

"Dusty" acclimates to Texas Panhandle

Stumpf returns with new leader dog

They're home at last -- Phillip Stumpf and Dusty, his golden retriever leader dog. Dusty is busy learning to adapt to the Texas Panhandle while Phillip is fresh from his training in learning how to utilize the specially-prepared dog for the purpose it was trained.

Stumpf -- blind for the past five years -- received Dusty free of charge, thanks to an organization known as "Leader Dogs for the Blind" near Rochester, Mich. which is funded in large part by Lions Club International.

Stumpf was sponsored by the Spearman Lions Club which even paid for his plane fare to and from

Rochester to pick up Dusty and for his 4-week stay there to learn how to work with the dog.

Meanwhile, Dusty has found himself a home and a new family. If Phillip doesn't take care of him properly, there's always his wife, Carol, to take up the slack.

Phillip's leader dog is no 27-months old and tips the scale at 75 pounds. And the two are becoming familiar sights around Spearman already.

The pair have already worked out a route to the donut shop -- and they've only been working at it since last Friday, their first full day back in town.

In addition, they have worked the aisles at a number of Spearman businesses as Stumpf settles into the routine of having a leader dog.

"They work entirely on verbal commands," notes the Spearman man. "When he's working, he's constantly vigilant for me -- he sees everything that moves. It's a constant tension for him."

The change is apparent. When on a leash, he acts as most well-trained dogs. He lies quietly at his master's feet -- most of the time snoozing.

"When they have their harness on, they're constantly at work," notes Stumpf. "So, when they're

on the leash they spend most of the time relaxing, otherwise they'd burn out real quick."

When the harness is brought out, Dusty becomes a different animal. Ears instantly perk up and the dog becomes alert, almost agitated.

With the harness in place, Dusty is in the element for which he was trained. He stands at his master's side, his head moving from side to side as he begins his routine of watching for Phillip's safety.

Even when Stumpf sits down and relaxes, Dusty remains alert. He may lay down, but his head

With 825 students expected for 1987-88 school year

SISD announces registration times

Registration for some 825 Spearman school students will be held at Spearman schools August 28, report Spearman ISD school principals this week.

And the 1987-88 school year will open Tuesday, Sept. 1 with the school days beginning at 8:15 for all grades. The school day will end at 3:45 for high school students with times for elementary and middle school not yet firm.

Registration for elementary students (K-5) will begin at 9 a.m. and run through the morning hours and 11:30, reports Allen Alford.

Grades kindergarten through third will report to the elementary

building and the fourth grade will meet in the middle school building on the east end first floor rooms 108 through 110.

Grades five through eight will report to the auditorium in the Middle School building on Fifth Street.

New students who have not attended Spearman school for grades kindergarten through eighth will pre-register on Aug. 18 and 19 from 8:30 until noon each day. New students are asked to bring their records from their previous school if possible.

Kindergarten students will need their birth certificates and physical

forms. "It's very important that the students have these forms," notes Alford.

Some 575 students are expected to register at the elementary and middle school complex while another 250 are expected at high school.

Seniors for the 1987-88 school year will register in the high school auditorium -- as will all underclassmen. Senior registration begins at 8 a.m. and runs through 9:30 that Aug. 28 morning.

Juniors will register from 9:30 until 11 o'clock while sophomore and freshmen register in the afternoon from 1 to 3 o'clock and 3

bring writing materials to their separate registration group meetings.

The 1987-88 school year has 17 scheduled holidays -- the bulk of those coming in December for the Christmas break.

The first holiday of the school year comes after only four school days with the Labor Day observance on Monday, Sept. 7. School will be let out for three days in November -- the 25th through the 27th -- for Thanksgiving.

The next break comes beginning Dec. 23 and will run through the New Year. Classes will resume Jan. 4, 1988.

Then it's a fairly steady grind for students until March where there

2-a-days start Monday for Spearman griders

The end of summer comes to a quick close for Spearman Lynx football hopefuls as 2-a-day workouts get underway this coming Monday morning.

