Mother's Cook Book

THIS AND THAT

CANDIES make a delicious garnish for simple desserts, and save the time necessary for preparing more elaborate ones. A bit of chocolate or maple fudge crumbled over ice cream, cornstarch pudding, custard, or junket, makes an otherwise plain dessert very stylish.

To make an old dust mop practically as good as new put a large tablespoonful of concentrated lye in a pail half full of boiling water and let the mop boil in it. Rinse thoroughly several times and put in the sun to dry.

One or two tablespoonfuls of kerosene put into the boiler with the clothes will whiten them.

Begin early and start right with the child; this is especially important if he is to be strong, well and an efficient citizen.

The normal child eats with zest the food placed before him. Dawdling over food or refusing to eat it will need hard work to overcome. It is far easier to form good habits than to break bad ones.

If the child is accustomed to a variety of foods very early, before he begins to form likes and dislikes, he will like and eat everything as he grows older.

It is the very exceptional child who is made ill by certain foods; of course, one must eliminate them if it is found to be a real case. Some children feign illness and nausea to gain attention and something refused.

One's method of dealing with the food question must vary with the child. It will work with some to insist on the food on the plate being eaten before he has dessert. If not hungry enough to eat the food on the plate he is not hungry enough for dessert. A word of praise, a reward, often brings the desired result. As children are people, they should be treated as such. No two individuals enjoy exactly the same things, so we must be tactful in dealing with little people.

It is wise to look over the supply shelf often and keep it well filled, for with the holiday season, many unexpected calls may be made upon it.

GETTING "FRESH" AIR

The modern automobile may be called the universal convenience for out-door travel. It is rare to find an American householder that does not possess some sort of a family car. I rode in my sedan about thirty-five miles yesterday afternoon. It was sunny and warm—a perfect day. I wanted—needed—air and sunshine; I, like millions of thousands, had been housed the week before. The question is, how much air and sunshine did I get? In a very "sketchy" ride over the hills and through country lanes, I was not actually in the glorious open air over ten minutes! Seated on the cushions, I did not get ten whole minutes of physical exercise—fresh air. I am forced to confess—the closed automobile is not so precious little as an instrument for gathering health and exercise for the man who needs both. The more benefits comes to the health-tourist who is compelled to get out by the side of the highway and walk up a punctured tire or a "blow-out." He gets the same time and exercise. An auto trip over mountain roads, with camping at night, eating lunches broiled over a chunk-fire over a great out-doors—a trip lasting for a week or more of immense benefit for recuperation; but how

very few are situated that they may go to that extent? Let me word this exactly: I got more sunshine and exercise in my back yard one afternoon with my garden hoe—than I would get in an entire Sunday afternoon's auto touring, and, did it in twenty minutes. I mention this to show how easy, effectual and cheap one can obtain such absolute essentials to life and health, as sunshine, air and good exercise. The humblest may reach forth and take without cost, while the idler merely "gets by" in his self-deception.

The Awfulness of Sin, the Necessity for Repentance, and the Meaning of Faith in the Life of Man.

"Sin is a clenched fist and a blow in the face of God."—Joseph Parker. "The characteristic of New Testament teaching is its intense conception of sin as the one great evil in the world—as the central fact of life—around which all the powers of heaven, earth, and hell range themselves."—George R. Barton.

"True repentance, like that of Zacchaeus, affects eye, ear, hand, foot: he saw he was a sinner; heard the message of salvation; took hold of Christ by faith; and ran joyfully in the way of obedience."—William Adams Brown.

GOD AND SIN THE PRIMARY FACTS
The Bible's first word is God (in the beginning God—); its second sin. That is as soon as we are through with the story of God creation of his world, the very next chapter of Genesis, the third tells us of man's first disobedience. In like manner the New Testament's twofold keynote is Christ and salvation.

In the Old Testament sin is viewed more from the nationalistic point of view, in the New Testament it is rather an offense of the individual. Yet some of the psalms voice an intensely personal note; and the Gospels and Epistles repeatedly remind us that our transgressions always harm others society.

