Our campus community is currently faced with a multitude of problems and inadequacies.

We are a multi-purpose university of 16,000, with a new Law School and a proposed Medical School, and yet we are named a Technological College.

Our plant facilities have grown tremendously, but our quality of professors has remained the same. For, we are unable to get top professors to even consider our school because we are on the AAUP blacklist. Moreover, we are the second oldest school in the nation on this list.

VP Write-In Attempt Picks Up Momentum

A newly-formed Vice Presidential Committee of Students Wednesday launched a write-in campaign supporting A. E. (Ziggy) Nicholson for vice president of the Student Association.

Nicholson will oppose Gary Rose, who previously had no opponent. The only other vice presidential candidate was forced to withdraw several weeks ago due to a lack of necessary hours.

A WRITE-IN campaign has never before been conducted for an executive office at Tech, although a Freshman Council member was elected by write-in several years ago. The Constitution, By-Laws and Election Code of the Student Association say nothing concerning a write-in campaign.

Current Vice President Scott Allen said the write-in votes would be allowed provided they are marked correctly.

Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Bob Fillpot said a write-in campaign at Tech would be legal "because it (a write-in campaign) is a tool of the democratic process."

MEMBERS OF the committee backing Nicholson include Larry Strickland, president of the Interfraternity Council; Garland Weeks, president of the Rodeo Association; Collier Perry, past member of the Supreme Court; Donny Anderson, co-captain of the 1965 football team; Jack McClure, chairman of the Traffic Appeals Board; and G. W. Bailey, member of the University Theater.

A spokesman for the committee said they were organizing the write-in campaign because they did

not believe a candidate unopposed on the ballot should be elected to an executive office.

"If the mayor of Lubbock can be elected on a write-in ballot, so can the vice president of the Student Association at Tech," Perry said Wednesday night.

THE COMMITTEE has organized a door-to-door campaign through the dorms and is expected to have representatives located near the polls Friday.

Nicholson is a past member of the Student Senate, current head cheerleader, a former member of the Saddle Tramps, Alpha Delta Sigma and Delta Tau Delta.

He will not speak at the election rally tonight, and his name will not appear on the signs listing candidates' numbers at the polls.

ALLEN SAID persons wishing to cast a write-in ballot would have to mark two numbers in the same column to invalidate their IBM ballot. They then must write in the name of their candidate in the appropriate column.

These ballots will have to be counted by hand. Votes cast for candidates in the other races will also be counted, Allen said. The column for the write-in candidate will be erased and the ballot run back through the computer.

Nicholson could not be reached for comment as of late Wednesday night. However, members of the committee said he was contacted early Wednesday after being out of town this week.

year-old rules which are erratically enforced—the Code of Student Affairs. We are forced to pay for athletic events that we cannot see, and we pay for meals that we do not eat. We have a ridiculous system of registration, which causes frustration.

We have a weak system of academic and athletic recruitment. The list is almost endless!

But, the most appalling fact is that the people who have control over these areas do not listen to students and insist on the philosophy of *in loco parentis* (in the place of the parent).

Yet, we now have hope that many of these wrongs will be corrected. We have a new President and new hope. Dr. Murray said that we will have a new name and that we will be taken off the AAUP blacklist. With his coming we have hope that the Code of Student Affairs will be

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Gary Rose Outlines Vice President's Job

The year ahead promises to be one of the greatest in the history of Texas Tech. It will be a year of growth, of challenge, of achievement, with unlimited opportunities for the students of Tech to share in the building of a great university. If we, as students, are to accept this opportunity, we must have an effective Student Senate for the direction of our effort.

It is the responsibility of the vice president to organize and direct this representative body of the students, the Senate. Before any successful action can be undertaken, Senators themselves must be aware of their responsibilities. Absences should be published in the Toreador with three unexcused absences resulting in the immediate removal of a Senator. Meetings should be held on a more formal basis with a stricter adherence to the rules of Parliamentary Procedure. In addition, committee organization should be strengthened to insure the adequate participation of all Senators.