Lynx coaches began handing out shoes to Spearman gridiron hopefuls Wednesday morning and Spearman head mentor Don Mullins is looking for some 55 Spearman high athletes to sign up for football duties.

The 2-a-day conditioning drills begin at 8 a.m. Monday, then again at 6 p.m. for a pair of 2-1/2 hour sessions to mark the end of summer for the pigskin hopefuls. The non-contact workouts run

through Thursday with the first day of contact drills set to begin Friday morning when the Lynx griders don full pads.

On the strength of 12 returning lettermen, Coach Mullins and company hope to fashion a nucleus to bolster a 3-6 record from the 1986 season.

Already, however, questions are beginning to cloud the 1987 season as returning starter, Scott Swan, may be sidelined for the year due to an off-season accident which left a thumb crushed on one hand.

The thumb, which has been amputated according to the Spearman head mentor, will require some healing time. Reconstructive surgery may leave the unanimous All District 1-AA player on the bench for a longer period of time.

Meanwhile, Mullins and company will be looking over a stable of performers which include the likes of Matt Tucker, Keith Benson, Monty Ross, Brett Davis, Kevin Nelson, Will Black, Stan Brandt, Jeff Gustin, Norman Scroggs, Alan Beeson, Lance Swan and Tim Wooley, to name a few.

Tucker, at 5-9 and 245 pounds, earned all district honors at nose-guard his sophomore season and, as a junior this year, returns to the Lynx crew for pre-season drills.

Offensive starters returning for the 1987 season include Benson, senior tight end; Ross, senior center; Davis, senior quarterback; and Nelson, senior tightend.

Regulars back from the 1986 Texas schoolboy gridiron battles include Black, senior defensive secondary and backup quarterback; Brandt, a senior runningback and defensive halfback;

As we continue to meet the good folks of Hansford county, invariably a few stick in our minds.

A few of those fall into what we call the "indomitable spirit" category. Fran Maupin was one, as was Phillip Stumpf. Fran is fighting cancer while Phillip is learning to live with blindness.

Yet another of those people we met Monday evening -- G.H. "Buddy" Eling in Gruver. Buddy is paralyzed from the waist down and has been since 1979.

He lives by himself, cooks his own meals, cleans up and whole lot more. He goes deep sea fishing in Alaska for one. He also does some of the best wood work and lapidary of anyone we've ever met.

And, to put it bluntly, he's one of the most gregarious men we've ever met as well. But when you interview people for a living, that's not bad.

Buddy drives himself around in a specially equipped car and pickup. He even has a boat in his front yard. I didn't ask him about it, but I just get the feeling he uses it more than once or twice a summer.

I'm sure he went through a time of depression and recrimination shortly after the accident which left him handicapped.

But he's overcome it nicely. Better, in fact, than many of us would. He amazed me with his obvious tenacity on the different projects he undertakes. And on his capacity for life and living it to the fullest.

Buddy, I hope I'm never in your position. But if I ever find myself there, I trust to God that I'll be able to face each day as you do now -- with vitality and a firm grasp on the truly important things in life.

Ah, the power of women. Did you know that if it weren't for an attractive woman the capital of Texas might be Mexico City?

At least that's what one story -- which has grown into a well-respected legend -- would have us believe.

As the story goes, Santa Anna dallied near the San Jacinto River with a mulatto girl named Rose.

That could explain why he was still asleep at noon whenever Houston's smaller force approached the Mexican position to "surprise" his force at what has

become known as the Battle of San Jacinto.

"Yep, that's right. There's nothing I can't do," he replied, matter-of-factly. Then in the same tone, he quipped, "Of course, I've been married seven times."

