in it the best that is in me." The plaque also bears the company's sesquicentennial medallion in sculptured brass.

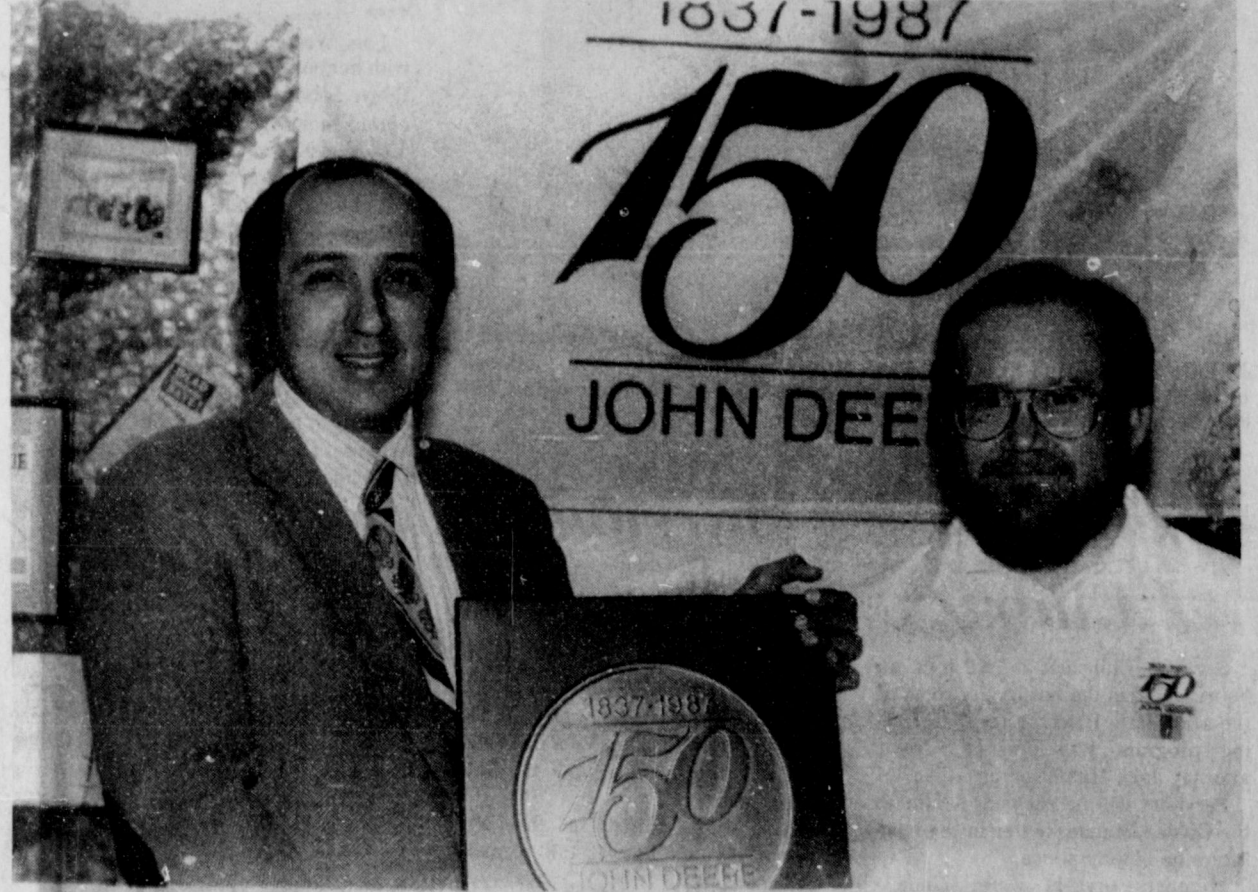

His future plans include, "running for Mayor in 1988!"

