Control of the Democratic

Party became an issue Thursday along the Texas campaign trails. Speaker of the Texas House Ben Barnes, unopposed for re-election as representative from De Leon, told a group of oil men in Amarillo he is concerned about voter apathy, particularly at the precinct convention level.

"If the people don't show more interest they are running a chance of losing the fine leadership they have had over the past several years," Barnes said.

Stanley Woods, a Democratic primary candidate for governor, wired a protest to State Democratic Chairman Will Davis, Austin. Woods said he had discovered Davis was actively campaigning

"Your appearance Tuesday night before a group of precinct chairmen in Austin is living proof of what I have been saving: That Connally thinks he owns the Democratic Party and the government of Texas'," wire said.

Connally flew to Houston Thursday to introduce President Johnson at the \$1,000-a-plate President's Club dinner for favored party contributors.

Demo Control Chief Justice Will Becomes Issue Not Judge Hearing

The Supreme Court ruled Thursday that Chief Justice Bob Fillpot would not sit in judgment in the Court's upcoming hearing of an appeal protesting a decision made by the Elections Committee.

Campaign Manager

Fillpot served as campaign manager for Max Blakney, a candidate in the recent election for business manager of the Student Association. The appeal before the Court is concerned with the campaign of Johnny Walker, Blakney's opponent.

The appeal was based on the Elections Committee's decision not to consider a protest filed by Lyn McClellan because no written rule had been violated. The complaint accused Walker campaigners of placing campaign literature under dormitory doors.

Student Association President Roland Anderson will appoint an interim justice to replace Fillpot on the court.

Interim Justice

Since court rules and procedures and the Student Association Constitution and By-Laws say nothing about appointment of an interim justice, the court ruled Thursday that the appointment will be legal. The appointment will keep the number of justices at seven, and prevent the possibility of a tie vote.

However, Anderson's appointment will have to have the approval of the Student Senate. Consequently, Anderson has called a special session of the 1965-66 Senate for Monday at 5 p.m. The place will be announced later.

Court Procedure

Fillpot asked the court that he be allowed to step down, an action which they approved. In regard to this, court rules and procedures state the following:

'No justices shall sit in judgment on cases in which they have a personal interest or a bias which would prevent their objective consideration of the merits of the litigants' arguments. The court shall be the sole judge of the qualifications of its members to try cases."





What is the main purpose of student senators from each school? Is this responsibility being carried out fully? I don't believe that it is, and not because of the senators own neglect; but because of the lack of communication between the elected representatives and their constituents.

There is presently no effective method to relay the wishes and complaints from the voters to their respective senators. I feel that a suggestion box placed in each academic building would give every person a right to express his own personal views about the Senate and its policies. These suggestions would be read by the senators from the constituents' school so that proposals concerning them could be formulated and presented to the Senate. I believe that in this way every interested student could participate in the student government; therefore leading to true representation.

I also feel strongly about revising registration. While serving on the Freshman Council this past year, I worked on a committee to study the present registration procedure including pre-registra-tion. Through a survey taken by this group, I have formed several ideas which I think will help ease this problem.

She does much of her paper work after 5 p.m. because she believes she can do more accurate work when she can adequately "concentrate" on a matter. Often deadlines on statistical information necessitate that she work much more than a normal eight-to-five day.

Other duties Miss Clewell performs include checking grades for organizations to determine eligibility, determining students who qualify for the annual All-College Recognition Service each spring, distributing class tickets and cards to departments during registration (approximately 280,000 of them), and keeping up with enrollment figures during registration.

However, it would be difficult to describe Miss Clewell's job as a "duty" to her. To her it is an opportunity to work with young people, to be of help to other administrators and to help Texas Tech run more smoothly.

Miss Clewell came to Tech in August, 1929 as a secretary in the Registrar's Office. She became an assistant registrar in 1935, a position she has occupied over since.

Miss Clewell is a member of the Tech Campus Planning Committee, an appointment which adds considerably to the time she spends working for Texas Tech.

Few persons realize the contribution Miss Evelyn Clewell makes to Texas Technological College, something she has been doing for 37 years. She is indeed a member of the "behind-the-scenes" person-