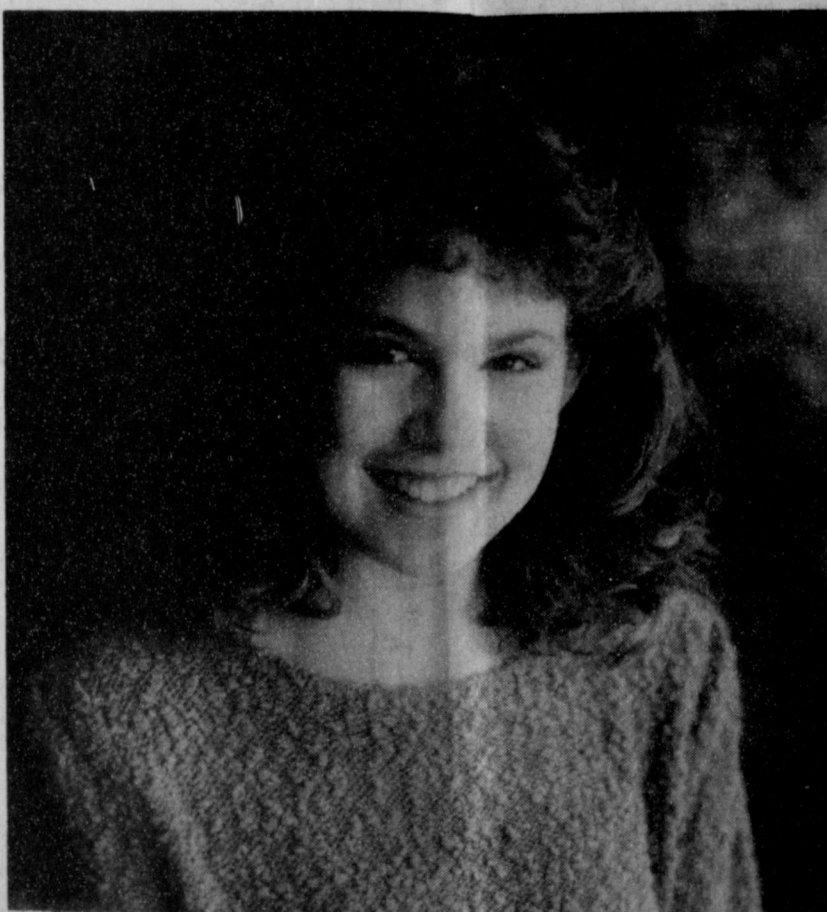
As some other commentator is so fond of saying -- that's the rest of the story.

remains upright. There's no sleeping dog now, he's alert, almost rigid in his demeanor with the harness on.

A leader dog is trained for some six months prior to becoming a helper for a blind person. Expense in training runs near the \$8,000 mark for each animal. And the cost is picked up by Lions Club International.

Dusty has more training than most of the animals as he was kept for demonstrations across the nation put on by the Leader Dog for the Blind School.

"When he first came to me, I spent about three hours with him in my room," remembers Stumpf. "Every time the trainer would walk by or, if we heard his voice down the hall, Dusty would try to go to him."

"I'd just hang on to the leash and pull him back," he continues. "I bet he pulled my bed four feet toward the door that first night." Phillip laughs.

Eventually, however, Dusty settled down and began accepting Stumpf as his new master. By the end of their fourth day together, Dusty no longer paid attention to his trainer, reports the Spearman man.

For the next few weeks, Stumpf and Dusty became familiar sights in area towns around the school as he and his dog, along with others form the school, began their training in earnest.

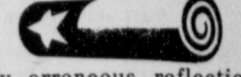
"They'd take us into town and we'd fix routes that our dogs became familiar with," he says of his training. "Then we'd go into the stores and browse."

This training was done under supervision of instructors from school. But the acid test came the final week when they were turned loose on what the school called MMT -- the magical mystery tour.

"We were taken into town and left in an unfamiliar neighborhood and we were told to find downtown," he says. "they didn't even tell us which direction was down-

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town." Stumpf recalls being within two blocks of their destination only to have him and his companion who was paired with him, go eight blocks too far.

"So we had to turn around and retrace those eight blocks," he laughs. "But we found it."

The important thing for people to remember is not to disturb the dog when it's working, notes Phillip.