Once the Senate has a sturdy foundation through organization, Senators must begin to act. They must call for fair student repre-

sentation in the revision of the Code of Student Affairs. The name change issue must be revived and student opinion recognized. Communication with the faculty and administration can be improved by the exchange of ideas and opinions at Senate luncheons. Debate within the Senate should be encouraged. The Freshman Coun-

cil should be given added responsibilities. Senators should question what has become of the proposed entrance fountain. Inquiries should be made concerning the establishment of a Phi Beta Kappa chapter at Tech. Academic recruiting could be strengthened by the planning of a special weekend for high school students to visit Tech. Such events as the Engineering Show, the Interscholastic League, a Tech Union special event and an outstanding speaker would make it worthwhile for both Tech and high school students. A committee should be appointed this spring to lay the groundwork for such a weekend. Finally, the efforts of the food, registration and academic evaluation committees should be continued.

The students of Texas Tech must share in the process of student government if the Senate is to be effective. By broadcasting Senate meetings on KTXT, holding some Senate meetings in the Snackbar of the Union and encouraging students to talk with Senators during their office hours, the Senate can be aware of student opinion. It is only fair to say, however, that the Student Senate will be a direct product of the quality of Senators elected and the results that the students demand.

Each year at this time we find ourselves faced with the problem of electing our executive officers for the next year. But certainly this should not be termed a problem, for the election of these officers is of great importance to Tech.

about those affairs that concern them.

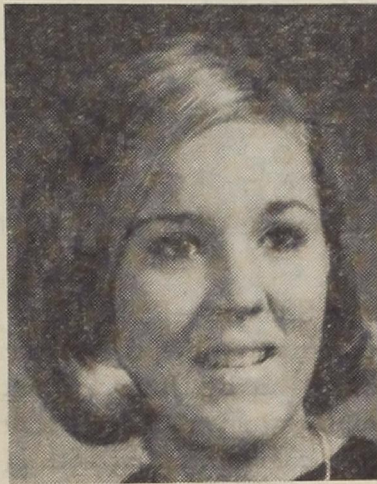
Another change that needs to be made for information's sake would be the listing of the executive officers and the student senators and the schools they represent in the Directory for use by the Tech students. Too often we forget just who does represent us, and this could serve as a reminder and a phone list if one wished to call any of them to express an idea.

Still another change that needs to be definitely looked into is the "Code of Student Affairs." This booklet is not widely known, but it states the code by which Tech students are to conduct themselves. I feel it is outdated in parts; it is very contradictory and is vague as to who has the power to interpret it. I feel a complete investigation should be made into this booklet.

As the secretary's duties include taking minutes of Senate proceedings and being in charge of elections, I have suggestions concerning these responsibilities. After each meeting, I suggest posting a complete copy of the minutes on the bulletin board outside the Senate Council office, so that all interested students and faculty members would be in the "know." I would also carry out the placing of a sample ballot with detailed voting instructions and poll distributions in the Toreador before each election, so that more efficient voting may be carried out. I would also carry work out and carry out a plan so that voting would be a much more private privilege.

Along with voting comes politics, both local and national. Politics are heavy on the Tech campus, and I feel, therefore, that Government Day can prove to be a project of great importance in future years. Yes, it is only beginning now, but

Next fall Texas Tech's enrollment will skyrocket to around 20,000 people. But a university is more than 20,000 students. It depends on the co-operation of the whole campus to provide an atmosphere of freedom and academic excellence, to properly name the school and to offer adequate facilities to these students.

Although Tech has unlimited potential, we fall behind in many areas. We will continue to lag until we are removed from the A.A.U.P. blacklist and until our name is changed to Texas State University. Our library is receiving an enormous grant for ex-

pansion and we, the students, have no voice as to how it will be used.

Next year will be a crucial one in Tech's history, for we are getting a new president. He is a progressive man filled with vigor and new ideas. We will need a student government with ideals that can match his high standards of excellence.

I feel that the following four ideas would contribute significantly to the improvement of Texas Tech in many areas.

1. The adoption of a system of optional meal tickets for students eating in dorms, if this plan is at all feasible. Under this students would have two choices: either to continue paying room and board as is done now or to buy meal tickets on a pay-as-you-go system, entirely separate from room payment. This, I believe, would benefit students who do not eat every meal in the dormitory.

