



Economic Side Of Our Foreign Policy Merits Careful Study

Robert E. Asher, until recently of the State Department, stated the broad objectives of the economic side of the Amercan Foreign policy as follows:

"We want economic conditions in the free world which will attract peoples and governments toward the Democratic system of political freedom, as opposed to totalitarian systems like Soviet Com-

That foreign aid had that design has been clear since the enunciation of the Marshall Plan at Harvard in 1947, This has cost the American taxpayer between and \$6.00 since then. The expenditure of these vast sums were supposed to bring us allies. In 1954, it can be said that its objectives have not been achieved. If anything, neutralism as between ourselves and Soviet Russia has been on the increase the world over, particularly among the countries we have aided. (In this connection, it ought not to be forgotten that our gifts to Soviet Russia during World War II came to at

least \$11,000,000,000.) Gifts are one phase of the problem. Another is the increasing emphasis on tariff reduction and upon changes in customs procedures. This can be in practice even greater gift than a credit under a program of aids. For instance, those funny little automobils that are beginning to appear on our roads, made in Great Brit ain and now being sold freely in the United States, can provide Great Britain with a better trade balance. It is trade not aid. Selling at a lower price than American cars, these bantams can seriously affect the American automobile market because they are non-competitively manufactured In fact, American capital is being exported to European countries to produce this odity using low-wage labor and less favorable working conditions.

Senator George Malone heads a committee of the Senate which is investigating this particular problem, especially the reship of American industry to war, should World War III occur. This investigation is of singular importance but has een overshadowed by a lot of nonsense. Mr. Asher makes a further point which could involve this country in a peculiar

tional scale. He said-"We have a special interest in the economic strength of our partners in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, and of the countries on the periphery of Soviet power. In the North Atlantic Treaty area we want economic conditions which will enable the NATO countries to devote a substantial part of their resources to the common military effort for as long as is necessary, without preventing improvements in their standards of living. In er we want to eliminate economic weaknesses that threaten political stability and

invite Communist subversion." Such a program is so enormous that it is hardly conceivable in practical terms. It would start with the stabilization of the currency of each of these countries as the only way to protect the economy of a country is to stabilize its currency and to increase values. The program is, of course, sound in principle even though too costly if the NATO countries are true allies. It is cheaper than having another war, which would cost at least as much as World War II, which was more than \$300,000,000,000 plus about \$100,000,000,000

for aid since. The the predicate of the problem is "do we have true allies?" At the Geneva Conference it does not appear that the principal counigies are true allies in the sense that there is any common program to which they all subscribe. It might even be said that they are our allies concerning Europe but not concerning Asia. But the two cannot be separated because they are one. This we and the European allies should have learned when Russia incorporated China in the Soviet Universal State while we were fuszing over the Ber-lin Airlift, which was a diversion. The danger then is that we expend our wealth

to no advantage. If Mr. Asher's program is official policy, it is necessary to discover what such a program will cost the American tax-payer, how it will affect our own economy, and how many years it is to last. It is not a program to run on a year by year basis. If it is continuous for decades, it can wreck the American economy by increasing public debt and keeping taxes at punitive rates, which they now are.

Texas City Rebuilds Rapidly After Blasts Seven Years Ago

TEXAS CITY, Texas. - Seven years ago when this city blew up and I blew with it, it never occurred to me to enter a bill of particulars for assorted bruises and contusions, chipped bones and a new coat shredded by shrapnel.

I was so glad to be alive after the second waterfront explosion, which found me in the dock area, that my aching back and bones seemed minor matters.

Now, when it seems highly probable that Uncle Sam will eventually foot the bill for the ghastly explosions in which more than 512 men, women and children died and thousands were injured, it's too late for me to do anything but rejoice that this community will receive some recompense for its grievous wounds.

Because a committee of Congress has found "The United States Government wholly responsible for the explosions and the resulting catastrophe at Texas City" on April 16 and 17, 1947, a bill has been introduced in Congress to pay death claims and to recompense citizens for personal and property damage.

