



Sales Reported

State Comptroller Bob Bul-lock has reported that gross sales in Hansford County for the last three months of 1976 amounted to 511,397,638 of which 52,961,501 was subject to the

amounted to \$11,397,038 of which \$2,961,501 was subject to tax. The information about gross sales in Hansford a Cheme from Auutin in which Builock reported that gross sales in Trazs for the last three months of 1976 exce-eded \$43.3 billion, raising the total for the year to \$14.2 billion. This is \$27.5 billion more than the total for calendar 1975, an increase of 2.3 9 per cent, Builock noted. The computer analyses re-leased by Builock break down reported gross sales by county and by Standard Mar-tropolitan Statistical Area (\$M\$\$A).

tropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA). Harris County, the state's most populous, again led the state with gross sales total-ing \$1.1 & billion. Datas Stillion and Tarrant \$2.5 bil-tion. Bears County recorded sales of \$1.9 billion. The figures are based on reports from 287,672 busi-ness outlets in the state holding sales and use tax permits.



LIVESTOCK ASSESSMENT

While there is often a question as to the fairness, tax laws in the State of Texas are very definite as they pertain to live-stock. Thus, we have no alternative but to adhere to the laws as they now exist.

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owners residence. All live-stock in Hansford County on January 1st then must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE CHARGE OR POSSESSION OF SOMEONE OTHER THAN THE OWNER SHALL BE ASSESSED TO THE PERSON HAVING IT IN CHARGE OR POSSESSION. (Arts. 7160,7152.) Therefore, if you have cattle on your property or if you are looking after some-one's cattle you are responsible to this office for the owner's name and address and the number of cattle. And if ownership is not confirmed, then these may be charged to you.

Since by law, the rendering of property is the responsibility o the owner, it is hoped that livestock will be properly rendered to the Hansford County Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected.

WHENEVER THE TAXPAYER REFUSES TO MAKE RENDITION OR TO SUBSCRIBE TO THE OATH, THE ASSESSOR SHALL PROCEED TO ASSESS THE PROPERTY OF SUCH TAXPAYER, AND THE ASSESSMENT SO MADE SHALL BE AS LEGAL AND EINDING AS IF RENDERED BY THE TAXPAYER. (Art. 7193.)

An intense effort has been made by the Hansford County Tax Office Personnel this year, to count the livestock on every section of Hansford County. Naturally there will be human error, so the correct rendering of livestock, by the owners, will greatly re-duce this occurance.
