To meet the Texas Supreme for funding increases. Court's mandate to establish ways to increase revenues in the upcoming Special Session, said Larry Butler. Spearman ISD superintendent.

"The Texas Supreme Court has ruled that our funding system is unconstitutional, and it is clear that we will need more revenue to ensure our children an equitable and adequate education," Butler

"I do not pretend to have the absolute answer to the problem, courage to take a stand for their but we are mounting a strong effort to rally support for predictable and dependable revenue sources to meet the needs of Texas schoolchildren," he said. "We need to look at all the plans and funding alternatives - and then make the decision that benefits the children."

Butler said, however, that a lottery should not be considered as a solution to the funding shortage. "The lottery is neither as predictable nor as dependable as revenue from fees or taxes," he said. "We cannot support any proposal that puts the future of our children's education on a shaky foundation."

Butler said his local campaign is part of EQUITY PLUS! - a statewide effort led by the Texas Association of School Administra- and the educational needs of our tors to demonstrate public support children.

Butler described a "pressure equitable funding for Texas cooker" of problems that led to schools, the Legislature must find the Edgewood v. Kirby decision and the current school funding crisis. Those problems include:

> (1) education's share of the state budget has fallen from 52.1 percent in 1985 to 45 percent in

> (2) inflation has driven up the cost of education, and

(3) student enrollment in Texas will increase from 300,000 to 500,000 during the next decade.

"We believe Texans have the children's future," Butler said. "The choices are not easy, nor will they come without sacrifices. But Texans never settle for second best-especially when their children's future hangs in the balance.

"By the time the Legislature convenes in its school finance special session on February 27, we believe that the people of Texas will have decided that new revenue sources are needed to fund Texas' public schools. We hope that our efforts will allow the House and Senate to debate this issue without fear of political retribution," Butler said. "With broad support from citizens and other concerned local groups for additional revenue, the Legislature will be free to hammer out a school finance plan that best reflects the concerns of Texans

Production Figures Released

Natural gas and crude oil production figures for Hansford County during the month of November 1989 have been released by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Gas production in Hansford County in November totaled 3,256,198 mcf (thousand cubic feet). Crude oil produced in Hansford County that month totaled 32,562 barrels, according to RRC figures.

Statewide, Texas crude oil production averaged 1,736,623 barrels daily in November, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. The November 1988 preliminary production was 1,849,698 barrels daily.

This figure compares with preliminary October production of 1,738,774 barrels daily. Final production reports for October indicated average production at 1,752,653 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for November is 52,098,686 barrels, down from 53,902,002 barrels in October. The November 1988 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 55,490,931 barrels.

Hance also announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 454.967,152 Mcf (thousand cubic

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




