

Raiders blast Hogs 73-59

Following the example of the man who spent money like there was no tomorrow, Tech's four graduating seniors played like there was no more home games as the Raiders dumped Arkansas 73-59 last night.

THE SENIORS composed of

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Trent Bonner, Dave Olsen, Billy Tapp and Jimmy Fullerton accounted for 43 points in a spirited game marred only by the number of cups thrown by "spirited" fans.

One junior, big Vernon Paul, stole the scoring show hitting 17 points and grabbing 14 rebounds in the first half. Paul later succumbed to the referee's whistle which blew on 51 occasions and was only able to hit one more bucket

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TOMMY ROLAND and Wally Freeman paced the Razorbacks with 17 points each. The win kept alive a "curse" on the Hogs who have never won a game in Municipal Coliseum.

At the beginning of the first half, it looked as though the Raiders were going to completely dominate the game as Paul and Olsen teamed up under the basket to put Tech out in front by as much as 19 points. Meanwhile the Hogs looked as though they were moving through a jar of cold molasses, scoring half of their 32 points from the free throw line and hitting only eight field goals.

THE OZARK cagers never found the mark from the court during the first five minutes of the half, but Freeman kept the Hogs' hopes alive pumping in 14 points for the period.

Twenty-two fouls were called during the first stanza; the most spectacular when Jerry Haggard hit Benton Cone's elbow with his head. The ref called the foul on Haggard as he was leaving for the dressing room to get four stitches over his eyebrow. The Razorbacks made five trips to the charity line and closed up the Raiders' lead 41-32 as the buzzer sounded.

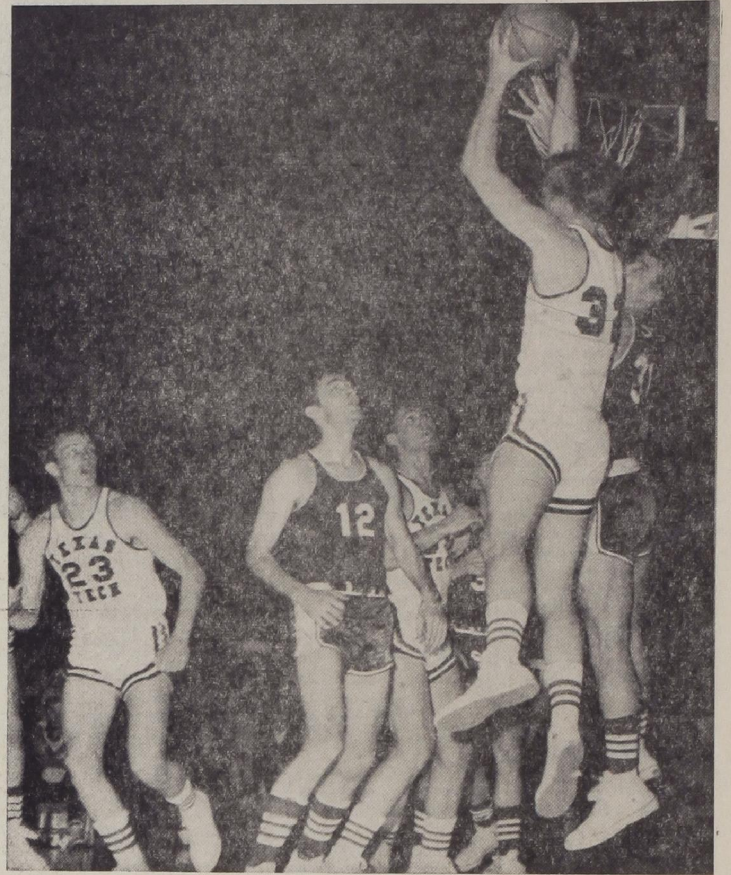
TECH BEGAN the second chapter much like the first with Tapp and Olsen pacing the Raiders. However, with 9:38 remaining, a jumper by Cone closed the gap to seven points and coach Gene Gibson

was forced to put in Paul with four personals hanging over his head.

The officials again started tooting the whistles and most points began coming via the free throw circle. Paul hit once from under the bucket to increase the Raider lead to 14, then was called for charging and had to leave the game.

FROM THERE the reserves took over and Jim Nelson along with Benny Wiggins added a few more points to the top-sided score. The hapless Hogs could only manage one field goal in the final 10 minutes, but gained eight points through free throws.

