\section*{Equal Taxes}

The Perryton school board took a necessary,
while quite unpleasant step, while quite unpleasant step, when they boosted ratio to 85 per cent for the coming tax year. This represents about a 70 per cent increase in the assessment ratio, but of course, the actual tax increase will be less because the tax rate will be lower than it is now.
Because the state legislature has not passed a school finance bill, and the local school system does not know how much state money it will get, there is no way to set a tax rate right now. Yet it is certain that taxes in the Perryton school district will go up by a substantial 32 per cent increase in taxes.
The school system has to raise \(\$ 632,934\) more money this year than it had In last year's budget, an increase of 31.9 per cent.
Most of the money will come from local taxpayers.

There is certain to be protests over this and there will be a demand that the school district look at more economical ways of operating the
schools. The natural reaction of a taxpayer is to look around and see if he is paying more than his neighbor.
