## South May Foster New Major Party

DEVELOPMENTS OVER the past few months have led us to believe that there will envolve from the South a third major political party

The cause of such an action would be integration. Both the Democratic and Republican parties will have been forced to favor integration in almost all aspects.

The main conflict should arise at the convention for nominating a Democratic presidential candidate. The South will not be ready to accept integration as will be stated on the party platform, and therefore will not go along with the presidential choice

A walkout on the national convention would more than likely occur after a pro civil rights platform is adopted.

At a national convention site in the Deep South, this new party would nominate a pro-segregation southern governor for its presidential candidate.

This party would probably pull slightly more than half of the southern votes, but would not approach the other two parties in this respect.

The party would advocate segregation, white supremacy, states rights and sectional interests. Most of its national power would lie in its members in congress and southern state governments.

Most of the southern moderates would stay with the democratic party because of its long established reputation. Negroes and other minority groups in the south would remain with the two major parties because of the white supremacy aim-that is, rural an-glo-saxon white-of the party

Because the more moderate elements of the south would refuse to associate with the party, it would slowly lose power.

Integration in the south would be speeded when the southern moderates that stay in the democratic party accept the pro civil rights platform.

Integration would gain in the South even more as the third party deteriorates, and finally, integration would be complete.

Before such a complete change takes place in the southern states, these people should begin working on a solution acceptable to them, and to the Democratic party, so that the South doesn't become completely split, thus losing all political influence.