SIN ANCIENT, BUT ALSO MODERN.
The Bible story of sin in Genesis may be old, but is not old-fashioned; it is very up to date. How clearly the sinfulness of this day is reflected here in this parable! Sin's personification is bestial; and its approach and clinging thing! And its appeal is subtle. The devil is cunning, whatever form he takes. All the more need we should watch out. But is not practically all our wrong-doing intelligent

deliberate? God has said, Ye shall not eat. They knew. The most stupid of us know where the line of righteousness runs when we transgress.

A denial of God's word enters in. The temper hints, Ye shall surely die, Gen. 3:4, as God has said. Don't believe it. The sinner deludes himself, I'll get by with it—this time; or, The Ten Commandments, and what the preacher says, are all rot. Let personal liberty be my shibboleth! One of the saddest items of the story is that we forever helping one another sin, and trying to shift the blame to the other shoulders as Eve and Adam, is never long deferred; nor the sound of his accusing voice.

THE PALSIED MAN HEALED.

Most of the miracles of Christ though not all, illustrate for us how Christ, in dealing with the ailments of the human body, is capable of dealing and eager to deal with deeper ailments of the human soul. The particular disease afflicting the chief character in this particular parable was palsy, a remarkable type of sin's terrible toll in the life of man. A bad conscience or the sense of sin induces moral paralysis. It

sables the moral nature on every hand. It dulls moral intelligence. Our Lord, looking upon this helpless man, borne of four, saw far beyond his physical ailment, and, looking deep into his soul, discovered a spiritual paralysis and at once emancipated the man from the deeper sin by his declaration, Son thy sins are forgiven. To forgive sins means to send them out of sight to erase them from an account, to treat them as having no existence, to blot them out from a court record, to declare the sinner absolutely free from the guilt and bondage of his sin.

JESUS' STORY OF SIN, REPENTANCE AND FORGIVENESS.

This parable of the Prodigal Son is undoubtedly one of the most important documents in all scripture for a study of sin, repentance and forgiveness. Steps in the Way to Forgiveness, it might be entitled. He came to himself. Moffatt. You cannot be sorry for the wrong in you to which you are blind. The trouble with most great and little sinners especially the latter—is that they do not see themselves as God and others can, as they are. The importance of confession is recognized. It is not the same as repentance, but must accompany it. The boy had faith in his father love, was confident of the welcome he would receive. Without such faith we will not dare go to God, petition him for forgiveness, no matter how repentant we may be.

THE PRODIGAL'S RETURN.

And he arose, and came to his father. This is true repentance. But while he was yet afar off, his father saw him. This shows that the father had been looking for him to come back and was even looking for him at this very moment he came in sight. And ran and fell on his neck and kissed him. He did not win his father's love that love was always there. God loves us long before we love and obey him. The father did not know but that the boy would change his mind and go back. meting fatal might overtake him before he got to the door; and so the father ran. This father was not hindered by the foul and sour rags of his son who came to him from among the swine, but fell on his neck, overcome by joy, so will you find in God no revulsion, but an immediate and hearty

welcome and joy in His love.

Great interest has been aroused in the question of rural electrification. This interest has been increased because of the success in the Muscle Shoals area.

The government wholesales the electricity to the local association at the central point in the county at a low cost per kilowatt hour.

The local equipment and transmission lines are paid for out of the proceeds of the sale of electricity.

Local plants and facilities are not injured in any way. Rather, they are helped. The organization needs the equipment and much more.

LIVING UP THEIR FARMS

The 1935 World Almanac on page 355 gives a table prepared by the Department of Agriculture which lists the value of all farm property held by actual farm operators in 1930 at \$43,667,000.

The same table lists the gross income of all farms in the United States, including rent paid to non-farmer landlords, for the three years, 1931, '32 and '33, at \$15,430,000,000.

The same table gives \$1,301,000,000 as the amount paid in wages during the three years by farm operators. If this amount is added to the net income and the ten per cent...

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per year or about \$5 per week for all who work on farms. This is below subsistence levels and about half the amount allotted to relief workers.

All this is the fruit of Capitalism. How long will it take for people to see that mounting personal debts and Government borrowings for money paid out for wasted labor to disguise a dole is transferring their property to financiers and reducing them to the status of slaves and serfs?
