2 arraigned

Two Fort Worth men, Frank Harris Powell, 41, and Patrick Otis Powell, 39, were arraigned on a charge of murder Tuesday, July 19, before Justice of the Peace J. P. Vernon in Spearman in connection with the shooting death of Jose Leon Gutierrez, 55, of Spearman whose body was discovered in a junk car at the city dump July 17.

Bond for each man was set at \$100,000 and they were remanded to the custody of Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin pending further court proceedings.

The Fort Worth men were arrested in a trailer house located in an area of the dump where, according to preliminary investigation, Gutierrez was shot three times before his body was placed in the backseat of the old car and driven over to the pit where it was to be crushed for burial in the dump grounds.

The Hansford County Sheriff reported Gutierrez had been shot three times, in the mouth, near the heart and in the left thigh, with a .22 caliber rifle.

According to identification

at this time, the car used to haul the body to the pit was owned by Gutierrez.

An unidentified man who reportedly was being held, hostage at the dump-grounds managed to escape and notify the sheriff's office that Gutierrez' body had been placed in the car. Authorities declined to identify the source of the tip.

McFarlin reported that investigation is continuing as to the motive. He added the Powells had been staying at the trailer.

McFarlin also said that he wanted to express his thanks to personnel from the Spearman, Gruver and Amarillo Police Departments for their assistance in this case.

Gutierrez, father of 13 and employed by a local grain firm, had been a resident of Spearman for four years. Services are pending with Dunn Funeral Home of Tucumcari, N.M.

He was born at Fort Sumner, N.M., and married Corrine Marie Baca at Tucumcari. He was a member of St. Ann's Catholic Church.

Survivors include six daughters; Helen, Cecilia, Edna and Jeanette of Albuquerque, N.M., and Inez and Barbara of Tucumcari; seven sons, Jose Leon, Ramon, Joe, Pete, Gilbert and Ricky of Albuquerque and Smiley of Tucumcari; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Olivas of Albuquerque and Mrs. Alicia Diaz of Denver, Colo.; six brothers, Manuel of Lubbock, Pete of Fort Sumner, Alet of Amarillo, Pat of Tucumcari and Gilbert and Sonny of Plainview, and 12 grandchildren.

Services Thursday

Otis Patterson, 72, died yesterday in Amarillo.

Services will be at 2:30 p.m. Thursday at First United Methodist Church in Spearman with the Rev. Frank Oglesby, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Holt Cemetery by Boswell Brothers Funeral Directors of Spearman.

Mr. Patterson was born in Wise County and had been a Spearman resident since 1921. He was a retired farmer and rancher and was a Mason.

His wife, Eva, died in March.

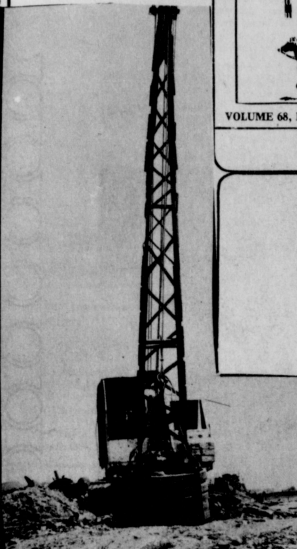

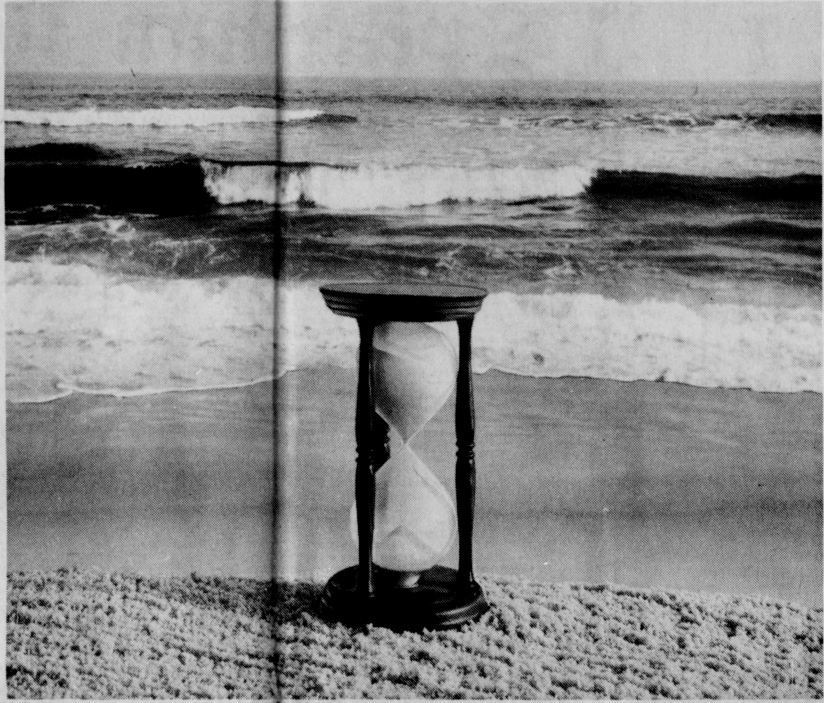

Peggy's Pointers

FOOD SAFETY IS A
HAND-Y MATTER - What
have you been doing today?
When the morning alarm
went off, you wrestled with
the clock to turn it off, then
you threw back the covers,
and groped for a light switch
with your hands, right?
Let's skip the details, but
thank about what you put
hats through this morning.
You probably used them to
wash your face, brush or

comb your hair, fix break-
fast, open and close doors,
handle money, grab, push,
clasp, reach, hold, dugg-
defend, pinch...whoops,
maybe not pinch.

