In the words of Tech president, Dr. E. N. Jones, "Dr. Giesecke's relations with the faculty and friends of Texas Tech have been friendly and constructive, and as we console ourselves in the loss of his services, we congratulate him on the recognition of his worth shown by the new appointment.

During Giesecke's five years here, many great things have happened to Tech. Enrollment has jumped over 9,000 , and a record number of Tech departments have received accreditation. One of the greatest things to happen to Tech during this period was gaining entrance in the Southwest Conference
