Tomorrow morning enthusiastic students begin building the huge pile of waste and debris that when touched off by that fatal match becomes the blaze that is this year's Homecoming bonfire. And while stacking apple boxes and banana crates on the large heap that will be Tech's sacrifice to the lovely goddess Athena, these students must remember that all is not fair, even when preparing for a gigantic pep rally.

The Student Council, under whose auspices the fire is being held, is responsible in every detail for its success or failure. However, this body cannot hold the rally without the cooperation of every student in school. Nothing must be placed on the bonfire except that trash which is donated by downtown and avenue merchants. Tech's student body is still on probation. If tomorrow night's rally isn't held in a very orderly way, then it may be discontinued for an indefinite period.

Those Islands Again

WITH THE slogan "Asia for the Asiatics" the Japanese are slowly but steadily consolidating the Far East into their economic, political and military orbit. China has already had much of its most valuable land amputated by Japanese surgeons who declare their intention to weld China and the rest of the Oriental peoples into a solid nation with Tokio at the apex.

This slogan, "Asia for the Asiatics," is a direct warning to the United States, England, Holland and France to get out or fight. But to America, only the Philippine Islands are at

stake.

The Philippines, after much agitation and rebellion, have at last got their independence or will get it in the near future. With this independence all of America's influence and protection will be withdrawn. The United States took the Philippines from Spain, a corrupt and degenerate government. They have given the Islanders a good system of roads and to the best of their ability have tried to educate them so that they will have an even chance in the complex system of modern economics and government. Now the Filipinos want their freedom. Probably they do not realize that they won't have it long when they get it, because the United States are yet regarded as an oppressor nation.

After the Japanese have taken over the Islands at some future date after some future "incident," the Filipinos will find out just how much they were oppressed under the "tyrannical" American regime.

The same situation faces the Sianese, the Sumatrans, the French-Iindo Chinese and other peoples. In many of these lands are to be found valuable minerals, mainly oil and coal. Britain, when she recovers from the present Chamberlain influence will probably fight before she lets everything go. France will follow Britain's lead and two of them may be able to halt Japanese aims. But at present the Nipponese seem to have won the first round.

An Ounce Of Prevention

WITH THE first appearance of snow and sleet on the campus Sunday afternoon, students' complaints as to the bad system of ventilation in many classrooms became more numerous that at any time during this semester.

Though it would be well if these complaints could be taken merely as the grumblings of habitual gripers, sadly enough, they mean quite a bit more than that. A large percentage of classrooms are poorly ventilated. In some instances it is the fault of the professor in charge of the class, but at other times it is the fault of the college.

When campus buildings were first constructed and the present heating system was installed, a thermostat was provided for each room. In this way the temperature was automatically kept at a comfortable degree. However, lack of sufficient classroom space has forced officials to divide many rooms in half, thus providing more places to meet, but at the same time limiting classes to smaller quarters. Now, the heating of some rooms in controlled by the degree of temperature in the room next door, because they have only one thermostat to share between them.

Obviously enough this system is most unsatisfactory. At no time is it probable that the need for an increase or decrease in temperature will be the same. If windows in the room lucky enough to contain the thermostat are open, steam heat will increase thereby making it unbearable for those next door. On the other hand if the windows of the room remain closed, the amount of steam will decrease, and the poor neighbor will feel to its inmates like the first cousin of an overgroown iceberg.

While it is perhaps true that the college would have to go to some expense to remedy the present existing conditions, officials must not forget the old saving about "an ounce of prevention, etc." A little money spent in the right way might save several students from serious illness this winter.

Naziland, Overrated

RECENT resignation of General Ludwig Beck,

RECENT resignation of General Ludwig Beck, chief of German army staff, may reveal to Hitler as well as the rest of the world that the military might of the Third Reich has been greatly overrated as were the Japanese before their invasion of China in '37.

Beck is obviously an efficient and trustworthy soldier, otherwise he would never have been given a chance to command the destines of the German army. Hence his opinion should count much in the military councils of Hitler's government. However, the practical general disagreed' with Der Fuehrer on the Sudeten question. He didn't believe Germany able to fight the combined power of France, England and Russia. This fact alone—that Beck did not want to shoulder the responsibility of a general war with the newly formed allies—should be sufficient reason to make Hitler and the other Munich collaborators stop and take notice.

Beck knew that his country was in no shape to stave off a combined Russo-Franco-British offensive. It would have meant war on all fronts with all the old enemies much stronger than they were in 1914. He had no desire to be the goat of a German defeat which was sure to come when the new allies began to march. Beck also knew that it was next to useless to count on the aid of either Italy or Japan. The far away Nipponese had their hands full in China and no country has ever been able to depend on the Italians. The general must have also realized that Germany's economic resources and food supplies would soon be exhausted if confronted by a blockade of John Bull's navy.

Yes, all these things, Beck knew. But Hitler, maybe because he was fooled by his own pipe dreams or by the impressive (on parade) Nazi army, did not. Whether Beck's resignation will serve to awaken him cannot be fortold, but Britian's Chamberlain and France's Deladier might well take note of how completely they were bluffed by a man who probably didn't even realize the weaknesses of his own nation.
