As for the bill, we will also disregard the fact that it violates the freedom of religion clause in the first amendment and would mix Church and State.

The bill hints that religious beliefs have a decided effect on how well an instructor can teach. Is it a fair assumption to say that a person who believes in a Supreme Being is more qualified to teach economics than an atheist?

It would seem that educational background, experience, former accomplishments and personality would be better qualifications than the fact that a person is willing to sign an oath that he believes in a Supreme Being.

The bill also points up another problem-how to define a "Supreme Being." Do the backers of the bill have in mind the God of Christians? Or could it be the "Supreme Being" that a Buddhist, Hindu or Moslem believes in?

Even a person who doesn't believe in a "Supernatural Being" can prove with amazing logic that he believes in a "Supreme Being" - in the form of a concept or ideal.

Finally, an oath of this sort probably wouldn't have anymore success in keeping atheists out of the teaching ranks than the anti-communist oath has in keeping communists out of the student ranks.

If an atheist is as low a character as the backers of this bill make him out to be, would he hesitate to of this bill make him out to be, would he hesitate to
sign an oath stating he believes in a Supreme Being? If a bill of this sort is passed, then Texas has taken a long step toward filling its colleges faculties with incompetents whose only qualification are that they are willing to sign an oath stating they believe in a Supreme Being. We are sure that our competent legislators won't pass such a bill.
