Marvin Jones accepts reappointment . . .

Hansford man on state tax board

When Senate Bill 621 -- better known as the Peveto bill which created county-wide appraisal districts -- went into effect in 1980, a State Property Tax Board was created to help implement the new law.

Hansford county's Marvin Jones, a long-time county farmer, was appointed to that board shortly after its creation by then governor Bill Clements.

Ironically, Clements was in office again when reappointment time came up and Jones was re-appointed to the non-paying state office for a second 6-year term in late October.

It's become a special labor for the Hansford county farmer who

spends about a month a year working for the special board which oversees the states 254 appraisal districts.

That month of work is scattered over the calendar year with odd moments here and there to answer letters and phone calls, time spent studying the preponderance of literature necessary to do an effective job and, of course, trips to Austin to meet with the board as they handle the various tasks assigned them.

The intent of the Peveto bill was to set up the State Board with equal geographical representation, but Jones finds himself the only farmer on the board as well as the only member north of Denison.

Other members of the State Property Tax Board are from Ediburg, College Station, Beaumont and Houston.

"A lot of work I do I manage to do right here on the phone or reading the literature I get every day," he states.

It makes for a busy life for the Hansford farmer. Even now at the age of 67, he maintains active schedule, working his farm and taking care of his duties on the special state board.

In addition to that, he and his wife, Ruth Ann, also manage to find the time to work on a restoration project of an old fort over in Hutchinson county with a couple of friends.

A quiet, studied country gentleman, Jones' background would seem to lend itself more to his work on the state board than his active farming interests.

He holds a degree in journalism from Baylor University. That's where he met Ruth Ann.

A native of Hull-Daisetta near Liberty -- which is located between Beaumont and Houston -- Jones found himself at the other end of the state when Ruth Ann's father, a farmer in Ochiltree county, asked him to help with a harvest one year.

"That was 42 years ago," he smiles. "I enjoyed it and I've never

Overall 5 percent given . . . City workers get pay raise

An overall five percent pay increase was granted city employees by Spearman city councilmen Tuesday evening, concluding a month-long study of the city's pay plan by an outside analyst firm.

The overall increase translates into a total annual wage increase of \$21,648 against the 1987-88 budget. This figure had already been budgeted pending the outcome of the study.

While the overall raise is five percent, departments within the city received a varying amount of increase, ranging from no raise at all to a high of 11.6 percent.

The highest percentage increase came in administration where an 11.6 percent raise was given. This was mainly to bring the city secretary's wages in line with wages paid for the same position in other area communities.

"The intent of the study was to determine where we (the city) were out of line on wages -- either too high or too low," notes city manager Jim Murray. "If we are to attract and keep quality employees, it's extremely important that we be competitive in the job market, both among other area governments and in the private sector as well."

The Spearman Police Department received an overall increase of 7.6 percent while the street

department received a raise of 7 percent for the upcoming year.

Other wage increases ranged on down to 1.4 percent at the Utility department while some departments were allocated no raise in the realignment of the city's pay plan.

"What this does is unfreeze the pay plan for merit increases," reports Murray. "Now each employee will be eligible for an increase at their annual anniversary date if they are not already at the top end of their pay grade."

The pay increases go into effect with the current pay period which began this Monday.

In other action, city councilmen agreed to a settlement with High Plains Natural Gas Company on a cost of service increase for the supplier of the city's gas.

Spearman became one of three member cities to ratify the settlement which was reached through negotiations with the supplier and a special steering committee com-

posed of representatives from each member government.

Spearman, Perryton and Higgins have already ratified the plan. Booker and Perryton officials will meet later this month to discuss the proposal.

The negotiated settlement calls for a cost of service fee from High Plains of \$.895 per mcf (thousand cubic feet) of natural gas supplied to the city and is guaranteed for the next 18 months.

In addition to the cost of service increase, the settlement also calls for an allowance of 3.5 cents per mcf over the next 12 months to allow High Plains to recoup their expenses in seeking the rate hike.

The new rate will be reflected on bills mailed out for December payment, notes Murray.

City fathers also made revenue sharing expenditures to the Golden Spread Senior Citizen's group and to Families in Action official with agreements considered in Tuesday evening's meeting.

The Spearman Lynxette harriers leave at noon today (Thursday) for the rarified atmosphere of state cross country competition after taking a second place finish at the regional meet this past weekend in Lubbock.

