City Council Met Monday

The City Council meeting held July 7 was a lengthy one.

The council approved Golden Circle's application in regard to their paving of 9th street.

The proposed animal control facility was discussed. The proposed cost is \$9,000. The council agreed to hold off on any decision until after the budget hearing in October. An additional site for the new facility will be needed.

Discussion was held on making a storm shelter out of the old swimming pool and of making a temporary shelter for pool employees and patrons in the manhole near the swimming pool. No decision was made.

The council approved a zoning change from "A" to "C" for the block behind

the hospital to conform with medical use. The council declined the petition for change of zoning from "A" to "C" for Pat Underwood and for "B" to "C" for Jeanette Newingham.

In the discussion of the water, sewer and gas systems, the council approved the lease on Santa Fe Railway land due north of B & B Farm Industries and approved making an application to drill a water well there.

This will have to be done at a later time when funds were available but council felt that they needed to make the application. The city, according to city manager Thompson, has 3 wells that are dependable and 2 others with very small capacity. He is looking for second hand casing for the proposed new well. The drilling of the new

well will also have to wait until the next budget.

In the gas system, the old regulation station behind the First Christian Church has been replaced. It was badly worn and leaking. New gas lines have been laid west of Bernice from the 100 block down to the 400 block. The next priority will be the alley on the west side of Main Street.

The manager also stated that there are some residential gas lines that need to be replaced. Those that the city can detect will be notified by certified mail.

The sewage lab is being equipped and some of the lab work is being done there now. Samples are being taken to Berger at the present time for analysis.

An inspection by the EPA and the Water Quality Board

is expected at any time.

Thompson also said that the California firm that has been negotiating for the scrap at the dump is still interested but he feels that the drop in the price of scrap iron will rule out any possibility of this.

Monthly reports from police, fire, ambulance and municipal courts were given.

Thompson also stated that on Thursday he will have been city manager for one year and is proud of the things that have been accomplished, and was very complimentary of his staff. He said much remains to be done in many areas in Spearman.

An executive session was called to discuss personnel, no action was taken.

The next regular city meeting will be July 28 at 8 p.m. at City Hall.

Gruver To Get 2 Vietnamese Doctors

The city of Gruver, which has been without a doctor for about 6 years, will have two Vietnamese doctors as soon as sponsorship is arranged through churches in Gruver in cooperation with the U. S. Catholic Conference and Lutheran Social Services at Ft. Chaffee, Ark., according to U. S. Department of Labor spokesman Jim Arnold.

The doctors are Nguyen Nhu Vong, a specialist in internal medicine and surgery and Le Huu Thu, an ear, nose and throat specialist. Each doctor has a wife and three children.

Gruver Mayor Kenneth Irwin and banker Robert Ewing were in Ft. Chaffee Tuesday to interview nine Vietnamese refugee doctors. Now they must help the Lutheran and Catholic churches in Gruver to prepare and send a formal letter of sponsorship to agencies at Ft. Chaffee before the doctors can leave. This process should take one or two weeks. Irwin and Ewing left Gruver by private airplane early Tuesday after ex-

amining the physicians' resumes in the office of Panhandle Regional Health Council Director Eddie Melin in Amarillo.

They were taken to Hansford Hospital with injuries not believed to be too serious.

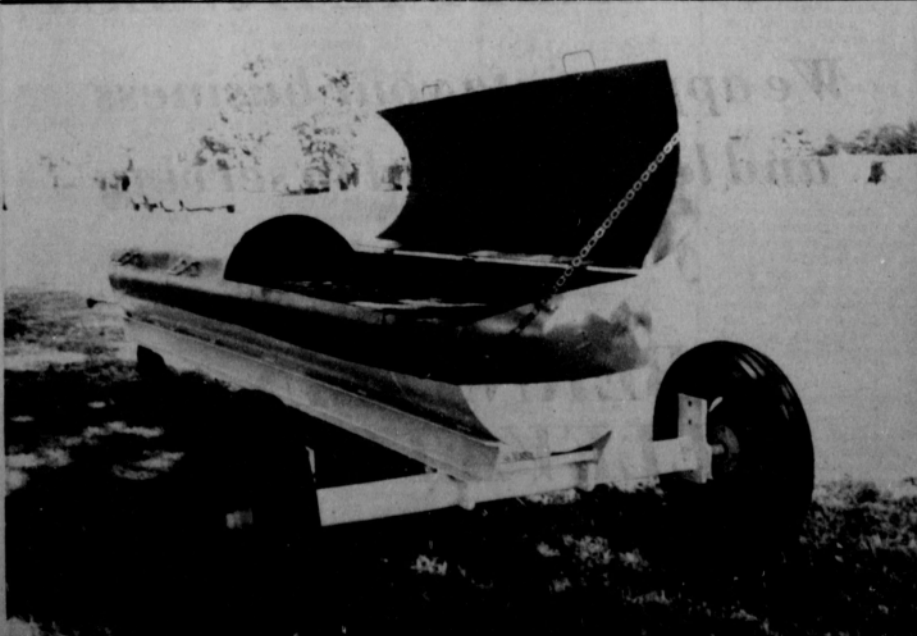
Committee To Meet Here

American Kidney Fund Sponsors National Art Auction

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- The first Annual, National Art Auction with paintings from the United States and abroad is being sponsored by the American Kidney Fund in celebration of America's Bicentennial.