Bacteria naturally thrive in
our environment. You can't
see or smell most of them,
but your hands pick them up
with every chore you do. If
you're careless, these bacter-
ia can be transferred from
your hands to food. Under
the right conditions, some of
these will be a victim of food
borne illness. (It's sort of a
hand-in-mouth disease.)

Washing your hands with
soap and water for at least 40
seconds can get rid of many
of these bacteria. This
simple procedure can help
keep you from being one of
more than 2 million cases of
bacterial food poisoning ev-
ery year.

Other handy hints to help
you reduce the chance of
bacterial food poisoning are:
Don't handle food with hands
that have cuts, bruises or
sores on them. Cover the
wound before attempting to
prepare food. Don't sneeze
or cough on food or in areas
where food is being prepared.
The organisms can be
expelled into the air in drops
of moisture during breathing
and talking, as well as when
coughing and sneezing.

Don't wipe your hands on a
dirty towel or apron, then use
them in preparing food.
Cross-contamination of an
infected area to a non-in-
fected area is a common
means for transferring bacterial
poisoning.

Although it may seem
elementary, washing your
hands and exercising per-
sonal cleanliness, using sani-
tary facilities and equipment
are preventive practices that
need to be followed more
consistently. Harmful bacter-
ia may thrive under a
variety of conditions. For
example, some multiply in
the presence of oxygen and
some in the absence of
oxygen. But no matter what
the bacteria, very few sur-
vive in a clean sanitary
environment. Keep food
safe by heating cooked food
properly to destroy bacteria
and properly storing food -
keep hot foods hot and cold

BUYING SUNGLASSES -
Some sunglasses protect the
eyes; others merely deco-
rate. True sunglasses pro-
tect the eyes by filtering
ultraviolet and infrared rays.
Choose neutral gray or sage
green. Other colors are of
little or no value as a sun-
glass lens.

"Just-fashion" glasses
come in any color - from
blues to reds to yellows.
Often they are plastic, al-
though some are made of

glass. Examine sunglasses be-
fore buying. First, turn them
over so that an overhead
lighting fixture reflects on
the inside of the lenses.
Check that the reflection is
not distorted or wiggly.

Second, inquire-or read the
literature-about light trans-
mission. Sunglasses should
not admit more than 10 per
cent of the light, but 30-20
percent is preferred.

Try them on. If you can
see your eyes clearly in a
mirror, the glasses are not
dark enough.

Next, look at the frame
carefully. Be sure hinges are
strong and the frame is
smooth and free of sharp
edges. In a plastic frame,
check that the ear pieces
have metal cores. These will
bend to give the most com-
fortable fit.

Her deftness at taking the ball away from the opposition was combined with the hot hand of Ginger Thornton of Abilene Wylie, a team which Miss Harper and her Lynxettes teammates beat in route to the championship earlier this year, and Carol Reeves of Dallas Bryon

Adams to tack up the lopsided win. Here's a report on the action last week as carried in another area newspaper.

ABILENE—Overwhelming quickness and the 41-point combination of Abilene Wylie's Ginger Thornton and Dallas Bryon Adams' Carol Reeves powered the North stars to an almost lackadaisical 79-45 drubbing of the South Saturday night in Taylor County Coliseum here.

The occasion, the 21st Annual Texas High School Girls Coaches Assn. All-Star Basketball Game, attracted an estimated 3,000 fans.

Miss Thornton has the hot hand in the first half, hitting eight of 10 from the field, and dashing any hopes of suspense by intermission as the North ran up a 38-17 lead.

Then in the second half,

the 6-1 Miss Reeves added 10 of her 21 points to thwart any southern retaliation hopes.

Misses Thornton (20 points) and Reeves are both destined for Baylor University to continue their playing careers.

Dimmitt's Beth Cleveland, who has inked with Texas Tech, pumped on 14 points on the night, mostly on driving layups.

Miss Cleveland scored twice on three-point plays. Carla Harper of Spearman was the North quarterback all evening, pilfering the ball five times and hitting for 13 points. Seven of those markers came from the charity stripe.

Canyon's Becky Williams, who led the North's forward-end trap defense that handcuffed the South all night, added eight points. Miss Williams will attend South Plains College at Levelland to play basketball.

On the guard end, jumping jack Barbara Brown of Dallas South Oak Cliff's Class AAAA state champions, simply dominated action. The slender Miss Brown (5-11) blocked four shots and was the cause for numerous South misses.

