four years. The amount of payment that is subject to the limit are tied to an average market price. Therefore, the payments have increased and more and more people are being affected by the limit.

If continued, these limits and the resulting loss of farm income will destroy the viability of American agriculture an adversly affect our community.

I will grant there are some abuses in the payment limitation program. However, a knee jerk reaction to this problem without considering all its effects is extremely unwise.

To punish an entire industry for a few abuses seems to be simplistic and extremely detrimental to the family farms in our area.

In the larger counties, especially, where the voters do not know one another we feel that the financial officers should be required by law to be educated in the field of accounting. Under Texas statutes as they now read and have read for 100 years, the voters can, and often do, elect "candle stick makers" to the office of county treasurer. Texas believe in education and now is another opportunity for us to encourage our young people to prepare themselves for whatever they want to do. We do not need examples in county government that indicate that it really doesn't

matter who is or isn't qualified. Politics has its place in policy making positions. In this age of electronic banking and computer accounting we do not need our on-going offices of record and accountability opened up every four years to be administered by a politician whose background may or may not qualify him as equal to much less greater than the staff he comes in to supervise.

We thank each Texas voter for your progressive vote on this issue.

Spearman S&L named top profit maker

A Spearman branch office and it's home office has been named as the top profit making savings and loan in the Panhandle area by a leading bank and S&L consulting

Interstate Savings and Loan with home offices in Perryton and a branch office in Spearman, reported earnings of \$216,000 in the first half of 1987, the firm notes.

Meanwhile, savings and loan associations across the South Plains and Panhandle area are not fairing as well with losses exceeding \$149.6 million during that same period.

The report was issued by Shesunoff and Company, an Austinbases analyst firm.

A total of 20 of the 26 S&L's in the South Plains and Panhandle are lost money during the first six months of the year, largley because of loan problems and soft loan demand, the report notes.

Largely due to bad real estate loans, Texas S&L's reported losses of \$2.6 billion, the worst of any single state, according to the Shesunoff report.

Meanwhile, the favorable report on Hansford County's lone savings and loan institution underscores the fact that the economic situation around the county is better than those in surrounding counties and across the state.