FRIDAY AND SATURDAY will be "Visitors' Day" on the Tech campus this week, with welcome guests coming in abundant supplies.

- University Interscholastic League—Beginning Friday, contestants from area Class B, A and AA schools will be on campus for spring competition. While not competing, they will be looking over the Tech campus and drawing conclusions about the school and its students. This is a good time for everyone to be goodwill ambassadors and explain Tech to these students, who are the "cream of the crop" of future college classes.

- Science and Engineering Show—As usual, the Science and Engineering show is building up a classy display of exhibits. Many of the exhibits have been designed and constructed by students just for this annual event, and others are the works of today's technological advances. In any case, they are all good examples of what students are learning in the classrooms and how they can apply this learning, and this is where many visitors come to see what is being done in this phase of higher education today.

- Board of Directors—The Tech Board of Directors will be on campus this weekend, also. They are expected to study and act on new academic buildings, the names of several unnamed dormitories and possibly the construction of some new dorms. - Honor Students—Perhaps one of the least-known activities this weekend will be carried on by Junior Council. Members of the women's service honorary have been communicating with high school honor students, inviting them to come to Tech this weekend and learn what it's all about up here. Their requests have been answered, and many future college students will be up here this weekend. And this is more of the type of recruiting that needs to be done here—by individual groups interested in the future of the school.

- Science Fair—Featuring work done by high school students, these exhibits often indicate the talents of those on the way up. They are both interesting and educational, in addition to complementing the UIL competition and the Science and Engineering Show.

- Sports—College sports will just about run the gamut of events Friday and Saturday with a triangular track meet here with Tech, Baylor and A&M; baseball games between Tech and Texas Western; golf matches with Tech, Texas and A&M; and even an intra-squad Red Raider football game. At least plenty will be going on to provide relaxation and entertainment for the multitude of guests.

Other guests will be here for various short courses and open houses in some departments, and they are all welcome.

We hope that Tech students will do their part to make them all welcome, too, and help them as much as possible—just by being themselves.

Mahon Discusses Research Grants

EDITOR'S NOTE—The following letter was sent to Dr. R. C. Goodwin, Tech president, by Texas Representative George Mahon.

Dear Bob:

As you know, over the years I have been most interested in being of assistance to Tech in securing appropriate research grants from government agencies. We have only had limited success. There has been a recent development which I think may prove to be most helpful to the college and to the government.

In response to criticism which I have directed along with others, at the geographical imbalance existing in the allocations of government financed research grants and contracts among the states, the Department of Defense plans to initiate, in fiscal year 1967, a new "University Program." The objective of the new program is to develop new centers of technical excellence in the country. The concentration of the government's research efforts in a relatively small number of larger universities has been a matter of concern for many years. I have discussed this problem with Dr. Donald Horning, the President's advisor on Science and Technology, the Defense Science Board, officials of the Department and others.

The Department of Defense "University Program" has not been completed in all its details, and will not be completed before May 1, but my understanding is that the Department of Defense plans to take the initiative itself and systematically visit universities which have not at this time had the opportunity to bid for Department of Defense research work. The Department will assist such institutions in determining their capabilities and will give them information on preparation of proposals to perform research. Either 405 universities and colleges awarding Masters degrees in science or 178 awarding Doctorates will be contacted initially. The decision has not yet been made as to which. In either case, Texas Technological College will be contacted. The Defense Department anticipates spending \$18 or \$20 million during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1966, on the new program.

Although a great many capable

men are affiliated with such large universities as the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of California, many other excellent scientists and engineers are associated with smaller universities which have not been utilized very extensively by the Department of Defense. It is with a view to tapping this "undeveloped resource" that the government is embarking on the new program.

The "University Program" is being administered in the Department of Defense by the Office of the Director of Defense Research and Engineering, headed by Dr. John Foster. Dr. Foster has stated that the program involves five major points:

1. The Defense Department is compiling an inventory of research missions appropriated for university graduate research and related to defense needs. This compilation will be mailed out to various universities as indicators of the kinds of things that are of interest to the Department of Defense.

