

This maximum (two per cent of total receipts from sale of student activity tickets) will not encourage any person to run for a student body office for remuneration alone, but during the two years when the four council officers have not been paid, it has become apparent that they deserve something more than appreciation for time and labor expended. The proposed amendment will partly reward them.

While there is little doubt that the proposed amendment will receive the majority vote it needs for ratification, a large turnout at the polls by students today will not only show the council officers that students realize and appreciate their efforts, but also point out to college administrators and other observers that Techsans are interested in their student government.