Mr. Sven Larsen, Executive Director of the American Kidney Fund, states that the purpose of the auction is to "provide a window to the public for all working artists and at the same time afford collectors an opportunity to view the works of the broadest possible spectrum of artists."

The sponsor, the Am-

erican Kidney Fund, is a voluntary health agency that provides financial assistance to victims of kidney failure who cannot afford the costs of therapy. The Fund is totally dependent upon public support.

To enter, the artist must submit a 35 millimeter colored slide of his work which will then be reproduced in full color and made available to more than five thousand prospective buyers. News For Veterans

The current GI Bill, in effect since June 1, 1966, has passed its ninth anniversary, and the Veterans Administration had pronounced it in a thriving state of health.

Increased enrollments in each of the first four months of this year -- peaking at a record 1.8 million -- was cited as one sign of its viability.

April enrollments were nearly 17 percent above April a year ago and 2.2 percent above March. In fiscal year 1974, a record 2.4 million veterans and military service personnel used GI Bill benefits while nearly 5.7 million have used it since 1966.

VA officials said an upsurge in enrollments this year followed enactment of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Act of 1974 (Dec. 3). The law increased educational assistance rates and otherwise liberalized benefits.

Higher participation rates have been compiled under the current GI Bill than under either of its two predecessors. Some 4.4 million of 7.5 million Vietnam era veterans have used it, giving them a 58.5 percent participation rate.

The rate was 43.4 percent under 13 years of the Korean Conflict (nearly 2.4 million of 5.5 million veterans) and 50.5 percent under the original

Summer Enrollment

Amarillo--Summer quarter enrollment at Texas State Technical Institute, Mid-Continent Campus, is 334 at the end of twelfth class day.

This figure by far exceeds that of any previous summer session, according to J. W. Sollis, manager of student services. Last summer, the school registered an all-time low number of students. However, this was due to the fact that State Tech was in transition between a trimester and a quarter system, and most continuing students elected to recess for the summer.

Enrollment for all quarters of the 1974-75 school year has hit a high. Sollis states that the anticipated estimated of student contact hours for '74-75 will increase 43.5 percent over that figure for 1973-74. With open entry registration in some programs, he adds, that estimate

might even be low.

Two programs with the highest summer enrollment are Commercial Art in Advertising a six-quarter program; and Cosmetology, a three-quarter course.

Sollis' projection for the Fall quarter is 600 students. He emphasizes that students planning to attend Mid-Continent in September should make application very early, especially those seeking financial aid or veterans benefits. He says that applications will be approved on a first-come, first-served basis.

Admissions counselors are available to work with prospective students. In addition to 16 programs already offered, two new ones-- Boot and Shoe Operations, and Professional Trucking Operations--will be opened this Fall.

of years they have been active in 4-H.
This was the week of our canning workshops. If you missed them you can call or come by our office for excellent publications on canning, freezing, jams, jellies, relishes, pickles, etc. Again we stress reading the instructions that come with the lids you are using. It varies from brand to brand which can cause a canning failure. Remember incorrect home canning which results in spoiled foods can kill the persons who eat the food.
The cost of sugar is again getting more reasonable but some homemakers prefer to use honey. Honey is not "much better for you" than other sugars. It has about the same nutrients as sugar but has more calories and carbohydrates than the same amount of granulated, powdered or brown sugar. It's composed of different kinds of sugar than the refined sugars. It is sweeter

than common table sugar and the composition and flavor vary, depending upon the source of the nectar.
If you do want to use honey for cooking, here are the substitution guidelines. When using for sugar in puddings, custards, pie fillings, bread and rolls, use cup for cup. In cakes and cookies, use 7/8 cup honey for 1 cup sugar and reduce liquid 3 table-spoons for each cup of honey substituted. Unless sour milk or cream is used in the recipe, add 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon baking soda per cup of honey.

FARM AND RANCH NEWS

Last Sunday I made a trip to the Wheeler vicinity and can report that the peach crop in that area is good. I vldred one of the best peach orchards in the area, that of "Shorty" Sechrist, which is about 5 miles due west of Wheeler. He said his main crop of peaches would be ready around July 15.
CORN INSECTS - Now is the time to start checking corn fields for the eggs and larvae of the South western Corn Borer. Timing of insecticide applications is extremely critical since little control will be obtained after the borers have entered the plant. Chemical application generally is not needed until egg masses and larvae of the first generation moths

appear usually during the month of July or early August.
Insecticides should not be applied until 35% of the stalks are infested with egg masses or young larvae. If treatment is made, a maximum of two applications at 10-14 day intervals should give best economic control.
I have available in the office a booklet on Insect and Mite Pests of Field Corn. This contains the very latest information on these corn plants. Call or come by the office for your copy.
CROP ACREAGE - according to USDA sorghum planted for all purposes in Texas in 1975 is estimated at 8,000,000 acres, up .7 per cent over the 7,500,000 acres planted last year. Acres to be harvested for grain are set at 6,800,000 compared with 6,000,000 acres last year.
CORN planted for all purposes in Texas in 1975 is estimated at 1,200,000 acres, an increase of 33 per cent over the 800,000 acres harvested last year.