"If the dog is distracted, it might allow me to do something I shouldn't," he says. "If I'm injured, or allowed to trip and fall, the dog takes it very personally. His job is to protect me."

Hair today, gone tomorrow for some Hansford men . . .

Balding remedies -- are they fact or fiction?

What do the likes of Robert Duvall, Steve Balboni, Ed Asner, Telly Savalas, Dick Buttons, Gumbly, Gerald Ford, Issac Hayes, Tom Landry, Marvin Hagler, Gavin MacLeod and Joe Garagiola have in common with a few Hansford County men?

They're either bald . . . or getting there quickly.

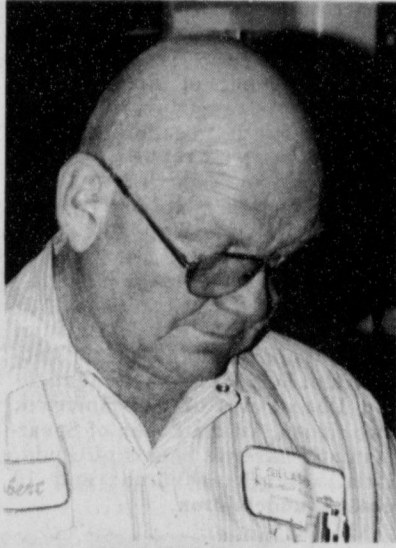
And there are almost as many cures for this common male malady as there are jokes about being bald.

Remember a few years ago when "Bald Is Beautiful" bumper stickers were the rage? When movies portrayed bald men invariably in the role of the wimp?

Contrary to popular belief, real men do eat quiche, and they also grow bald. And millions of dollars are spent every year across America by those yearning for the "hairy" days of youth. These people answer ads that promise

everything from "Stronger, thicker hair in just thirty days" to "Put an end to hair loss today".

These same ads spout statistics which show that American women find bald men less appealing than

their more hirsute counterparts. Yet a random sampling of Hansford women invariably yielded a remark something on the order of "It depends on the man . . . I'm more interested in personality" on up to direct admission that a few found bald-headed men "down-right sexy".

It should be added here that the questions were asked by a balding man.

However, if one were to believe the advertisements for those peddling cures for the terminally bald, going without scalp hair is worse than having the wrong type of deodorant or using no toothpaste at all.

Even Paul Harvey got into the act some time ago. In one of his national broadcasts he told the tale -- with only a few chuckles -- of the cure for baldness he had been told; having the bald plate licked daily

by a bovine.

This falls into the realm of lucky rabbits feet -- if the foot is so lucky, why isn't it still on the rabbit? Ergo, if being licked by a cow daily is so beneficial to hair growth, why isn't the cow's tongue hairy?

But human beings have been concerned since time immemorial with balding.

One belief states that ancient Egyptians wore wigs thousands of years ago to disguise their balding. Supposedly Julius Caesar was so upset by his premature balding that he pressured the Roman Senate to pass special laws that enabled him to wear his sacred crown of laurel leaves 24 hours a day.

Another popular tale is of King Louis XIV who started balding at the age of 35 and had a wig made for himself.

According to the legend, his concern with his baldness reached a point where only his personal barber was allowed to see him without the wig; Louis took it off only when the curtains were drawn around his royal bed in the evening.

Then, each morning, a small, casual wig was passed carefully through the curtains so the king

could rise and start his day.

While recent movies have portrayed bald or balding men in a more "Macho" light -- who can forget Yul Brynner in the Magnificent Seven, or Telly Savalas as Kojack -- publicity has not always been so kind.

After all, who was the villain in Superman -- bald-headed Lex Luthor, that's who. We'll never know

if Popeye had hair; he never appeared without his sailor's cap firmly intact . . . but his moocher companion, Wimpy, was seen often with his plate as clean as his pockets.

