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

Later, a press agent no doubt convinced him that his image needed a little work. He switched to a waistcoat, top hat, and rode a white horse in parades. He was a great role model but the style just never caught on with Japanese bronc busters.

But he did have a certain style about him. Remember the characteristic pose as he sat straightbacked with that dull expressionless stare? It was the same kind of look every father gives to his daughter's first date.

Then the war years brought chaos, defeat, humiliation. Post war years brought Honda, Mitsubishi, Omagoshamighty. It was a case of Buddha vs. Bubba.

Through it all, his highness stared straight ahead like a Sumo

wrestler who has just discovered that his loin cloth is not sanforized.

So here is one of the world's most famous leaders. How many of you can remember anything he said? Not just anything important, I'm talking anything. Smart guy. Some people can speak several languages. Hirohito could stare in all of them. A stare is seldom misquoted although it drove the court jesters to Hari Kari.

I've always suspected that just for kicks, the emperor was the source of the computerized voice messages in Japanese cars:

"Fasten sealt belts." "Door not closed."

Pearl Harbor."

"Take off shoes." "Make car payment."

Everyone agrees he was a gentle leader who worked for world peace. He lived a full, long life and died with dignity. He slipped away peacefully, his mission on earth complete as an aide whispered in his ear, "We just foreclosed on

Campus nominating committees and editors of the annual directory have included the names of these students based on their academic achievement, service to the com munity, leadership in extracurricular activities and potential for continued success.