The Spearman girls placed just behind Nazareth in the regional 2-mile cross country run while Wall, another class AA district winner, placed third.

The Spearman harriers were in competition with 17 other district class AA winners and a total of 120 runners competed in the regional meet.

An executive closed door meeting will be held by the Hansford County Hospital District tonight (Thursday) to discuss possible lawsuits against debtors and to discuss department head evaluations.

The meeting will open at 7 p.m. tonight in the board room of the hospital in Spearman.

October financial reports on both the operation of the hospital and the Hansford Manor will be presented by HCHD administrator All La Rochelle.

Board members will also look at the possible purchase of typewriters for the hospital.

A re-evaluation of salaries is also listed on the agenda.

That race will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday on the College Golf Course in Georgetown.

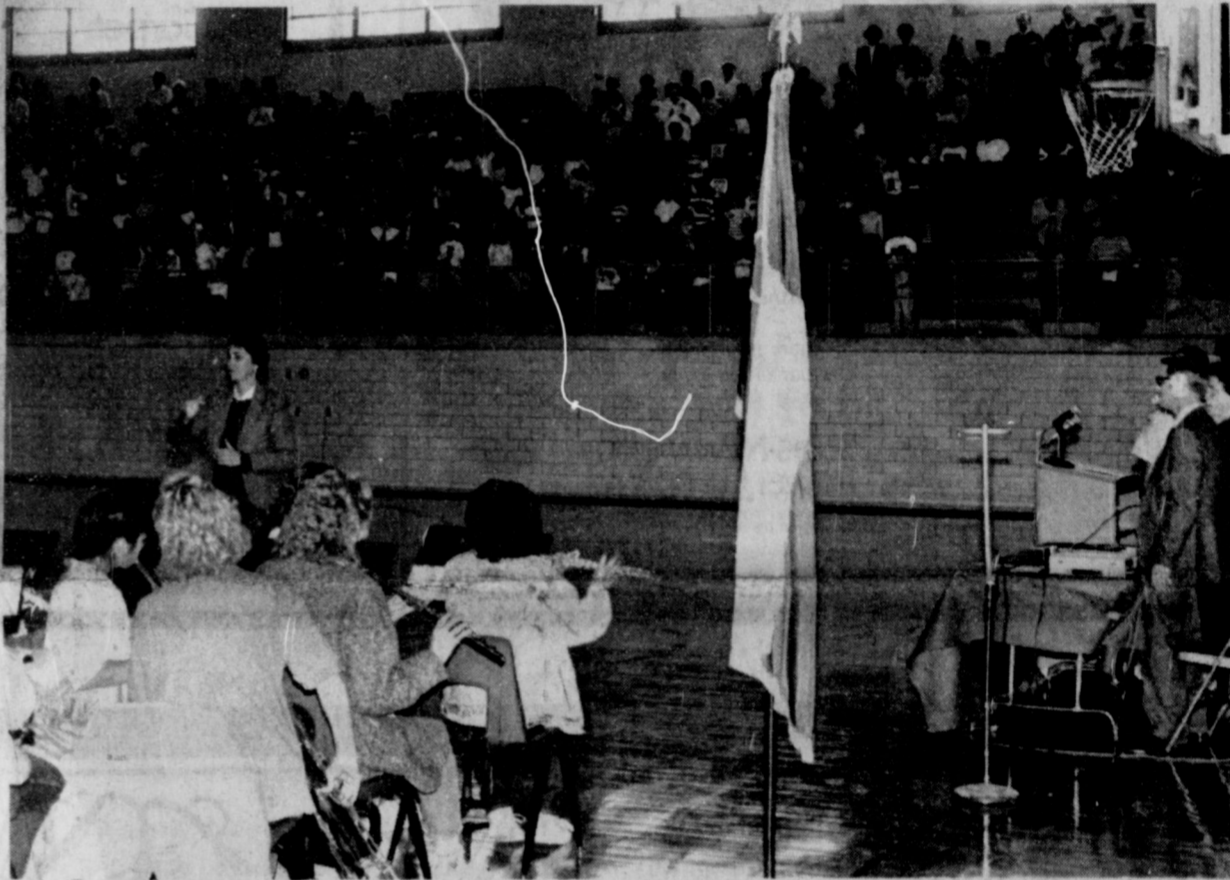
Study Club hosts craft show

County confirms election returns

Election returns from the Nov. 3 amendment and referenda ballot were canvassed by the Hansford county commissioners' court at their regular meeting Monday in Spearman.

