

WHEAT RAINFALL OVER COUNTY AUGUST 14TH.

MORE THAN INCH REPORTED OVER SPEARMAN AREA

Rainfall that varied from the official report of U. S. Weather Observer, F. W. Brandt, amounting to 1.10 inches in Spearman to reports amounting to 2 and a half inches north and west of Gruver fell Sunday night. Reports from over the county indicate the land was in excellent condition to receive the rainfall and store the moisture for fall planting of wheat. Row crops over the county are in excellent condition and the Sunday night moisture insures a good harvest.

The need of the organization is apparent at this time, so that some representative of the citizenship can sponsor Hansford County's interests in the various Federal projects that are available.

County Agent Hatton Urges Wind Up Hoper Poisoning Campaign

Grasshoppers have drifted in and are extremely thick in areas scattered over the entire county, according to reports received from the county agents office. In order to meet this situation farmers are urged to participate in a general poisoning campaign during the next ten days. Poison may still be obtained free of all charge at either Spearman or Gruver. Poisoning at this time will accomplish a two fold purpose—it will prevent the destruction of wheat this fall and will also reduce the number of grasshopper eggs deposited between now and cold weather. If farmers desire to save their wheat it is imperative that they poison now as there is only a limited amount of bran left in the county and it is impossible to secure more from the Government. Total amount of poison put out today in Hansford county is 1,211,535 lbs. It is estimated that it's poison saved wheat and feed crops valued at \$500,000.

Treatment of Seed Wheat Against Rust and Smut

An improved method of treatment of seed wheat against rust and smut has been suggested for this area. Use Ethyl Mercury Phosphate (improved cerasan) apply at the rate of one half oz per bushel in a mixing machine or as recommended by manufacturers. Dusted grain should be kept in a bin, pile or sack at least 10 hours before planting. This can be used to as good or better advantage than Copper Carbonate.

Official Ballots For Second Primary Printed by Reporter

The official ballots for the second primary, to be held Saturday, August 27, were printed by The Reporter job department the early part of the week. It is expected that about half as many votes will be polled in Hansford County in the second primary as in the first. There are only six state offices and two candidates in the August primary for county commissioner.

FACTS ABOUT SO CALLED FARM SUBSIDY ON WHEAT—WE HOPE.

Announcement carried in daily papers over the nation Tuesday brought information as follows:

WASHINGTON—Aug. 15—The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced today that it would pay the nation's wheat farmers a subsidy of from 26 to 30 cents a bushel for compliance with a planting program calling for a 31 per cent reduction in acreage next year.

The benefit payment rate compares with 12c offered under this years program. Increased rates were promised for several other major crops.

From information gathered locally by this newspaper, the above news release is a bit mis-leading: The increase in payments does not cover the 1938 wheat crop, as some might interpret it, but covers the 1939 wheat production. The increase is not a subsidy, but a regular allotment increase, and changes the basic figures from the present allotment figure of 12c per bushel to 26 to 30c per bushel. The increase in payment will not be available until 1940, covering the 1939 crop.

From the best information available we learn that the 1938 allotment payment will be made on a basis of 12c per bushel plus a subsidy of 8c per bushel. The 1939 payment will be made on the basis of 26 to 30c per bushel plus an 8c subsidy payment. Payment of 1938 subsidy of 8c per bushel will depend on reduction of the 1939 crop at seeding time as regulated by the national agricultural program. Payment of announced 1939 increases will likely depend on compliance of 1940 seeding according to regulations that will be announced at a later date.

Perryton, Texas, August 16—(Special)—This city is ready to entertain thousands of visitors who will throng here for the 19th Anniversary Celebration on Monday, August 22. With a big program of special events, there won't be a dull moment during the day, so states Irvin R. Buchanan, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee in charge of all entertainment. The official celebration will be in reality open on the afternoon of Saturday, August 20, when the first games in the Dalhart, Guyton, Beaver and Perryton baseball tournament will be played. The semi-finals in the baseball meet will be run off on Sunday, August 21; with the championship games on the 22nd. Cash prizes totaling \$250.00 go to the winning clubs.

