

### Tech leses a friend

THE death of R. Wright Armstrong of Fort Worth last week has deprived Texas Tech-nological College of a true friend.

Mr. Armstrong, appointed a member of the loard of directors in 1961 by Gov. Price Daniel, served as chairman from August, 1964, until June 1 of this year. He announced his resignation in April, 10 months before his term was to expire, secause of poor health.

It is only fitting that future biographers will need to come to Texas Tech for materials con-cerning Mr. Armstrune's life. More than 9,000 of his personal papers, dated from 1926 to 1962, are now in Tech's Southwest Collection. He donated them in 1963 and 1964.

Mr. Armstrong's interest in and efforts for Texas Tech will be missed. The school is fortunate to have had him serve on its board.