Election results were certified by the court and turned over to Hansford county clerk Amelia Johnson for forwarding to the State of Texas.

In other action, commissioner's designated the front door of the courthouse -- the main street entrance -- as the official place to hold foreclosure sales.

Road easements were granted to Phillips Petroleum and to General Telephone.

A letter requesting removal of gates across a pair of county roads in southwest Hansford county on land owned by Jack Hart was ordered by the commissioners court.

Hansford commissioners also agreed to send \$300 to Austin to help with the State Capitol Building restoration. A paving stone listing Hansford County will be placed on the walkway to the capitol building.

Commissioners also decided to seek bids for a new boiler for the courthouse to replace a 17-year old unit which is leaking.

Estimates for repair of the existing boiler came in at around \$4,000 reports county judge R.L. McClellan.

Spearman's season opens with both varsity and JV boys and girls crews playing host to Perryton in the competition gym at Spearman junior high. Tip off time for JV games is 5 p.m.

SISD board awards bid on vehicle

Bids on a new station wagon and monthly gasoline purchases were awarded Monday evening by the Spearman ISD board of trustees.

Low bid on the new vehicle was awarded to Gillaspie Chevrolet of Spearman while low bid for monthly gasoline purchases was turned in by Consumer Sales. Only two bids were received for each item.

Gillaspie's bid was \$12,966.94 for outright purchase or \$12,566.94 with trade in.

The only other bid was turned in by Crawford Motor Company and was \$14,011 without trade or \$13,511 with trade in.

Gasoline bid was awarded to Golden Spread Sales of Spearman with a bid of \$.82 per gallon. The only other bid came from Davis and Davis Gulf with a bid of \$.831 per gallon.

In other business Monday evening Spearman school officials discussed the cross country budget and the FFA budget for the current school year.

Trips to Lubbock and Georgetown were approved for the cross county girls team as was an overnight trip to the FFA National Convention by a group of Spearman FFA members.

Despite all these remarkable achievements, man has yet to figure out how to win even a minor tete-a-tete with his wife.

The other day, while innocently reading a book and minding my own business, my wife comes up to me while fixing her hair. "Well, don't I look like a witch?" she asked.

Friends, that's a loaded question. A wise man would have ignored it. But you know me better, don't you?

"No, honey, you don't even make a good witch," was my instant reply. Then she hit me --

Does that mean we should tell them, "Thank You?"

The latest joke making the round asks the question, "How do you get a registered representative out of a tree?"

The answer -- you cut the noose. Since the plunge of the stock market a few weeks back, there has been a great deal of speculation about the state of the economy.

Louis Ruykeyser, the dean of PBS's Wall Street Week, had his usual verbal barb to cast at the national media, slamming them for their pretentiousness and obvious lack of knowledge on the subject.

He pointed out -- with a special graphic on the screen -- that the market index, once adjusted for inflation, has yet to reach the peak it had set in 1929 during the first famous "Black Monday".

They have to be applauded for at last seeing and admitting to at least a small bit of indiscretion.

Some time ago, in a front page article, we had one of those unfortunate typos where we misspelled a person's name.

Mike Garnett, president of the Spearman school board, was the recipient of that error. His name was cast as Barnett rather than Garnett.

Mike was rather pointed in letting me know about the mistake. When I walked into the board meeting, he looked up and said, "Ah, Mr. Barrett, it's nice to have you here."

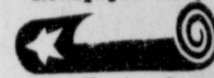
The promotion is in recognition of his combined performance in academics, military leadership, and athletics. He is currently a freshman at the Academy.

looked back." But farming has been good for the Hansford resident. Jones has managed to raise three children and get them all through college working a section of land just south of Spearman.

"Farming's been good to me," he notes. "Not all the time, but enough of the time."

It's Jones' first-hand knowledge of agri-industry in Texas which has proven as strong influence on the state board.

That, coupled with his ability to communicate and to put together effective presentations, has put the Texas farmer in a little more equitable position as far as ad valorem taxing goes.

The task of setting up the then-new appraisal districts across the state in the early 1980's was a gargantuan task and a task ably handled by Jones and the State Property Tax Board.

Those early years were spent writing and rewriting manuals for the appraisal districts as well as setting up requirements for chief appraisers.

