showed 48.5 percent of Panhandle received inquiries about anabolic steroids, 29 percent had seen

ducted by Drs. Paul S. Salva and George E. Bacon of the Depart ment of Pediatrics, Texas Tech
University Health Sciences CenUniversity Health Sciences Cen
ter, School of Medicine, Lubbock Anabolic steroids are com-
pounds derived from testosterone, a hormone, or prom testosterone cally to promote body growth They are legitimately used in the
treatment of certain types of anemia, leukemia and other con-
ditions, but ditions, but are taken by some
athletes to increase their body athletes to increase their body
strength and improve athletio performance. Synthetic growth
hormone also promotes body growth. It is appropriately used in helping children with a family
history of short stature achieve history of short stature achieve
average height. verag
Surva and Bacon limited their
survey to family physicians, gen-
eral practitioners and pediatri eral practitioners and pediatri-
cians practicing in a 41 -county
area encompassing both Lubboct
area encompassing both Lubbock
and Amarillo. Questionnaires were mailed to all members of the
Panhandle District Medical Society who identified themselve as falling within those three practice categories. One hundred
of 180 questionnalres were of 180
returned.
"The results of this pilot survey
suggest that there is definite
interest in and, more ominously, use of anabolic steroids among high school males," Salva and Bacon wrote. "Furthermore, interest in these substances apparently is not confined to people
athletics

Forty-eight of the 100 respondents reported at total of 213 to 225 inquiries about anabolic steroids. All inquiries were made by or for males, all but five of
whom were white. Twenty percent were considered serious.

Teenage males age 13 to 17
accounted for nearly half of the accounted for nearly half of the
total. Teenagers overwhelmingly were interested in steroids to help
