marks on Tech quizzes, Charles
replied:
"All I have to do is memorize
the textbooks that the professors

material back to them on test
day." His study consists of listening

Braille textbooks. Though all
books required are not published
in Braille, he claims that books
are available on almost any sub-
ject and that he can learn what is

necessary from available Braille
editions.
"Concentration is a natural gift

pointed out in an interview, add-
ing that he has absolutely no dis-
traction when studying. 'It's per-