Scientists have finally divided baldness into two groups -- male pattern Alopecia is the clinical term for hereditary or genetically produced baldness. Note here, however, that the term "male pattern" refers to the role that the male hormone androgen plays in balding, not the fact that only men can go bald, since this is not the case at all.

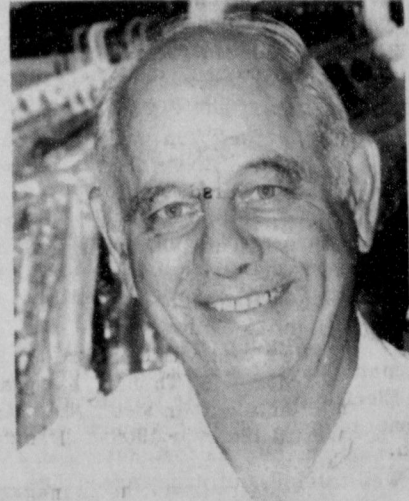
If baldness isn't caused by male pattern alopecia, it falls into the category of alopecia areata, which means hair loss in patches.

This type of baldness is connected with stress or trauma and is a psychosomatic disorder rather than an organic disease.

While there is another popular belief that baldness is determined by the males on the mother's side of the family, this isn't necessarily so. Ask any good livestock breeder. They'll tell you what you can expect from genes inherited from sire or dam -- but they can't tell you with any reasonable certainty which traits will show up from which side.

Since hair -- color, thickness, amount -- is determined by genes, then if there is a genetic pattern for baldness anywhere in a family's ancestry and it is inherited, baldness will follow, regardless of who that particular gene comes from.

Why does hair fall out? One must first look at how hair grows. There are three phases which every

hair in our head goes through.

First there is the anagen phase. This is the growth phase and lasts from three to five years with the hair growing an average of about half an inch per month.

The second part of a hair's cycle is called the catagen phase. This is the resting stage and it usually lasts for about 9 or 10 days.

During this period, the blood supply to the hair root is shut off and the root itself decreases in size.

The final phase in the cycle is the telogen phase. It is in this period where all growth stops. Then the hair will either fall out on its own or be pushed out by a new hair growing in the same follicle.

Either way, it's important to remember that a certain amount of hair fall is natural. Just because there are some hairs left in your brush in the morning doesn't mean that some day you're going to be another Telly Savalas.

Human hair does not operate in a synchronized cycle of anagen/catagen/telogen. Otherwise, we would shed all of our hair at once and regrow it in cycles. Each hair in our head operates according to its own cycle.

Normally there is an approximate 5-year cycle. Hair grows, stops growing, falls out and is replaced.

Further, not everyone has the same amount of hair. Either Caucasians are the hairiest species and it differs even there.

Blonds have some 140,000 or so hairs, brunettes have around 110,000 and redheads, whose hair is coarser, usually have between 80,000 and 90,000 scalp hairs.

When a person goes bald, hair falls out as usual when its life span is complete. It is then replaced by a new hair that may only last a normal lifetime, perhaps only a year or two.

Then that hair is replaced by another that lasts an even shorter time, and so on, and so on . . .

Each generation of hair of a balding man lasts a shorter and

shorter period of time. Eventually the hair follicles atrophy as well as the sebaceous glands which lead on to the hair follicles to lubricate the skin and hair.

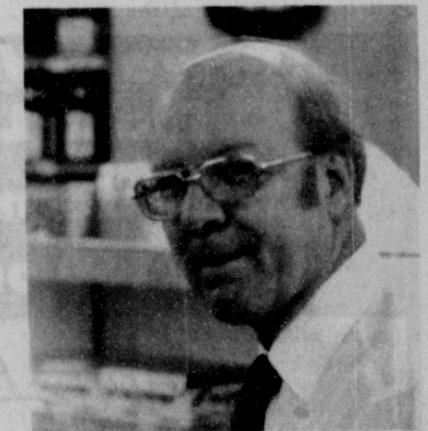
Perhaps the most important point to be made is that as of the present time, there is nothing that will permanently stop or reverse male pattern alopecia.

