The council, in a special meeting called by President James Huffman for the sole purpose of considering the appeal of those backing the show for immediate financial aid, discussed the matter for some time, but decided it would be unwise to furnish the requested amount of money for what many of the student repre-sentatives considered an unstable and risky proposition. Thus, the need for bonding of local officers of the law is more than obvious. Mr. Laney's lawyer has drawn up the following article in direct line with this opinion, so we are running it word for word. As to our minds it is a gem, any attempt to improve upon its literary excellence would only detract from its effect. "On some men the bestowal of a star, club and revolver will have a not unusual reaction. A sort of metamorphosis takes place, with debusines of grandeu.