WHEAT production in Texas, based on June 1 prospects, is estimated at 132,000,000 bushels, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. While the June 1 wheat production estimate shows a decline of 4 per cent from last month, the 132,000,000 bushel production is still the largest on record for Texas and compares with a drought reduced crop of only 52,800,000 bushels last

year. Yield is expected to average 24.0 bushels per acre, 50 percent greater than the 16.0 bushel yield of last year but still substantially short of the record 29.0 bushel yield attained in 1973. Planted acres are estimated at 6,500,000, 16 per cent greater than last year. Harvested acres, estimated at 5,500,000, show a 67 per cent increase over the 3,300,000 acres harvested for grain in 1974.

SPS Completes Industry Survey

The Area Development Department of Southwest-ern Public Service Company has completed a survey of industries in the area served by the electric company.
The first phase of the survey, completed in March, was made in all of the towns that SPS serves in

Texas except Amarillo and Lubbock. The second phase of the survey covers these two metropolitan areas.

"The purpose of the survey is to assemble information that will aid in the design of programs to assist existing manufacturers expand their production facilities," commented Larry Milner, Area Development manager for SPS in Amarillo.
The survey, representing twenty-three communities on the North and South Plains, reveals that 52.4 percent of the existing industries responding to the survey plan future expansion. Forty-seven of the companies surveyed plan expansion within the next twelve months, while another sixty-one plan expansion in the next three years. During the next five years, twenty-five more companies plan expansion.

Employment expansion for the near future was projected in the range of forty three percent.
The survey covers general manufacturing, agricultural, and gas related industries, with a total employee representation of more than 14,000. Of this number, about 9,000 are production workers, 1,000 are management employees and the remainder work in clerical or administrative jobs.
In discussing the survey, Milner said, "Some of the major problems faced by industry when planning expansion are labor supply, reduced sales, resources, financing, lack of technical information, transportation, building space, management and air pollution laws.
Helping all the towns in our service area with new and existing industries is one of our primary functions. We feel that the information in this industrial survey will aid us in providing that help," Milner concluded.

Food Stamp Deadline Extended

Food stamp recipients can use 50-cent, \$2 and old \$5 food stamps until August 31, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced today. USDA introduced a new food stamp series -- \$1, \$5 and \$10 -- on March 1 with a deadline of June 30 for spending old series food stamps at authorized retail food stores and meal services. The deadline was extended to allow recipients who were issued old coupons in March, April and May adequate time to use them.

Grocers and meal services can redeem old coupons at commercial banks through Sept. 30.

The change, which was effective July 1, 1975, will be published in the Federal Register of Wednesday, July 9.

New Pamphlet From TXPB

Blurred, fuzzy, or double images may be the way of sight for your child, but he may have no idea that this is not normal since a child has no point of comparison between what is normal or abnormal sight.

So warns the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, which announced this month the availability of a free new pamphlet for parents, "Your Child's Sight, How You Can Help", and two new films, TXPB, an affiliate of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, points out that one in every 20 children between 3 and 5 years of age is handicapped by eye problems.

Parents often are lulled into a false sense of security, as the new parent-education folder points out, because a child is not likely to complain about a vision defect as he would with a toothache or stomachache.

The free folder, which may be obtained from TXPB, Post Office Box 13400, Houston, Texas 77219 (or Box 339, Euless, Texas 76039; or 6708 San Pedro #2, San Antonio, Texas 78216) lists in succinct, simple language the signs that may indicate vision difficulties in young children and necessitate a professional eye examination.

TXPB also has two brand new films available on free loan to community groups.

Accent on Health

There's a lot going for the individuals who can their own food. They save money use up the bountiful produce from their home gardens and have tasty, nutritious food the year round.

But, says the State Health Department, home canning can be dangerous—even lethal—unless proved canning techniques and recipes are followed to the letter.

With an upswing in the amount of home canning and freezing done in Texas, State Health Department officials are concerned about the possibility of food contamination, especially botulism.

Botulism is caused by a deadly poison—a toxin—produced by a germ found abundantly in the soil. This germ is one of the spore-forming bacteria and is very resistant to normal heat and cold. It can grow without air, which makes it a sinister threat in home canning.

While the germ itself doesn't cause illness, the toxin it produces can be fatal to man. These bacteria are found nearly everywhere, and it's probable that nearly everyone has eaten them many times in their safe, inactive form on fresh food.

But, if these bacteria remain alive through the canning process and continue to live in an oxygen-free state—in a sealed airtight jar or can—they will manufacture the botulism toxin as a product of their metabolism.

That's why in canning it is so important to properly process food so that the food