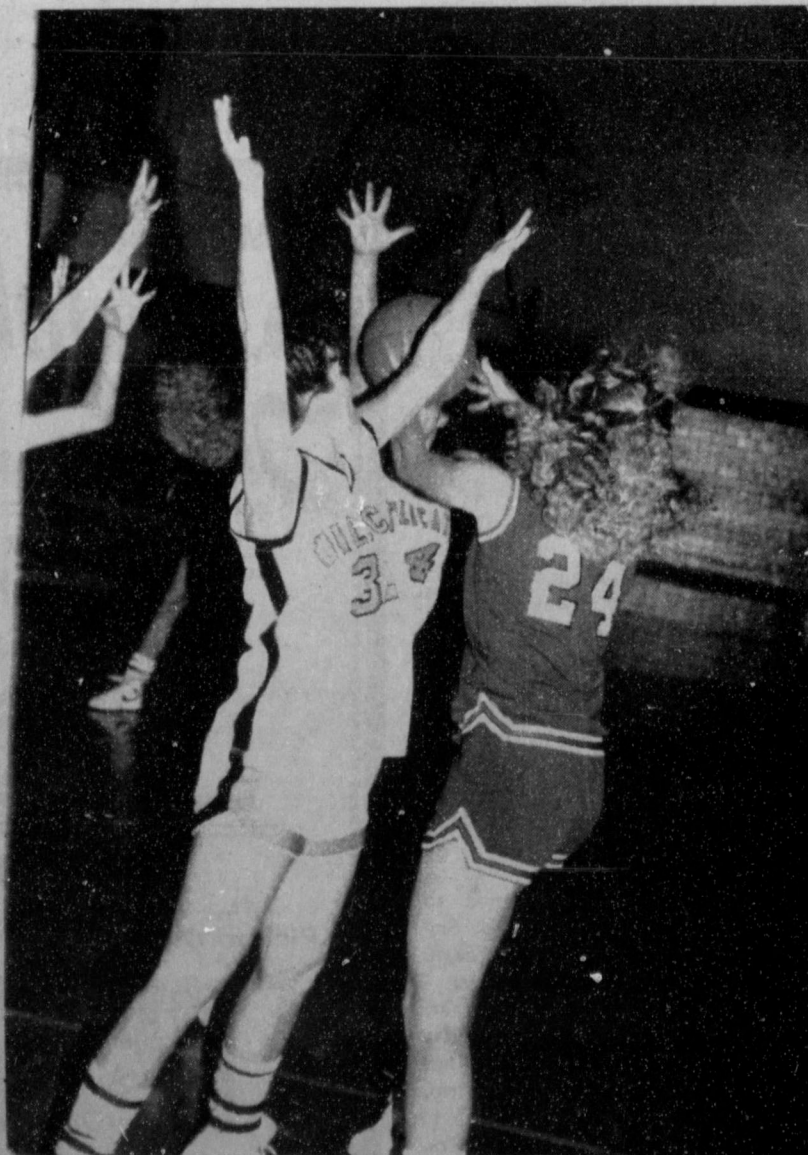
Lynxettes drop thriller to classy Wildcats 41-38!

MOBIL BREAST IMAGING CENTER (MBIC) to visit Hansford Hospital on Tuesday, March 17th.

Area women will have an opportunity to have screening mammograms performed at a reduced fee of \$60.00 (regular cost is \$127.70.), which is more than one-half savings from the regular charge.

The \$60.00 charge reflects the cost of leasing the Mobil Breast Imaging Center, Radiologist fees and supplies. This fee is due in full at the hospital business office prior to the test being done.

It is recommended individuals wishing to have this test performed, contact their physician if they have questions or concerns about the need for the test.

The project is aimed at educating the public about breast cancer, its detection and treatment, and encouraging women to take advantage of available breast cancer screening methods.

AG USE UPDATE WORKSHOP

I am chief appraiser for Dallam Central Appraisal District in the northwest corner of the Texas Panhandle.

I attended the Sixth Annual Conference of the Texas Association of Appraisal Districts at Austin, February 13, and 14, 1987. One of the several workshops I attended that was especially interesting to me was the Ag Use Update Workshop presented to Troy Sloan.

Troy makes his home in Spearman, Texas and is currently chief appraiser of Harley County in the Texas Panhandle. He knows appraisal work from the ground floor up through years of experience in the field. He speaks up and tells it like it is. This doesn't always make people happy but that's life.

Those of you that don't know Troy won't know how to appreciate this. He walked up on the stage, looked out at the audience filling the meeting room, removed his coat and tie, placed them on a chair behind him, reached down and picked up his hat and put it on. He told us he was a farmer and a rancher and proud of it. He said he was more comfortable wearing his hat and in shirt sleeves. In rural West Texas a hat is almost as important as a pair of pants.

Troy spoke on Agricultural Use Valuation of land, recent changes in the land market, and current trends in the land market. He reminded us that land is purchased for one of four reasons. It is purchased for its income producing potential, for its investment potential to produce a future benefit or income, for consumption as a place to hunt, fish, camp, etc., and simply for pride of ownership. All Texans like to own land. Troy then reminded us of Rule 161.1, Valuation of Open-Space and Agricultural Land, page 4, sub-

chapter D, Sec. 23.51, where we are to add the phrase "the year before" to the definition of net to land; and change "this" to "the". (4) "Net to land" means the average annual net income derived from the use of open-space land that would have been earned from the land during the five year period preceding this year before the appraisal. This means we are to use the years 1981 through 1985 for our ag budgets for 1987 ag values. The cap rate for 1987 is 13.25%. This may have a tendency in some counties to raise the ag values in a time of economic stress. Ag values should be looked at very carefully before they are raised or lowered. In many areas, ag values and market values are getting very close to each other. The day may come when the land owner will ask to be taxed on market rather than ag value in some counties. Troy mentioned the Conservation Reserve Program or as it is known the CRP program which will not affect the 1987 budgets but will have to be considered in 1988. This program is firming up the dry land values in some areas of West Texas and creating some hope for the land owner. Appraisers should find out about this program in 1987 so they can use the information in 1988.