2. The Department of Defense will attempt to analyze the research situation at each of the universities as to present support and the strengths of each institution.

3. Effort will be made to utilize academic institutions which are near Defense research facilities in the work of that Defense facility.

4. The Department will attempt to package a number of individual research tasks together and assign them to a university rather than continue the multiple individual contracts or grants administered by each of the military services and the Department of Defense.

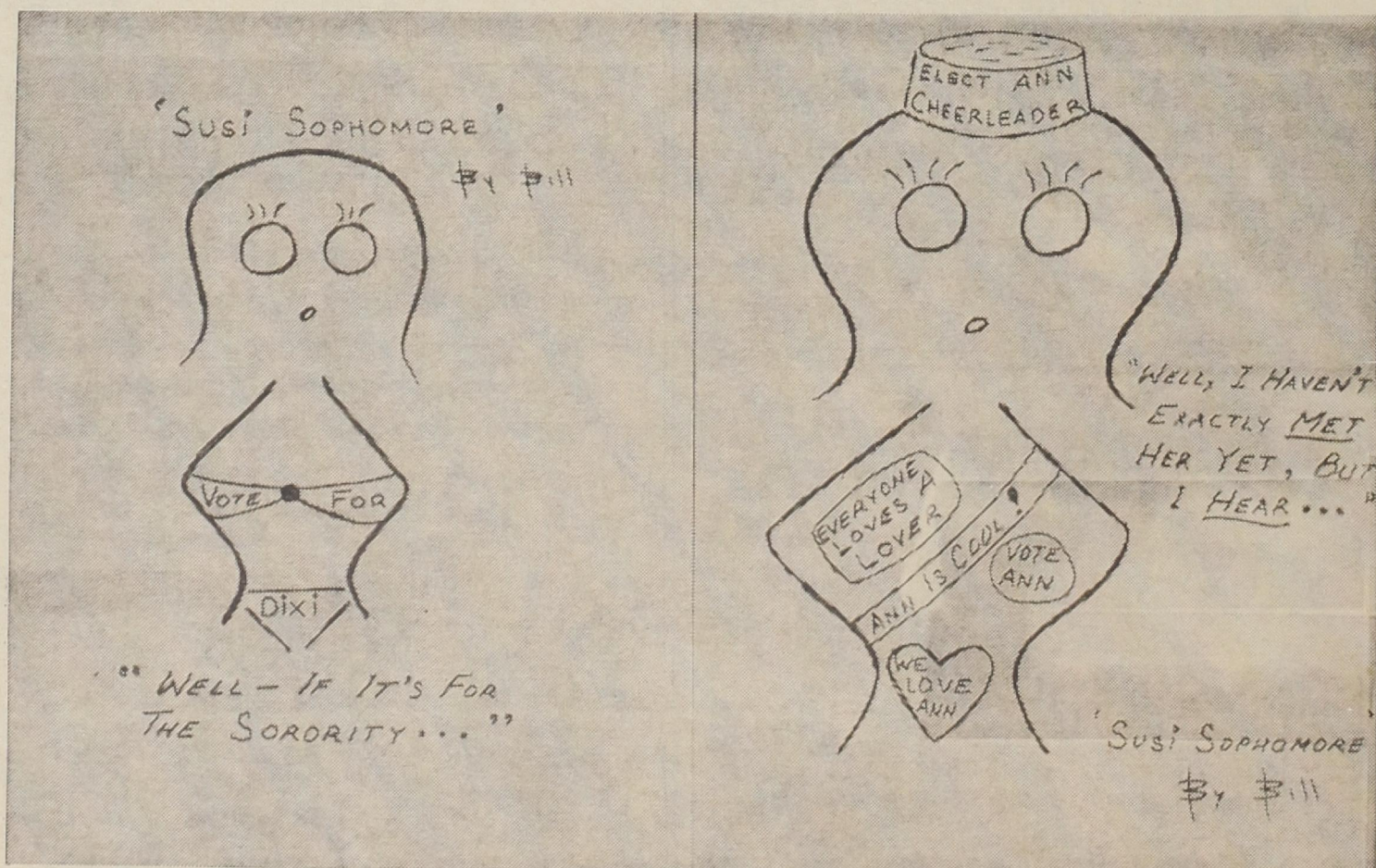
5. After the above four steps are completed the Department will select the new academic programs when the proposals are received and funds appropriated.