In the third period, Missy Weisinger of Conroe led what turned out to be the only South rally. She hit a pair of free throws and a 15-foot jumper to bring the South to within 20 points (44-24) with 6:09 left. But Miss Cleveland, who won the free-throw-shooting contest here this past week, bounced back with one of her suicide lane drives, was fouled and ended up with three points.

The North, shooting 56 per cent the first half (14-of-25) outshot the Southerners all night long.

On the evening, the North was 49 per cent from the field (26-of-53), while the South shot a faltering 28 per cent (14-of-50).

The rebounding was even at 31 caroms each. The North committed 26 miscues to 22 for the South, but the

South failed to take advantage often enough to make any difference.

"They just came out hot, and we came out cold," said South guard coach Mrs. Sidney Weaver of Houston Cy-Fair High School.

"I honestly don't think the trap was that big a factor. The Bryon Adams girl (Miss Reeves) was hot late, and the Thornton girl was hot early. We kept looking for a hot hand and just never found one. I'll bet we didn't shoot more than 10 or 15 per cent."

"What did we shoot?" "I feel like our forward-end trap hurt them early," said North coach Cathy Wilson. "I really do."

Miss Wilson coached the North forwards.

"It was definitely the trap early, then Ginger was finding a seam in their defense. You always look for a super star in an all-star game, but my girls were all just playing like a team. I can't pick out any one girl who didn't contribute to-night."

"When you get that many good players in one game, somebody's going to break loose," said Miss Thornton.

"It just happened to be the open one in the first half. It could have been one of the other guys."

"It happened to be me. Carol had the same thing happen in the second half." "I think we were a little better prepared than they were, and I believe our forwards were better," said Rosemary Schulte, the scrappy leader of Nazareth's Class B state champions in 1977.

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

Health officials discuss dumpgrounds

A full house was present at the City Hall Tuesday morning when officials from the cities of Spearman and Gruver met with state health officials to discuss the local dump grounds or trash grounds as they are called.

Mark Neff and city engineer representative from Dumas discussed the Spearman dump ground situation with the three state officials, and the meeting was very informative to everyone present. Neff stated to the state officials that the city is now removing the usable metal from the dump ground, and probably in approximately two years the city would start covering the entire area with land fill. This seemed to meet the approval of the state officials, and the city apparently has been granted a permit to use the 25.6 acres at the present site. The city

is presently looking at 2 more land fill areas, and the state seemed to be impressed with the progress being made at the dump grounds.

Gruver officials appeared to have received a favorable report from the state officials and they just completed their new trench - for covering of trash on Monday of this week and they are going to start covering all of their trash immediately.

This newspaper would like to compliment the officials of Spearman and Gruver, and the county commissioners who attended the meeting Tuesday morning. It will take a great joint effort from all involved and we do appreciate the time and effort on the part of the state officials who have seemed to be very fair with our local situations. Two arraigned for assaulting officers

Two Spearman residents, Romiro Arjona Jr., 21, and Joe Oliveriz, 29, were arraigned Tuesday, July 19, before Justice of the Peace J.P. Vernon in Spearman on charges resulting from a fight with sheriff's deputies last Saturday.

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reported Arjona was arraigned for obstructing a police officer in line of duty, a misdemeanor, and Oliveriz was arraigned for aggravated assault on a police officer, a felony offense.

Bond of \$5,000 was set for Oliveriz and he was remanded to the custody of the sheriff pending further court proceedings.

Arjona was released under personal recognizance bond of \$500.

The incident occurred when Messer stopped an eastbound car on the Gruver highway approximately two and a half miles west of Spearman after it had been reported the vehicle containing four persons had been endangering other vehicular traffic on the highway.

Oliveriz was driving and when asked to step out of the car and place his hands on the hood of the vehicle tried to shove Messer. Messer wrestled the man to the ground to restrain him and the other three individuals in the car jumped out to assist Oliveriz.

Passers by notified the sheriff's office and Quimby was dispatched to assist Messer.

In the ensuing shuffle, Messer received a blow to the bridge of the nose deep enough to bleed and form a scab.

Governor Briscoe pointed out the safety must be a personal commitment and an integral part of everyday living. It's up to each farmer, he said, to protect priceless human resources through such practices as developing a home fire escape plan, storing clearly marked poisons well out of children's reach, training family and workers to perform tasks safely, and providing and wearing appropriate protective equipment so that accidents aren't given a chance to happen.

Since traffic, firearms and drowning accidents pose the greatest hazards for Texas farm families, a specific investment in their prevention would be worth during Farm Safety Week.

Drivers can learn to avoid collisions in the eight-hour National Safety Council Defensive Course. Offered regularly around the state, it can also save graduates 10% on their automobile insurance.

More information is available from the Texas Safety Association, P.O. Box 9345, Austin, Texas 78766. The National Rifle Association's Hunter and Firearm Safety Courses (coordinated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept.) and the American Red Cross First Aid and Learn-To-Swim Courses also provide valuable safety training.