The win gave the Raiders a 6-7 SWC record with one game remaining; that being Rice in Houston tomorrow. Arkansas is now 4-9 in conference standings.

Tankers take top places

The Texas Tech swim team captured seven of a possible 11 first places as they downed Eastern New Mexico University 66-37 in a dual meet here Tuesday.

Robert Graham tied his sea-

son record in the 50-yard freestyle as he splashed the distance in 21.7, just .1 second off the Tech pool record of 21.6, which he set last year. His first 21.7 of the year came in a meet with New Mexico University before Christmas.

IN OTHER TECH wins Graham teamed with Alan Queen, Pete Velde, and Rob McCreary to win the 400 freestyle medley.

Tim O'Rourke captured the 200 backstroke and Velde the 200 individual medley. Bob Skinner won the 1,000 free-

style. In the 400 medley relay O'Rourke, McCreary, Dana Weaver and Danny Harman combined for the winning honors. Bill Jones took first in one-meter diving.

IN THIS meet we were testing our depth in the sprints," said Coach Jim McNally.

"We put Velde and McCreary in the 100 freestyle which Graham usually swims and they swam a pretty close race. They showed a lack of experience, but that was probably due to the fact that they weren't used to swimming that kind of race," McNally said.

"AS A TEAM we didn't swim as well as we did against Kansas this past Saturday. They have just been worn out from the trip," said McNally.

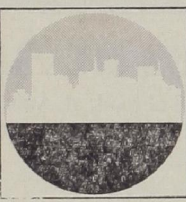
But some improvement was noted in the team.

The swimmers' next meet is with Texas A&M here next Tuesday.

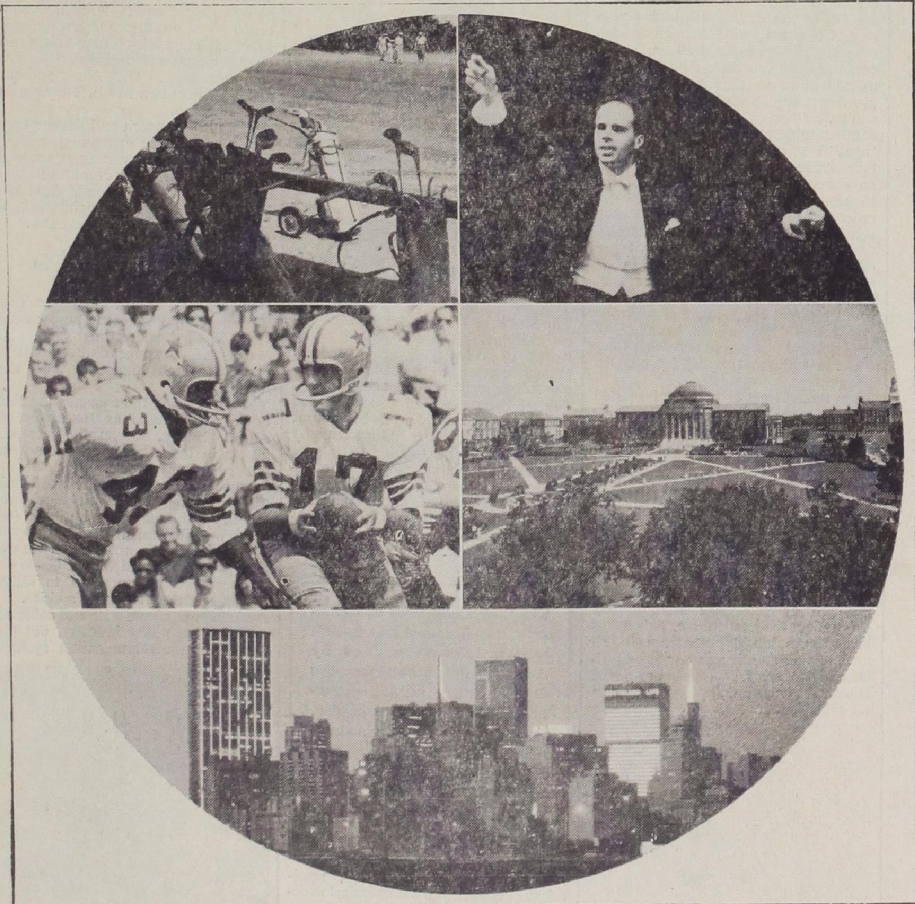
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