It is thought that the average program size will be about \$200,000 annually. A program would probably run three years before a critical review was made of its progress, in order to allow a reasonable time for development. Of course, \$200,000 annually will not create a center of excellence immediately. The long-range aim is to assist the institute in establishing a competence which will in turn attract other contracts and grants. Institutes with "heavy" Defense Department funding at the present time will not be permitted to participate in the new program, but "heavy" funding has not yet been defined.

The President is personally interested in this program and his Office of Science and Technology will develop similar programs in all Government agencies which perform research.

I will see that you are furnished more complete information as to the details of the operation of the program just as soon as possible. I hope, as I know you do, that Texas Tech may move forward and occupy an impressive position among the colleges of the country in the field of research. You may be sure of my continued and fullest cooperation with the college.

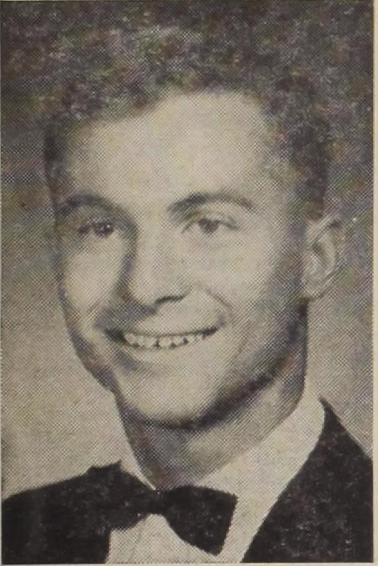

Texas Tech has grown to be a multi-purpose university. Now is the time to foster effective, firm student leadership to bring Tech into the realistic realm of a true "university."

As the activities of student organizations increase due to the blossoming Texas Tech, there is a corresponding demand for student support and funds from the allocations of the business manager. He is responsible for the financial arrangements for our cheerleaders in representing Tech at athletic events. Efficient use of

the money allocated would enable them to attend more games.

I would propose the publication in the Toreador of the allocations of money to organizations as set up by the budget of the Student Allocations Committee. I believe that the students should know where their money is being spent.

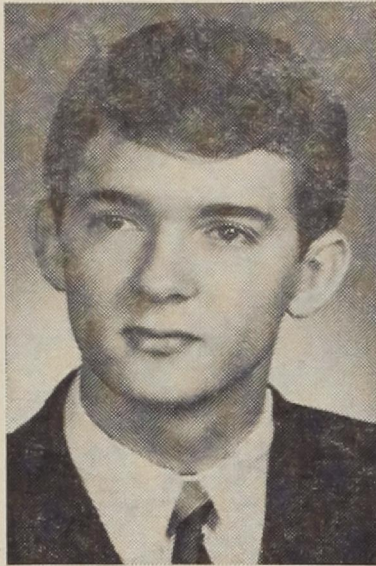
However, the responsibility of being in charge of the Student Government office and managing the financial affairs of the Student Association are only minimum requirements.

First, the position of business manager has the power to influence the administration concerning room reservations. One general criticism in this area is the forty dollar room deposit which is not refundable for any circumstances during the school year. The property deposit is not refundable unless the student withdraws from school at the end of the spring semester. I believe that this situation should be revised to consider special cases in which a refund would be justified.

Second, the Business Manager, as the students' representative on the Student Service Fee Allocations Committee, should coordinate a move toward a more suitable seating arrangement for basketball and football games. Each student should be guaranteed a seat at any event, or else modify the present method of the student's purchasing admission to an athletic event.

