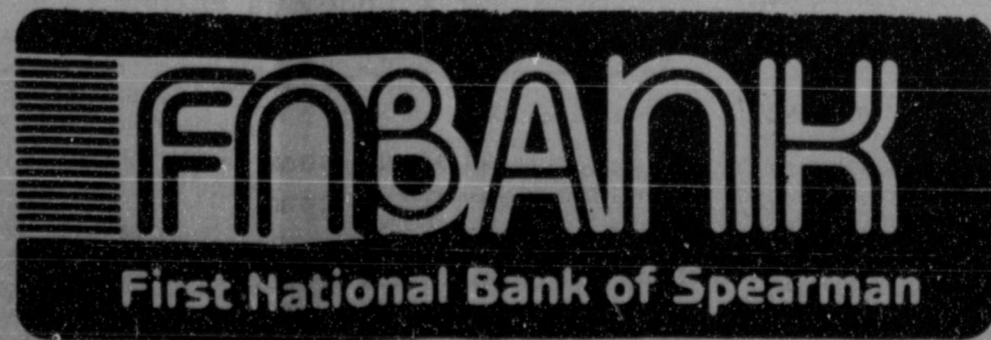

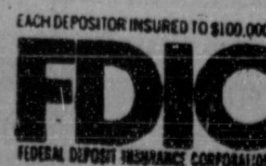

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$49.9 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that 1987 payments to date were down 6 percent as compared to payments to date made in March of last year.

Houston's check for \$8.2 million was the largest, bringing 1987 payments to date to \$35.9 million, down 6 percent from 1986. Dallas received

\$5.8 million for a 1987 total of \$26.4 million, down 3 percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$2.8 million pushed the 1987 total for the city to \$13.9 million, a decrease of 7 percent. Austin's check for \$2 million increased 1987 payments to \$10 million, down 8 percent. Fort Worth received \$1.8 million for a total of \$8.5 million this year, down 12 percent from 1986. El Paso's payment was for \$1.3 million bringing the 1987 total to

\$5.9 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$22.5 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's check was the largest for \$9.3 million with a 1987 total of \$42 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$8.6 million pushed this year's payments to \$39.3 million. Austin's Capital Metro received a check for \$2.2 million pushing 1987 payments to \$10.1 million. San

Antonio's VIA received \$1.4 million for a total of \$7.5 million in 1987. Fort Worth's MTA payment was for \$451,586, a 1987 total of \$2 million. Corpus Christi's MTA received \$407,403 pushing payments for this year to \$1.8 million.

March checks represent taxes collected on sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller by February 20.

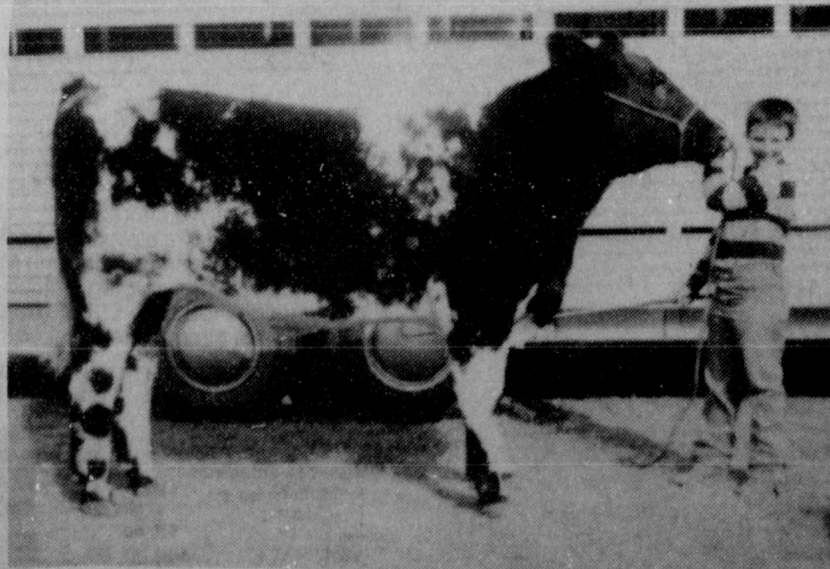
