



Health

In Texas, more than 3000 babies born alive die during infancy. One reason is that appropriate maternity care has not been readily available to many preganant women who cannot afford medical care and who have special medical problems.

Now, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) has extended maternity services to many such women through contracts with 37 clinics and other health care providers across the state.

For the Texas Panhandle area, Panhandle Health Care Coalition has been named to serve these women.

Steve Walters at Panhandle Health Care Coalition said, "Our contract with the state is to provide prenatal care, delivery, and follow-up services to certain women whose infants are at risk of being born unhealthy because the mothers can't afford care and have medical problems that affect the health of the baby. We especially need to serve women whose pregnancies are medically 'high risk' by finding and treating their problems early to avoid long-term health problems, or even death, of their babies.

As part of the Indigent Health Care package of laws passed by the Texas Legislature in 1985, the Maternal and Infant Health Improvement Act expands public health services to include some poor pregnant women who are not eligible for welfare but are

found to be medically "high risk". Eligibility requirements for MIHIA services are based on the family's level of income and the presence of a high-risk medical conditon. 'Although not every pregnant woman can qualify for special services under this program," Steve Walters said, "We urge all pregnant women to begin prenatal care as soon as they

know they are pregnant."



Health

In Texas, more than 3000 babies born alive die during infancy. One reason is that appropriate maternity care has not been readily available to many preganant women who cannot afford medical care and who have special medical problems.

Now, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) has extended maternity services to many such women through contracts with 37 clinics and other health care providers across the state.

For the Texas Panhandle area, Panhandle Health Care Coalition has been named to serve these women.

Steve Walters at Panhandle Health Care Coalition said, "Our contract with the state is to provide prenatal care, delivery, and follow-up services to certain women whose infants are at risk of being born unhealthy because the mothers can't afford care and have medical problems that affect the health of the baby. We especially need to serve women whose pregnancies are medically 'high risk' by finding and treating their problems early to avoid long-term health problems, or even death, of their babies."

As part of the Indigent Health Care package of laws passed by the Texas Legislature in 1985, the Maternal and Infant Health Improvement Act expands public health services to include some poor pregnant women who are not eligible for welfare but are found to be medically "high risk".

Eligibility requirements for MIHIA services are based on the family's level of income and the presence of a high-risk medical conditon. 'Although not every pregnant woman can qualify for special services under this program," Steve Walters said, "We urge all pregnant women to begin prenatal care as soon as they know they are pregnant."







Department of Highways and Public Transportation

Missouri Petroleum Products Inc. of St. Louis, Missouri, is the apparent low bidder to seal coat 115 miles of eastern Texas Panhandle highways, including sections of three Farm to Market Roads in Hansford County.

Missouri Petroleum's \$856,959 bid was the lowest of nine submitted to the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission on the entire 115-mile seal coat project.

FM 1262 will be seal coated from State Highway 15 north 15.9 miles to the Oklahoma State line. A seal coat also will be placed on FM 2387, from SH 15 north and west 9.6 miles to FM 1261, and on FM760, trom SH 15 north 5 miles.

DHT Amarillo District Engineer A.L. McKee said the seal coat work is planned to be started and completed this summer. McKee said a seal coataplacement of asphalt and rock-preserves and protects the riding surface of a highway and extends its useful life.

Henry L. "Lou" Gallegly of Dalhart will be the department's resident engineer directly supervising the seal coat work.

The Federal Highway Administration estimates that each million dollars of highway construction directly generates an equivalent of 23.7 jobs.





Hypertension

According to the American Heart Association, one in four people will have high blood pressure, and only one in every three who have high blood pressure will be aware of it.

Hypertension has been cited by the Texas Health Department as a major problem in Texas. The Texas cardiovascular death rate was 3.83. The Panhandle had the second highest cardiovascular death rate in the state.

Hypertension is one of the controllable risk factors for cardiovascular disease. It contributes significantly to death from heart disease, strokes, and renal disease.

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has extended high blood pressure treatment services to low income persons through contracts with 37 clinics and other health care providers

across the state.

For the Texas Panhandle area, the Panhandle Health Care Coalition has been named to provide service for this population of the 26 Panhandle coun-

Steve Walters at Panhandle Health Care Coalition said, "Our contract with the state is to screen, provide treatments, and to educate people with high blood pressure who cannot afford the cost of medical care."

As part or the Indigent Health Care package of laws passed by the Texas Legislature in 1985, the Primary Health Care Services Act expands public health services to include some per sons who are not eligible for welfare but are in need of treatment.

Eligibility requirements for PHC are based ont he family's level of income and on diagnosis of hypertension.

"Although not every person can qualify for special services under this program." Mr. Walters said "we urge everyone to have their blood pressure taken and stay on a treatment plan as prescribed by a physician."

MOBIL BREAST IMAGING CENTER (MBIC) to visit Hansford Hospital on Tuesday, March 17th.


