LSD linked to defects

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Tests show that LSD and two other newly popular hallucination-inducing drugs cause birth defects in animals, a medical researcher said Tuesday. One of these drugs—mescaline—bears a close chemical relationship to STP, the newest hippieland drug, reported Dr. William F. Geber Jr., associate professor of pharmacology at the Medical College of Georgia.

"The hippies claim they get the best results now with STP." Geber said.

"The hippies call the performance of LSD, Tep" Geber said laboratory experiments in which regnant hamsters were given injections of LSD, lescaline and BOL (brom-lysergic acid) resulted in etuses with malformations of the brain, spinal cord,

The drugs caused stillbirths, runting and other defects, he said in a paper prepared for "Science," the publication of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Tech only certifies to the draft boards whether or not he is full-time and lists the number of hours he is taking. CARDS COMPLETED in registration are to be supplemented by written referements. Request forms are available at draft boards or at the registrar's office, Watkins said.

Tech Board will review **Student Code**

The Tech Board of Directors will review the revised Code of Student Affairs

Saturday.

Dr. Keith Marmion, chairman of the Code Revision Committee said that the document has been reorganized and some detail changes have been made, but basically it is the same document as it was last spring.

This means that the Code will include the organization of an appelate system to hear disciplinary cases involving both individuals and organizations, a basic Bill of Rights for students, pro-cedural guarantees designed to protect students in disciplinary cases and reorganization of the Committee on Student Organizations.

Housing regulations were altered to require all full-time undergraduate stu-dents to live in campus dormitories. The main alterations had to do with

Poetry is not a meaning but an experience, and it must above all be read for fun, poet John Ciardi said here Tuesday night.

A good poet combines wisdom and wit, and balances them with seriousness and humor into a smooth flowing verse. The total morality for a poet is not to cheat, but to hold out for just the word you want, Ciardi said.

Ciardi, the first speaker in the 1967-68 University Speaker Series, appeared in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

He told a large audience that poetry does not go logically, but psychologically.

cally.
"It is hard to say what poetry is or isn't because it is what it means to the person who wrote it," he said. The content of the poem is the pleasure of form. Too many people miss this by paraphrasing the author's words without looking at form or rhyme.

CIARDI SAID many poets write just for the pleasure of hearing smooth-flowing words, and pick up subjects and occasions to suit their words. He gave an example of Keats in "Eve of

Ciardi referred to his own youth when he enjoyed English and his guar-dians tried to make him learn some-thing "sensible." To him poetry was sensible and he was doing what he wanted, which in Ciardi's view is the only way to read poetry.

MRS. McGLAUN said the student must complete requirements for his degree within the normal and specified time, as outlined by his college.

The general guideline used, she said, is completion of 25 per cent of the degree plan per calendar year. However, this guideline may vary among draft boards.

Mrs. McGlaun emphasized the need

Mrs. McGlaun emphasized the need for students to keep in touch with their draft boards to be sure of their status. Persons who are 24, but are full-time, satisfactory undergraduate students, will qualify for class I-S(c) for an academic year if they are drafted. Graduate students doing satisfactory work in medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, osteopathy, and optometry receive mandatory deferments. Graduate students in other fields may receive deferments, depending upon the

receive deferments, depending upon the decisions of their local boards.

UNDER THE NEW law student de-ferments are granted for the 12-month calendar year, and new requests for deferment need not be made by students until next fall. Watkins said the only circumstances under which Tech will inform local boards of unsatisfactory progress by any student will be with-drawal or suspension for disci-plinary reasons.

However, it is every selective service registrant's obligation under law to keep his local draft board informed of his location and status, Mrs. McClaun said.