Finally, if Texas Tech is ever to be in a prominent university en-

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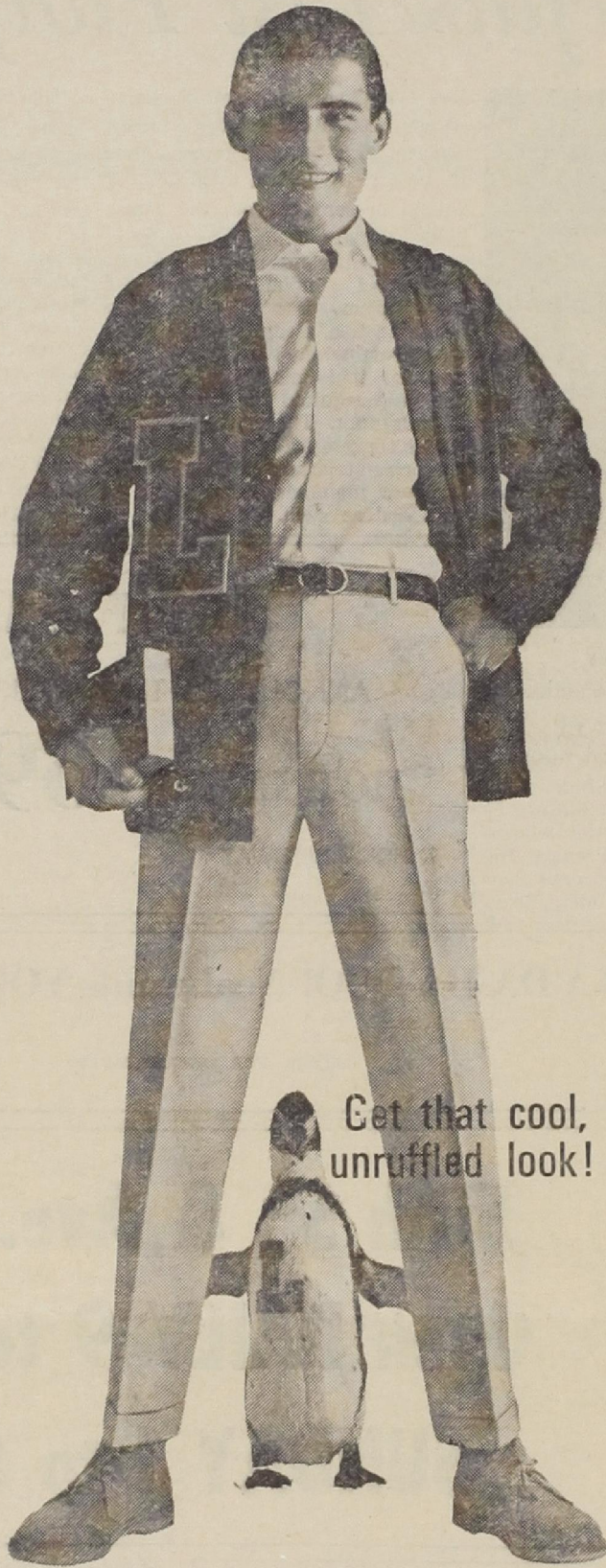

updated, and that registration will be re-evaluated.

The most important hope is that we will have a voice in how we are governed. But, we must realize that Dr. Murray cannot do all of these things by himself. And we must realize that problems take time to solve. But, at the same time, if we are right in what we believe and right in what we want to do, we must stand firm and fight for what is ours—our right as students to help make the rules which we are under. This is the only way a democratic society can exist, and the only way we can have a democratic campus society.

The Student Association must be ready to represent the students' views and must be ready to stand for students' rights. The President of the Student Association must be always ready to listen and work for student opinion. He must run an efficient and effective Student Association.

My plan for next year is to represent the students' views as they should be represented. I propose that the President should attend all Senate meetings, that he should write a weekly column in the Toreador, that he should have open forums for interested students to ask him questions on Student Association policy.

The President should see that the executive officers expand their work and influence. The President should strive to upgrade the judicial system by finding the best qualified justices. He must be ready to enact any legislation that the Senate does not. He must be ready to work to better our relations with the city of Lubbock, and other Southwest Conference schools.

stitchery, and a painting "The Head." Roger Allen placed third with "The Entry." Prizes of \$25, \$15, and \$10 were awarded for the respective places.