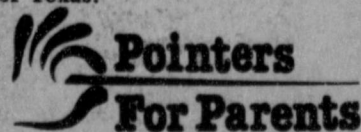
While Panhandle residents have had their troubles with the implementation of the specially-created districts, Jones points out that things went much more smoothly here than in other parts of the state.

When re-appointment time came up this fall, Jones considered not accepting. After urgings from friends and calls from across the state, however, he decided to go ahead for another 6-year term.

"It's a matter of representation," he notes. "I was concerned that there might not be another farmer appointed and that another representative might not come from the Northern region of the state."

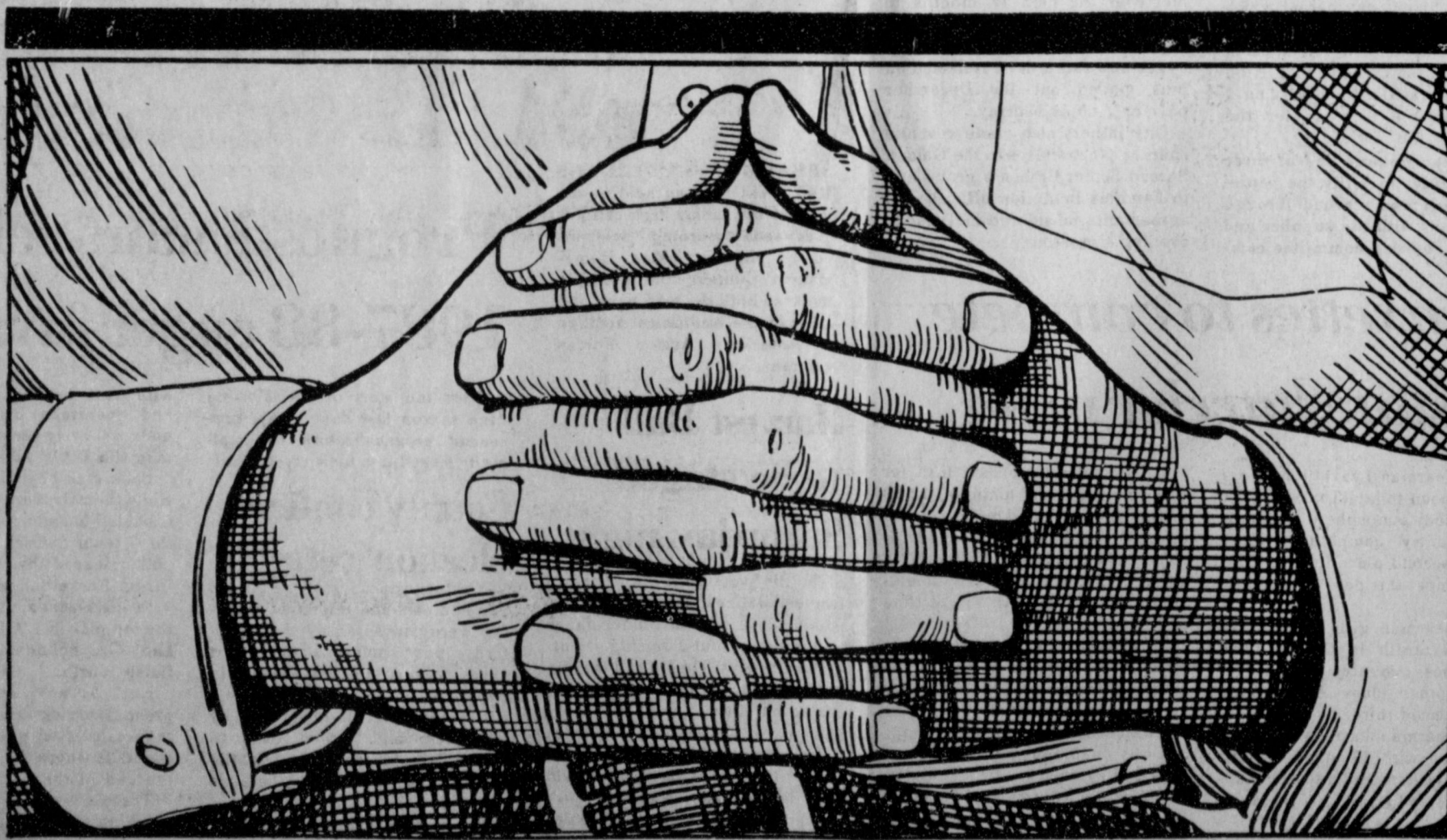

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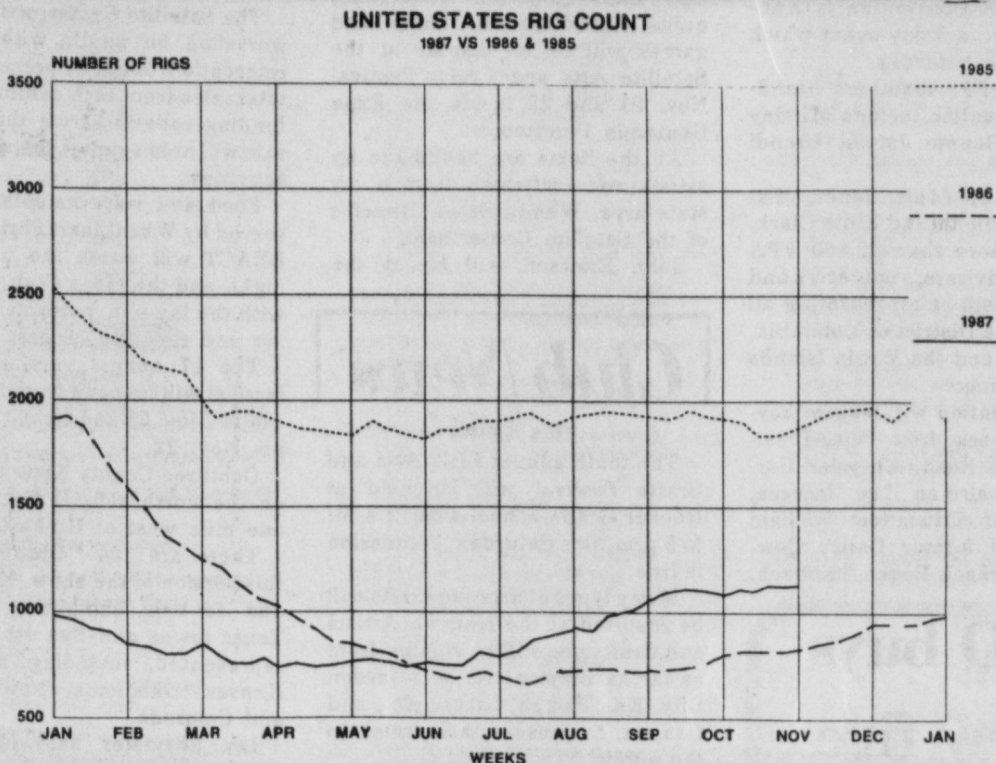

OIL & GAS REPORT



