Ranchers May Dig Wells Under 1939 Program

College Station — Ranchmen hard put to supply range live-stock with plenty of drinking wa-ter will be able to drill wells the year with financial aid of the A AA, according to a recent announcement.

nouncement. The drilling or digging of wells as a conservation measure has been put back into the AAA's range program, George Slaughter, chairman of the Texas Agricultu-ral Conservation Committee, has assured. It had been announced earlier that this practice, which was included in the range pro-gram of the Southwest last year for the first time, would be left out in 1939. out in 1939.

This brings to four the num This brings to four the num-ber of watering-development pra-tices of the program, which pro-vides payment also for construc-tion of earthen tanks or reser-voirs, concrete or rubble mason-ry dams, and for development of inatural watering places such as seeps and springs.

Payment for drilling or dig-ging wells is \$2 a linear foot where the casing is not less than 4 inches in diameter, and \$1 where it is less than 4 inches, provided to a windmill or power pump is in-stalled and the wator is conveyed to a tank or storage reservoir.
