



It is time for the U.S. to start recruiting trained employees for overseas duty instead of vacation seekers. Most colleges, including Tech, offer very good subjects which could eventually lead to for-eign service.

TEXAS MAY SET a political "first" — that of mix-ing the church and the state. If HB 495, a bill cur-rently before the state legislature, is passed, Texas will become the first state to set religious qualifications for public jobs—and the state government will become the first American government to seriously abridge freedom of religion.

#### \* \* \* \*

This bill would require college instructors to take an annual oath that they believe in a Supreme Being. The four East Texas authors of the bill are also press-ing for a legislative investigation to determine if there is atheism in Texas' higher education system. Also tied in with the above charge is another one —that many of the atheists are communists. This ar-gument presents a falacy common to many weak ar-guments (a blue-word man is an atheit so all blue-

guments (a blue-eyed man is an atheist, so all blue-eyed men are atheists), so we won't discuss it further. \* \* \* \*

★ ★ ★ ★ As for the bill, we will also disregard the fact that it violates the freedom of religion clause in the first amendment and would mix Church and State. The bill hints that religious beliefs have a decided effect on how well an instructor can teach. Is it a fair assumption to say that a person who believes in a Supreme Being is more qualified to teach economics than an atheist? It would seem that educational background, ex-perience. former accomplishments and personality

perience, former accomplishments and personality would be better qualifications than the fact that a person is willing to sign an oath that he believes in a Supreme Being.

#### \* \* \* \*

The bill also points up another problem—how to define a "Supreme Being." Do the backers of the bill have in mind the God of Christians? Or could it be the "Supreme Being" that a Buddhist, Hindu or Moslem believes in?

Even a person who doesn't believe in a "Super-natural Being" can prove with amazing logic that he believes in a "Supreme Being" — in the form of a concept or ideal.

Finally, an oath of this sort probably wouldn't

Finally, an oath of this sort probably wouldn't have anymore success in keeping atheists out of the teaching ranks than the anti-communist oath has in keeping communists out of the student ranks. If an atheist is as low a character as the backers of this bill make him out to be, would he hesitate to sign an oath stating he believes in a Supreme Being? If a bill of this sort is passed, then Texas has tak-en a long step toward filling its colleges faculties with incompetents whose only qualification are that they are willing to sign an oath stating they believe in a Supreme Being. We are sure that our competent legis-lators won't pass such a bill.

But if he laughs silverly and calls you "Little minx!" put him to the next test. Find out whether he is kindly.