This will not geturn the dead to their families, but it may make life a little easier for the many widowed and orphaned. It will not restore the permanently injured to health, but it will make the

future infinitely brighter for many. I have had an abiding interest and affection for this community ever since I, as a reporter, shared, in a small way, its fate. I grieved when its citizens were refused permission to sue the United States Government for damages. And I am jubiliant now that the government, through Congressional action, may do right by

Texas City. The Congressional committee appointed

to investigate the tragedy says it occurred "as a result of the explosion of an inherently dangerous material manufactured, packaged, shipped and controlled by the U. S. Government under the label of fertilizer."

Two ships, loaded with this fertilizer and destined for France by the U. S. Government, exploded 16 hours apart at Texas City docks, with hundreds killed, 3,500 injured and the waterfront levelled.

When I first saw Texas City, it was a shambles, its new high school gymnasium a vast morgue and its citizens dazed and grief-stricken. Now, seven years later, the city shows not one physical sign of the disaster, save only in the dock area.

Texas City has absorbed what might have been a death blow and has rebuilt, Once more this town of 23,000 is a boom ing port, the thirteenth largest in the nation, and a billion-dollar center of the oil and chemical industries.

Seven years after the tragedy, a fund of more than a million dollars, voluntarily contributed by persons from every part of the nation, has at last been exhausted in caring for the widowed, orphaned and badly injured.

"That fund did a world of good," says the committee of citizens who administered it. This group estimates, however, that about 100 permanently-injured victims of the explosions will always need outside financial care.

It is now hoped that under provisions of House Bill 8572 they eventually will receive it.

One of the few visible signs of the disaster in this proud, resourceful city is its Memorial Cemetery, where 63 unidentified victims of the disaster are buried.

With each new Communist speech members of the American delegation believe that Communist intransigence is nailed down even tighter. Thus Molotov insisting on making a second Korean speech, refusing to give way for Bidault who had not spoken on that subject, repeated all the old charges rehearsed at least a hundred times in previous conferences and at the United Nations.

In the American view this was still another nail in the Communist position already unyleidingly rigid. Outwardly, of course, the American view is that on Indochins we shall still go on trying to reconcile the position of the Communists at one extreme for a simple cease-fire and the Bidault proposals for a controlled armistice at the other extreme

No Westerner can tell what is being said within the Communist delegations but it is not hard to imagine them, or, at any rate, the Chinese, saying very much the same things about the rigidity of the American position. Certainly, there are some obvious embarrassments in that po-

GENEVA - This is likely to be the last The American position has not been easy to sustain, with wavering and doubtful allies on the one hand and the wall of Communist inflexibility on the other hand. A further and a serious complication has been the seemingly contradictory statements coming from various American sources. The French themselves have given out so many conflicting statements about the Communist proposals on Indochina that it was small wonder the Americans could formulate no clear plan.

> In connection with press reaction, American officials have developed a great sensitivity which is reminiscent of the latter phase of the Truman-Acheson foreign policy, when Acheson felt that insofar as the press was concerned he could do nothing right. One hears bitter complaints about the carping press and the failure of American newspapers to support the American position. Why, one is asked, should this burden be added to the constant attacks that come from the propaganda press behind the Iron Curtain?

Perhaps this comes down to where the blame lies for what most objective observers believe is a serious loss of American prestige. Even the consistently pro-American and influential magazine, The Economist, in an editorial entitled "Alliance in Danger," lists successive Dulles bluffs which have been called with the result to frighten America's allies much

more than to impress the Communists. 

Army captain. Leech was accused last Friday by Lancian's deputy of the savage urder of the three officers, Jan. 7, 1946, at Passau, Germany, Leech has denied the killings.

Informed in Lima of Lancian's an-nouncement, the Ohloan told a "All I know about this is what has been supplied me by the news-

papers. I have nothing official on this latest move. When the final decision is reached, I'll still be here."

Leech faces three charges of murder, three of intentional manslaughter and one of arson in the deaths of Maj. Everett S. Confran of Washington, D.C.; Capt. Adrian L. Wessler, of New Rochelle, N.Y.; and 1st Lt. Stanley M. Rosewater of Omaha, Neb. The charges were filed by Deputy U.S. Prosecutor, William, Canfield, of Hampden, Mass., after the Army had turned over the files of the case to U.S. High Commission legal authorities few weeks ago.

Canfield had indicated he intended to go ahead with a request for extradition of Leech but Lancian stepped into the case and stopped