Natural gas can remain an abundant, cheap and environmentally attractive fuel in coming years, but its low price has ended the incentive to explore for new gas, according to an Arthur Andersen and Co. study.

Richard Adkerson, and Andersen managing director, says the sharp decline in drilling heightens concern about future production levels.

The study says deregulation of the gas industry has created uncertainty and drove pipelines away from longer term contracts and into the spot market.

The study also notes that fuel-switchable markets, which can readily change from natural gas to oil, have brought permanent changes to the gas industry. About one-third of both the industrial and electric generation market can switch from one fuel to another at virtually no cost in a matter of hours or days.

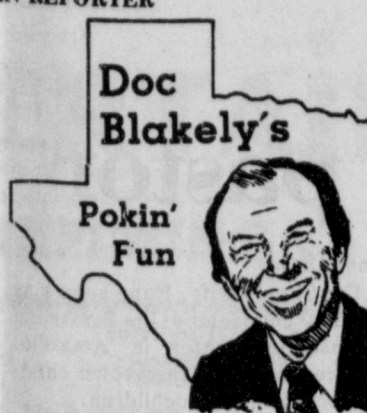



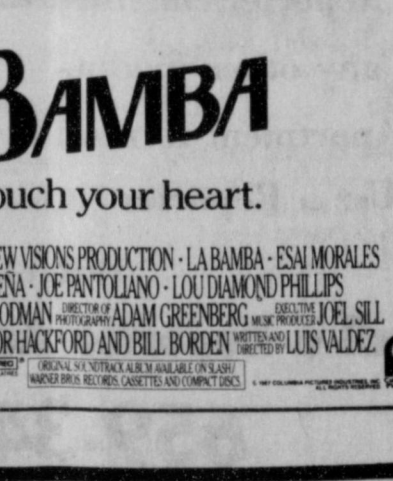