Hair follicles which are genetically programmed to stop growing hair will eventually stop growing hair, regardless of what kinds of treatments are utilized to reverse or stop the process.

While the Upjohn Company has created some excitement with a drug called Minoxidil, which they claim promotes hair regrowth, the FDA refuses to give approval for marketing since it is still unclear whether side effects of the drug that appeared during testing will occur as often or more often if the drug is used widely.

The drug is already available in Canada, Belgium and France. Upjohn wants to market it under the tradename of Rogaine.

Although the chief side effects reported from test subjects were skin reactions such as rashes, there were also reported incidents of

chest pains, heart palpitations and edema, which is the abnormal collection of fluids in the tissues or cavities of the body.


Although it isn't entirely believed that these more serious reactions were due the drug, it has been recommended by the FDA that a broader study be carried out after Minoxidil is marketed.

Critics of Minoxidil declare that the treatment has been overated; that a very small percentage of people are likely to experience hair growth from using the drug and the cost of the treatment may be prohibitive.

Either way, it is probably safe to say that there is still no proven, effective way of chemically promoting hair regrowth.

So, what's a bald-headed man to do? There is always the Bald-headed Men of America Association in Morehead, N. Carolina. Yes that's "Morehead", with less hair.



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Perryton man honored in June life saving action

A Perryton man was honored with a resolution of appreciation from North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. recently for his action in saving the life of an independent electrician in June.

Marc Padgett, a journeyman lineman for the electric cooperative, was recognized for his efforts during an awards ceremony held by NP Electric.

Padgett used protective gear and a NP Electric bucket truck to rescue Charles William Rigdon, an employee of a Perryton electrical company, from the top of an oil field line pole.

Rigdon had been working on a bushing at the top of the pole when he came into contact with a 7,200 volt line. He was knocked unconscious and remained dangling from the pole by his safety belt.

Ray Brewer, an employee of the oil company who owned the lines, called NP Electric and requested dispatch of a bucket truck. Padgett was in the area and responded to the summons.

Dicky Holdeman and DeWayne Armstrong, fellow employees with Rigdon, had already disconnected line fuses in the area to stop the current to the line.

Upon arrival at the scene, Padgett instructed one of the men on

operation of the bucket ground controls, then donned his protective gear and proceeded to perform the pole-top rescue.

Padgett assisted Rigdon, who had regained consciousness, then laid him over the bucket, released the safety belt and lowered him to the ground.

Rigdon was then placed into a vehicle for observation until an ambulance arrived. He was then transported to Ochiltree General Hospital and later to Amarillo.

"Mr. Rigdon was fortunate in many ways," a spokesman for NP Electric stated. "He was fortunate not to have lost his life due to electrocution; he was fortunate that a well-trained and experienced lineman such as Marc was in the area to assist; he was fortunate to have recovered so well, and return home after a brief stay in the hospital."

The electric cooperative holds regularly scheduled safety meetings for both employees and the public.

Padgett has been recognized by the board of directors of NP Electric Cooperative and has been nominated for a Life Saving Award by the company.

New Cardiac Pacing Technology May Offer Hope for Other Benefits

People who are losing their mental sharpness may one day benefit from a new type of heart pacemaker.

Although there is only a small body of research to substantiate it, a number of doctors believe rate-responsive pacemakers may improve a patient's mental outlook by increasing blood-flow to the brain. The units automatically adjust heart rate to activity levels and the heart, in-turn, sends more blood to the brain.

In addition to giving rate-responsive units such as the new Activitrix pacemaker to new patients, some doctors say it also may be appropriate to provide them to current fixed-rate single-chamber pacemaker wearers.

A typical case is the man who was fitted with a fixed-rate single-chamber pacemaker seven years ago. After a while the patient noticed a tendency to become fatigued. Eventually, he was unable to make it through the workday without a nap. He also was unable to jog without pain in his legs.

Within two days after having his fixed-rate pacemaker replaced with an Activitrix rate-responsive unit, the man did five miles on a treadmill.