In the non-art division, Richard McCoy won both first and second places of \$25 and \$15, for his paintings of "Vivacious Nudnick," and "The Pink Panther." Kay Fredrikson's entry "Sunset Sailing" won third place.

Due to the lack of entries in the graduate division, only one prize of \$25 was awarded to Les Lawrence for his entry, "Landscape."

Judges for the contest were James Pinson of Pinson Interiors, Mrs. R. E. Pollard, from the art department of Lubbock Christian College, and Deane Pierce, Lubbock architect.

The paintings will be on exhibit in the Tech Union until April 22. The artists are asked to come by the Mesa Room, that day, to pick up their paintings.

U.S. Jets Halt Viet Traffic

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Bridge-busting U.S. jets hurtling past challenging missiles, have just about halted all main highway traffic in the North Vietnamese industrial heartland between Hanoi and Haiphong, American authorities said Wednesday.

Carrier-based Navy A4 Skyhawks blasted a railroad bridge and a companion highway bridge only 10 miles north of Haiphong Tuesday in their closest strike of the war to that Communist supply port.

A spokesman said one span of the railroad bridge and two spans of the highway bridge were destroyed in this third straight day of attacks on Red River delta targets.

No. 9 Donates \$50 To Fund

Men's No. 9 will donate \$50 to the Tech fountain fund as a result of their recent seat belt drive, according to dorm president Lyn McClellan.

Dorm residents sold and installed 85 sets of seat belts in the April 2 drive. The first belt was installed free in the car of Mrs. Dorothy Garner, coordinator of women's housing.

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Eight Vacancies Left

Eight openings remain for Tech students, faculty or members of their immediate families on a charter flight to Europe this summer.

The jet flight, which is being sponsored by the Texas Interscholastic Student Association (TISA) and the Tech Student Senate, will leave from Dallas June 9 to fly to Brussels, Belgium. The flight will return August 29.

The cost of the round-trip transportation is \$345, approximately one-half regular commercial rates. Tours in Europe may be arranged through the Senate.

Those making the trip may use the 11 weeks for whatever they want to do. The Tech group will travel on the same plane as a group from Rice University.

Eighty-five persons from Tech have signed up for the trip, according to Andy Wilson, TISA representative in charge of arrangements for the Senate. Many students are going either to study or to work, he said. Some are planning to hitch-hike throughout much of Europe.

Wilson said the trip will be made available every summer if it is successful this year.

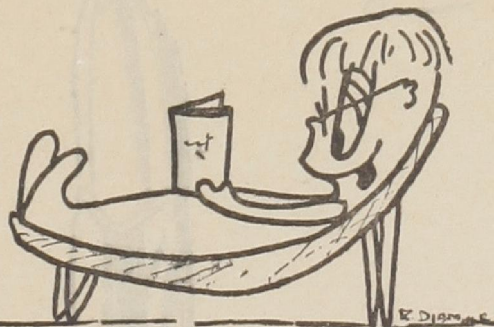
Those signed up for the trip and anyone interested in the remaining eight spaces will meet at 6 p.m. April 27 in the Biology Auditorium.

nized for leadership. I have been active in many student organizations, including Saddle Tramps, Science and Engineering Show Steering Committee, Pi Tau Sigma engineering honorary and other professional organizations. I have also served as a member of the Interfraternity Council and as an executive officer of my fraternity. While participating in these various activities, I have been able to maintain a 3.00 overall grade point average in engineering.

Next fall Texas Tech will be undergoing a dramatic change with the arrival of our new president, Grover Murray. Since this will be an "era of change," my platform must reflect this transition. The administration's outdated attitude toward students is the greatest problem now facing the student body. As president, I would voice student opinion to Dr. Murray in seeking a revision of our present Code of Student Affairs and other administration policies toward students and student life. I would seek equal representation of students on committees formulating and interpreting the rules which govern students' lives. In carrying out this basic theme, other planks in my platform which I would propose are:

1) To work closely with Dr. Murray in seeking to remove Texas Tech from the A.A.U.P. "blacklist."

2) To submit to a referendum of the student body, the issue of a name change.