Changes in the land market have been varied over the state in the past year mainly because of the economy. The income potential has all but disappeared from land sales as a reason for purchasing. Investment incentive in land is very low at present. Pride of ownership is weak in many places because of the economy and the potential of making more money in other ways. Around the populous areas the consumptive market is holding fairly stable because of the need for recreation.

The present trends in the land market sales show to be weak in the most areas of the state. In many cases we are seeing people that have been on the land for two and three generations or more losing their land for all types of reasons. In West Texas, we are looking at a foreclosure market in most instances. We are seeing land under as many as four liens being foreclosed by the first lien holders.

In conclusion the land market is weak over the state but values are more realistic from a farm production point of view. Farm production has never been efficient enough to pay for \$1500 per acre land.

As for Ag values, I have to agree with Troy, when I am forced to look back 6 years to arrive at a present day value to use. I too feel I am ignoring all I know about valuing income property, especially in a period of time when everything is changing so rapidly. In farming especially, we have changed from a program of planting fence to fence to a payment in-kind program, paid diversions, etc. I, like Troy and others, feel the five year owner-operator budget should be discarded for something more apropos to the changing times, maybe a lease budget based on the prior three years before the tax year.

I would close by saying nothing is permanent but change.

Letter to the Editor

Is this happening in your community?

Due to recent circumstances in our rural community, Archer City, Texas, our attention has been drawn to the questionable sanctions imposed upon the doctors of rural areas, in particular by the Texas Medical Foundation's Peer Review Organization. The criterion set down by this organization is so stringent that no physician could possibly be in compliance with all aspects included.

These sanctions in many cases will result in the closing of many rural hospitals, leaving a large percentage of our population without immediate medical care.

I am interested in finding out how many other communities share our same problems.

Only by cooperation of all Texans and their legislators can something be done to rectify this situation. Many of the legislators are aware of the problem and are investigating the workings of the Federally Funded Texas Medical Foundation.

Due to the stigma this imposes upon the physician the public is not always aware of the situation until it is too late.

We're fighting for our doctor, R.D. Schlomach, M.D. and our hospital, Archer County Hospital. I hope you will be equally as concerned because this could also be pertinent to you, your physician, and your hospital.

The number of hospitals closed January 1, 1986 through December 31, 1986 is 25. A large number of Texas doctors have been sanctioned and many more are waiting official sanctions. If the hospital in your county and/or town are presently being threatened, or any of the doctors are being investigated and/or sanctioned I would like to hear from you.

TAKE HEED-DON'T SPEED! According to the National Safety Council, deaths due to motor vehicle accidents decreased 1 percent in 1985 from the 1984 levels, even though miles traveled per driver increased for the fifth year in a row. One might logically

assume that deaths would rise due to the increase in miles traveled, but a combination of factors has led to a drop in deaths, instead. These factors include: public awareness and better enforcement of drunk-driving penalties, an increase in the number of states advocating mandatory seat-belt usage, better commercial driver training, and better enforcement of the national 55-mph speed limit on all highways. Even so, excessive speeding is still the number-one killer on our highways today. In fact, it accounts for nearly 40 percent of all highway fatalities. Your chances of being killed in a traffic accident increase tremendously as you increase your speed. For example, if you're following the 55-mph speed limit, your chances of being killed in an accident are about 1 in 31, but if you're traveling at 61 to 70 mph, your chances rise rapidly to 1 in 7. Not very good odds, are they? You've got to be bonkers to ignore the facts by speeding on the road!

MORE HINTS FOR SAFER DRIVING:
Adjust your speed to road conditions. When visibility is poor or the roads are slick and slippery, posted speed limits may not be safe.
Reduce your speed when going around sharp curves, when cresting a hill-whenver you don't have a clear view of the road ahead of you.

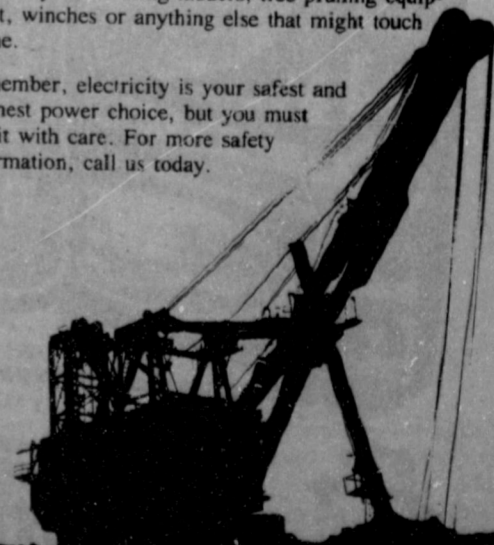
