7,902 Total Tops Previous '58 Mark

Registration smashed all spring records with a total 7,902 enrolled as the halls cleared yesterday. This final figure is only two over the estimate Floyd D. Boze, registrar, made last month.

In the last high for the spring semester, 7,737 students, was set last year. The registration tally is a 875 decrease from the fall semester total of 8.787 enrolled.

Tech Is Faced With Problem

WHERE DOES one draw the dividing line, or is there a dividing line to be drawn on growing at an ever-rapid pace, yet keeping the educational standards high enough to challenge and educate the brighter students.

Tech is a college open to all high school graduates since there is no entrance examination required. The great influx of students who vary greatly in capabilities and background are the major cause of this diffi-

ties and background are the major cause of this difficulty.

The majority of taxpayers in Texas feel that if they help pay for a college, their son or daughter ought to be able to attend. This is the main reason why there is no stiff entrance requirement.

On the other hand, many teachers and students feel that Tech is not high enough in academic stand-

It is obvious in several instances that some teachears are trying, single-handedly, to raise the standards by arbitrarily flunking students who do not reach the "extra" high standards they have set, not the general standard of the college. This is rather obvious when 21 out of 34 fail a course, or when in two sections of the same course there are no A's or B's, few C's and mostly D's and F's.

Still, others feel that for Tech to be a greater institution, it must grow larger in size to meet the demands, and so more and larger dormitories and classroom buildings are being built. In fact, it will take about three years to bring the men's dorms to full capacity.

Now, back to the question — where to draw the line? It can't be drawn to keep certain students out of Tech and the general standard of the college can't be boosted to a much greater extent overnight, so this means that the dividing line must be drawn within the internal structure of the college.

The most probable method of doing this is to extend our use of special classes, such as English 133-134, to all departments, and to have teachers of proven quality to do teach these courses. This would be a good step in making Tech better academically.





THE CONVOY, en route from Berlin to West Germany, was detained Monday afternoon within sight of the East-West border.

The Soviet army demanded an inspection of the cargoes. But Findley Burns Jr., political adviser to the U.S. Army mission in East Berlin who came here for the final, negotiations said the Soviets were not allowed to inspect the inside of the trucks.

THE UNITED States thus won a point in its efforts to prevent the Soviets from gradually clamping a stranglehold on the highway supply line to Berlin, isolated 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain.

Following three U.S. Army procests Tuesday in Berlin and Frankfurt, President Eisenhower announced to his news conference Wednesday that a vigorous demand was being made by the State Department for release of the convoy.

The State Department note released later said refusal to let the trucks through without inspection was a "clear violation" of American rights, under four-power agreements since 1945, to free access to Berlin.
