Dr. Clifford B. Jones

Jones Is College President With Practical Expeirience

A college president who is not a college man, except by reason of years of service to one institution, Texas Tech, as a member of the board of directors; a president who succeeded first in the business and civic world before he entered the business of running an institution for the purpose of teaching others to make a success—that is Clifford B. Jones, president of Texas Tech who was awarded an honorary doctor's degree at the June 3 graduation exercises for his work with this school.

Jones, born April 9, 1885 in Rico, Colo., entered business in 1904 as purchasing agent for the Kansas City Bag Manufacturing company after graduation from Central high school of that city. In 1907 he became vice-president and treasurer of the Jaques Steel company which he held until 1910 when he came to Texas as assistant manager of the allied Swenson interests, a ranching concern of New York, and in 1913 Jones was made resident manager of the headquarters in Spur.

Besides successfully managing the ranching business and owning a ranch himself, Jones has been president of the Spur

Security Bank, president and director of the Spur and West Texas Chambers of Commerce, president of the Spur Cattle Loan company, director of three railroad companies and the Stamford & Northeastern Townsite company and city commissioner and mayor of Spur.

President Jones was made a member of the board of directors of Tech when the school was created in 1925 and served as president of the board for several years until his election to the presidency in 1939—a choice which caused a wave of dissension among the board members and called forth an opinion by the attorney-general of Texas. He is a member of the Students' Memorial Loan Fund corporation of Tech and of the West Texas Museum association.

As a booster for good highways, Jones has served as vice-president of the Texas Highway association, and past president of the Ft. Worth-Roswell Highway and Texas Transcontinental Trail. He is a life member of the U. S. Good Roads association. He also is past president of the Northwest Texas Fair association.

Jones has served on numerous state and national boards, including the position of regional advisor of the PWA for Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana and a member of the original board of 100 for the promotion of the Texas Centennial. He was recently made a member of the government's defense committee.

Aside from business and civic connections, Jones is an Episcopalian, Democrat, Rotarian, Son of the American Revolution, 32nd degree Mason, Shriner and Knight Templar. He is a member of the Fort Worth club, Espuela Golf club, Philosophical Society of Texas and National Council of the National Economic League. He is a former member of the National Association to Reduce Public Expenditures.

wrote in *Mein Kampf* (pp. 315-16):

"The ideas of pacifism and humanity may be quite good after the supreme race has conquered and subdued the world (that means U.S.A., too) in such a measure as makes him its exclusive master. Therefore, first fight, and then, perhaps—pacifism." Also:

"If the German people had possessed that safe herd instinct based on blood . . . the German Reich would probably today be mistress of the globe." (pp. 437-8).

3. Spread Nazi totalitarianism doctrine and German Kultur around the globe.

4. Destroy all democracies, which are Hitler's greatest object of hate and detestation.
