# **New Policy Helps** But Doesn't Cure

The Texas Commission on Higher Education adoptthe one recommended by a three-man sub-committee in September, but still is lacking in some respects as far as Tech is concerned.

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The policy recommended earlier would have frozen the Tech graduate program at its present status, but now the commission allegedly does not favor Texas A&M and the University of Texas (two schools which were given the green light on graduate work) any more than other state schools.

However, the Commission now retains the last word on any "indiscriminate expansion" by Tech and other state supported schools. It is logical to assume that they will also determine what is "indiscriminate expansion."

This is brought out by the fact that the commission

approved only one of five specific requests by Tech-the separation of chemisty and chemical engineering

the separation of chemisty and chemical engineering into two departments.

We will have to wait until Nov. 5-7 to find out what the Commission's action will be on the other proposals, which are the addition of masters degree programs in civil, mechanical and petroleum engineering; approval of Tech's bureau of business research; reinstatement of the doctor of philosophy program in geology, and the retention of masters programs in Home Economics.

It is our view that the latter four programs are needed at Tech, as was the one that was passed, and unless the Commission allows Tech to progress in these fields, it will be discriminating against one of

# **Bricker Foresees Lack of Fuel** As World Energy Needs Grow

DR. BRICKER voiced this opinion in his lecture on "The World's Energy Needs."

"As the world population rose, the energy demand naurally increased also," said Dr. Bricker, "And in the last century, which saw the Industrial Revolution begin, we used more energy than in the preceding eighten and one half centuries combined. The world is demanding three per cent

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more energy each year. Also, the potential development of the under-privileged countries of the world may increase the demand for more energy.

USING THE past records as a method of estimating the increased future demands for energy, Dr. Bricker pointed out that if depletion of capital reserves continues at the present rate, the United States will have used up almost all of its reserves of fossif fuels by the year 2000.