NOTICE WHEAT PRODUCERS

There are still some wheat farmers who have not made an application for Crop Insurance, and some who have not even inquired as to the cost of their insurance. The final date for making an application is the 31st of August. This date has been definitely set, so if you have failed to make your application by that time you won't be able to have any crop insurance for the 1939 crop. The cost of this insurance at the present price of wheat is unusually low, so if you haven't inquired about your rate be sure and do so before the 31st.

Farm Security Loans Now Being Made

Farm Security Administration is now making supplemental loans to those borrowers who are not yet able to finance their own operations. All past borrowers of FSA who are now eligible for loans and who expect to receive a loan to put in wheat this fall are urged to see Thomas L. Taylor, county rural rehabilitation supervisor, immediately in order that their applications may be submitted and the loan returned in time to pay expenses of preparing and seeding their crops. This organization is ready to receive any new applicants who are unable to get financed through other institutions, and who are able to abide by the regulations of FSA.

O'Daniel Endorses C. V. Terrell For Commis.

AMARILLO—"I am sincerely grateful for the endorsement of my candidacy for re-election to the Railroad Commission of Texas by so many Texas and national leaders." Thus did Judge C. V. Etwart the two latter being formidable candidates for the office in the July primary. "Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:
"I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office of employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

FOR THE AMENDMENT OF Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas.

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT OF Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

1938 Requirements Are Set Forth

The purpose of the 1938 wheat loan program is to help farmers hold part of their surplus from this year's crop until other provisions of the AAA program can become effective for wheat and bring our surplus to manageable proportions," states H. R. Tolley administrator of the AAA. Wheat growers who comply with their 1939 allotments will qualify for other advantages of the program, such as 1939 conservation payments, 1939 wheat loans, if the loan program is in effect next year, and a renewal of the crop insurance policies in 1939.

Allotments were made to 39 states, with Texas getting the fourth largest allotment.

The wheat loan program recently announced by Secretary of Agriculture H. A. Wallace will apply to cooperating farmers at farm rates between 52 to 55 cents per bushel, according to Geo. Slauchter, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee.

Eligible persons for the loan are those who as a landlord or operator has not exceeded 105 percent of his total depleting allotment in 1938.

County Agent Joe Hatton stated that as soon as his office receives the forms, which are expected daily, elevator stored wheat may be borrowed on. Measurements of the farms are being rushed at this time in order to be prepared to certify the farms as soon as the blanks are received. Indications are that a large volume of Hansford county wheat will be placed in the loan.

When grain is stored in an approved commercial warehouse, the farmer who wishes to apply for a loan will apply to his county AAA committee. If he is eligible, the committee will so certify. He can then present his certification and warehouse receipts showing the quantity, grade and quality of his wheat to his bank or local lending agency or to a loan agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and obtain a loan by depositing his receipts as collateral. Farm storage has been approved for 55 Texas counties including Ochiltree. The farmer who wishes to obtain a loan on farm

request his committee to inspect his storage facilities in order to make certain that his bins are in condition to store that wheat. If the loan is made another inspection will be made at least thirty days after the storage has been made. Farmers lacking the proper storing facilities to store the wheat will be eligible for a building or repair loan, according to information received from various lending agencies.

The charges on commercial storage will be paid by the Commodity Credit Corporation if they take over the wheat while producers of farmstored wheat will receive a payment of seven cents a bushel for storage if they delivered their wheat to the corporation in proper condition on or after May 31, 1938.

ARE YOU A TAXPAYER?

If you are a taxpayer, you may be interested in the new law that is to affect your interests after the first of next January. The new law reads:

Article No. 8, section No. 20, provides that after January 1, 1939, "No property of any kind in this state shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its cash market value nor shall any board of equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing districts within this state fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value." 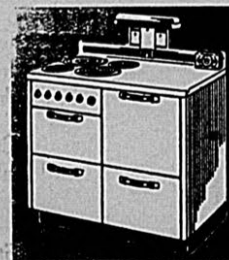