3) To advance Texas Tech's public image through public relations.

4) To increase communications between the student government and the student body by initiating a regular column in the Toreador by the Student Association President.

5) To advance the academic quality in our university by promoting academic recruiting, the honors program, and course and instructor evaluation.

6) To strengthen and expand the judicial system of our Student Association, so that students will be judged by students.

7) To encourage the formation and operation of dormitory council. Thus, the student could take a more active part in the solution of his problems, such as food service, parking regulations, and phone restrictions.

8) To investigate the possibilities of more pre-registration and consolidating registration procedures into the coliseum to alleviate existing problems.

9) To expand the president's executive cabinet positions and their functions.

10) To advocate increased participation in the Texas Intercollegiate Student Association and the expansion of the SWC Sportsmanship Committee to include a student body president's conference.

The success of a student government program depends on the individuals involved—their degree of understanding of the purposes of student government and their ability to plan and execute a program that is consonant with these purposes. I feel that I have this understanding and ability because of my background in student government and sincerely believe I am most qualified to represent our student body as President of the Texas Tech Student Association.

The Honors Council will elect officers for 1966-67 at 2 p.m. Sunday in the Anniversary Room of the Tech Union.



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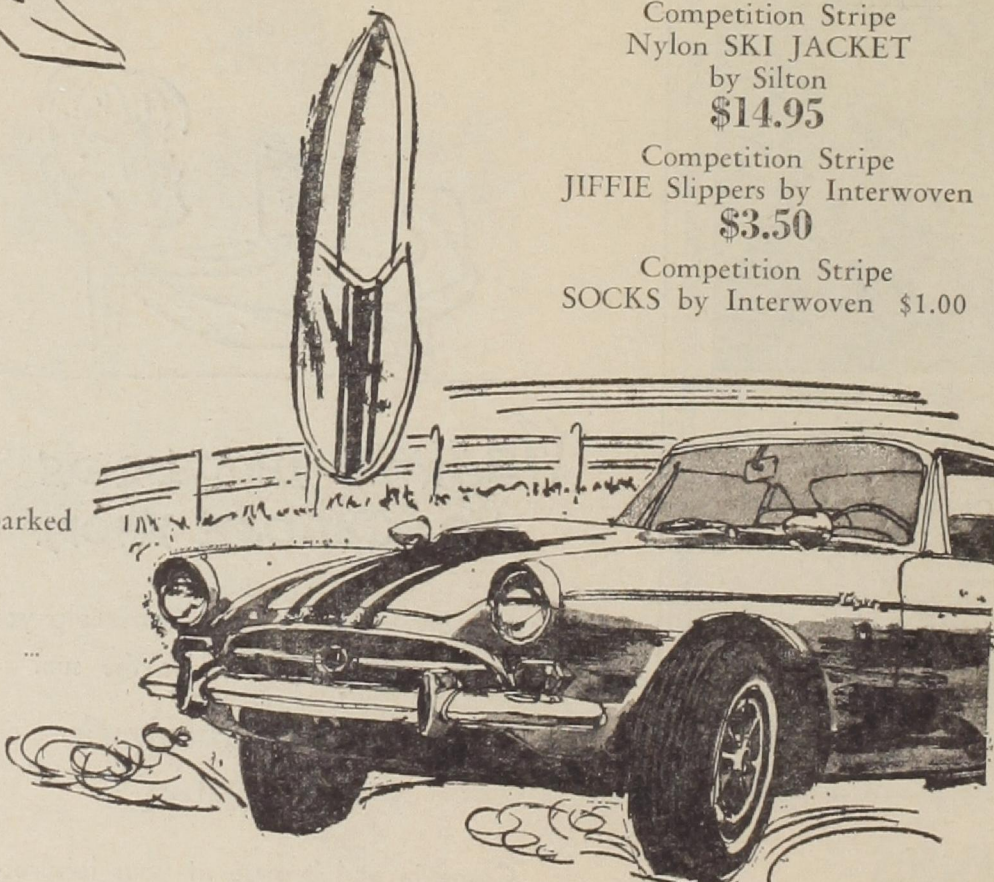
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
