Students Vote "Yes"

FIRST returns from the poll being held during registration concerning voluntary blood tests to determine victims of syphilis is grat-ifying if for no other reason than it makes us realize the increasing number of Tech stu-dents who are fast becoming conscious of the dangers and inevitable results of the devasting disease

dangers and inevitable results of the devasting disease. In answering in the affirmative the ques-tion of whether he would be willing to pay \$1 to have a Wassermann and Kahn test, the Tech-ster is following the lead of thousands of other college men and women who in recent years have nodded their approval of the tests and in doing so have shown their desire to stamp out syphilis. Already 32 colleges and univer-sities in this country have made the tests com-pulsory along with the regular medical exam-ination.

pulsory along with the regular medical examination. If they fully realized the danger of veneral diseases to the youth of this nation, we believe even more Tech students would vote to pay for the tests. Every year two out of every ener the students would vote to pay for the tests. Every pay two out of every energing college freshmen are victims. This number steadily increases until veneral disease in some form strikes one of every ten. And approximately 80 per cent of the victims of syphilis are stricken before they each the age of 30. This number steadily increases until veneral disease in some form strikes one of divery ten. And approximately 80 per cent of the victims of syphilis; another 25,000 are born to die or live handicapped because of congential syphilis; another 25,000 are born dead. One million potential mothers in the United States have or have had the disease. Full 95 per cent of all bindness can be traced to the ravages of syphilis, and over 10 Over 100,000 deaths annually are direct results of syphilis, over twice the amount caused in this country by traffic accidents. Also each year one million years of life expectancy are low. In relation to other common diseases the set of the set

year one minion years of the expectancy are lost. In relation to other common diseases the tol taken by syphilis is equally astounding. It strikes one and one-half times more than di-berculosis, 13 times more than diphtheriz, 28 times more than typhoid and 50 time, more than infantile paralysis. It is also p leading cause of diseases of the heart and bood vessels. This is syphilis—a curse to 3d mankind, but to youth in particular. In Araking his ballot "yes" the Tech student is doing much more than merely protecting himself against a malie-nant monster. He is also doing his share in aiding medical science to protect humanity against one of the worst diseases ever known.

TROUBLE again was in evidence along the **T**ROUBLE again was in evidence along the labor front last week when the United Au-tomobile Workers' Homer Martin opened a le-gal attack against CIO Chairman John L, Lewis in an attempt to retain his post as UAW prexy. Martin, who was recently impeached by board members, resigned his position on the CIO's executive board and termed Lewis a "dictator-ial betrayer of labor," a phrase that seems to be a favorite with labor leaders when labeling their opposition.

Such things only serve to make us doubt more than ever that the men who are today heading the labor groups in this country are sincerely working for the benefit of labor it-self. The words of Lincoln that "a house divid-ed against itself cannot stand," can as well be applied in this case as any other. Surely such men as Lewis and Martin can see that as long as they continue to quarrel among themselves, the cause of labor is at a standstill, if not lost altogether.

altogether. But their wrangling continues, and Martin lately has accused his former mentor of betray-ing the principles and policies of a democratic labor movement by trying to become its per-sonal dictator, which charges, though they may be true, are probably inspired by Martin's own icalousy.

As long as such men remain in their present positions as the guiding heads of labor organi-zations, those groups can hope to accomplish very little. For labor can hold its own only by presenting a united front.




