# Panel says tighten II-S deferment

WASHINGTON (AP) - A citizens' panel recommended to the House Armed Services Committee this week tightening of draft deferments for students and more emphasis on induction of younger men in the 19-25-year age

The recommendation of the panel headed by retired Gen. Mark W. Clark, was made to the House Armed Services Committee early this week.

IT SUPPORTS THE GENERAL philosophy of the present Selective Service System. It rejects proposals for a national lottery system and a universal national service system that would equate nonmilitary service with military duty.

IF APPROVED BY CONGRESS, the recommendations would promote more uniformity in deferment procedures of local draft boards and re-duce the likelihood of youths being inducted into military service after their 21st birthday.

## Ed. TV bill introduced at Austin

Plans for creation of an education television network based at Texas Tech got under way Tuesday in Austin.

REP. R. G. Pendleton of Andrews introduced the bill which would establish a two-day, closed-circuit television network for 12 West Texas colleges.

It would be called the Western Information Network Association. The bill says it would be a "cooperative system for communication and information re-trieval and transfer between the institutions and private educational in-stitutions, industry and the public."

THE NETWORK WILL connect West Texas colleges and universities into a single teaching unit, permitting professors at one college to teach students at any or all of the participating schools.

No state funds will be appropriated for the two-way television hookup. Tot-al cost of developing the network runs into more than \$8 million with annual

ADVANTAGES OF THE program include smaller universities which can benefit from the professors of larger schools and from the use of informa-

The program is expected, if successful, to become the genesis of a statewide educational network.

In contrast to the Clark panel, the presidential group is reported planning to suggest that Johnson ask Congress to revolutionize the draft with a lottery system.

HOWEVER, THE presidential group is reported—as does the Clark commit-tee—favoring taking the younger men first. At present the draft begins with 26-year-olds and works down in the

Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, the national draft director, has favored keeping the draft system pretty much as it is and especially considers a lottery impractical. He has indicated he would not object to changing the age order.

THE NEW INDUCTION system proposed by the congressional panel would encourage local draft boards to meet monthly draft quotas by inducting 1A registrants in the 19-20 age group ahead of older registrants. Older registrants would continue to be eligible for induction until age 26 but at a considerably reduced priority.

The student deferment system would be revised to provide that all bona fide students of institutions of higher learning be granted deferment while remaining students in good standing and until they received their undergraduate degree or reach age 24. Deferred students then would revert to the 1A pool for induction on the same basis as nonstudents in the 19-20 age group. group.

STUDENTS ELECTING to claim a student deferment would waive any possible entitlement to a later deferment based on other than student status, except in extreme hardship cases.

The almost time-worn issue of dorm food was revived Tuesday night when approximately 486 residents of Clement and Hulen Halls boycotted the dorm cafeteria.

Sixteen residents of the two dorms ate supper in the cafeteria which usually serves 500 coeds from 5:15 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. each night

The food strike was the result of a mimeographed sheet distributed throughout the dorms and posted in the elevators Tuesday afternoon.

THE SHEETS READ: "If you think today's lunch was bad, just wait until you taste supper-breaded liver and deluxe cheese casserole, DON'T EAT TONIGHT!! One night should be enough to make them change the menu. United we stand divided we

Residents participating in the food strike lined the staircases and windows on both sides of the cafeteria watching the 16 diners.

DORM ENTRANCES WERE sometimes jammed with boycotting coeds carrying in food from local drive-in restaurants and grocery stores.

Comments from residents not eating in the cafeteria ranged from food "just not cooked adequately" to "plain lousy."

SEVERAL COEDS EATING in the dorm cafeteria said the food was bad but they couldn't afford to eat offcampus or did not have transportation to get off-campus,

Other coeds eating said they did not think the food was particularly bad considering the large quantity of food prepared at one time.

ONE COED, EXPRESSING the sentiments of most non-boycotters, said dorm food is "very good considering we pay \$1 for each meal."

Stella Peeks, food service coordinator for the campus, and Lavern Mecham, dietician for Hulen and Clement Halls, said Tuesday's strike was the first they had heard of food complaints

MISS PEEK SAID the matter of unsatisfactory food had not come up be-fore the Food Services Advisory Committee this year.

Legislators in the two dorms gave varied comments on the issue. Some said the issue had been brought up in legislator's meetings and others said the food controversy had not been men-

THEORETICALLY, COMPLAINTS f residents about food are presented to legislators who in turn give the complaints to the dorm food represen-tative who takes the matter before the Food Services Advisory Committee.

Linda Holcomb, Ft. Worth senior and Hulen Hall food representative, said she has not complained to the committee because "it doesn't do any good."

## Time founder, Luce, is dead

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Henry C. Luce, co-founder of Time Inc., who brought to magazine publishing a brand of personal journalism that informed and amused, and sometimes irritated, died Tuesday at the age of 68.

Luce was editorial chairman of Time, Life, Fortune and Sports Illustrated. The magazines have a combined world-wide circulation of nearly 14 million.

He succumbed to a massive coronary attack at St. Joseph's Hospital, which he had entered Monday after complaining of not feeling well.

Right and brash, Time magazine was born 44 years ago this week of the inspiration and talents of two young newspaper reporters, Luce and Briton Haden, Haden died in 1929.


Luce never meant Time to be impartial, although he has said he sought to be fair. The prospectus issued to the people who invested \$86,000 with the two young reporters said: "Time gives both sides, but clearly indicates which side it believes to have the stronger position."

In April, 1964, Luce relinquished his title as editor in chief of Time Inc. and became editorial chairman, an ad-

Dr. Williams, who can be expected to know Texas higher education considerably better than most members of the state government and who was hired for that purpose, said Gov. 
### Looking inside the earth for metals

Modern mineral exploration must have "eyes" that see under the earth's surface. Gradually, the search is narrowed to smaller target areas through scientific application of geological, geophysical, geochemical techniques and other tools that are additional "eyes" for modern prospecting.

The three-dimensional geo-logical model shown below was pre-pared to help Anaconda geologists look under the earth's crust at a later stage in this process of evaluation. 




