# **Class** Changes **Can Be Reduced**

IT IS NOT an uncommon sight at this period of the semester to see a student hurrying through the shade of the hustle and bustle of registration), and then paying the \$3 charged for this action.

The procedure of changing classes, which costs valuable time for both the student and college offi-

valuable time for both the student and conege of the cials, arises from two situations. One is that the student finds he doesn't like 8 a.m. Saturday classes, or he finds that Advanced Calculus is harder than he expected, or a dozen other asinine reasons. The \$3 fee is designed to stop this.

The other situation is that John Q. Techsan finds out to his horror at the first class meeting that he has Prof. Blow as an instructor — Mr. Techsan has flunked this particular course three times under Prof.

Blow. When this situation arises, a \$3 fee seldom keeps the students from transferring to more pleasant sur-

roundings. To erase the later situation, and thus to prevent the loss of time connected with changing classes, a student should be allowed to know which instructor he is getting when he registers for a certain class. **\* \* \* \*** By adding the name of the instructor next to the course and section numbers on the general class schedule (which isn't done now), the student would know which instructor he would draw for a particu-lar class while he is making out his personal class class while he is making out his personal class schedule.

This would also aid the instructors, because often they don't know in advance the exact sections they will be teaching.

The procedure of omitting the instructors' names from the general class schedule developed mainly be-cause many sections would be empty and others over-flowing if the students knew which instructors would

However, if an instructor does his job so badly as to frighten all the students away from his sections, he shouldn't be teaching anyway. Recently there was a committee formed to study

ways to improve registration. They would do well to study the possibilities of letting the students know who the instructors in the different sections are.

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



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
