Activity Bocks Again
Dear Editor
The student body has been bewildered and angered at the recent policy of taking up activity books when they are misused. There has been some talk that this is a new rule, however it is the same rule but the new part is the enforcement of it.

Our whole family background teaches us to share what we have, particularly if it is something that would be wasted otherwise. Then why, if we have a ticket we can't use, shouldn't we give it to our friends like we would a theater ticket.

The difference is the way the ticket is made. The price of a theater ticket is set up so that for each one sold a seat is available and a profit is made on that seat. This is a business proposition

The student activity ticket can be compared to health insurance policy or any other collective agreement where the law of averages is used. You are not expected to attend every function any more than everyone with an insurance policy is expected to be sick all the time. Here is where another mistake is made. Some students who don't go to the artist course nor to one other program phase feel they have wasted money; but if they atteended the athletic events alone they would have saved fourteen dollars. The ticket entitles you to make a choice of the types of entertainments, but it is very easy to receive more than the price of the activity book in admissions.

We, the students, then are buying a part of a fund which will pay us entertainment dividends. The fund is designated so that each person gets his money's worth but not that he attends everything on the list. When a student uses his ticket to attend more than the calculated number of functions, then he is getting more than his share. This would still be alright as long as the student (who is an exception to the rule), is the one who pays into the pot, but when a person who chooses not to use our fund passes through the basketball gate with a borrowed ticket, he is probably using money that was to send me to an artist course. Remember you weren't expected to attend that game, but when your ticket came an outsider drew extra money out of our pot. You have then created an artificial exception to the rule. If others doan their tickets, they too would be exceptions until our having a choice of entertainment would disappear. You then pay $\$ 35$ to see $\$ 35$ worth of athletic events alone and when you missed you would then really lose money because you paid to soo every game.

To loan your book then is like expecting your insur mee company to pay your next door neighbor's hospital bill (he wouldn't buy a policy himself) because you haven't oeen sick this week

Our fund is now able to sive you a choice of nearly 145 worth of entertainment. This means that we give you who contributed plus the leaches who use a book but don't pay, this wide selection. If our' books wereri't loaned then our pot would be divided among those who paid; hence you might get a choiec of $\$ 50$ worth. This would be because hose without a ticket and who wanted to attend would have to buy a regular price ticket and contribute to our fund. If those without an activity ticket would buy, then we would have a choice of $\$ 60$ to $\$ 70$ worth or we could lower our selection and cut the price of the activity ricket.

If you will pay your union fee, affiliate with a church group and buy an activity book, then there will be little cason to spend extra money for your social life
