

More Bulletin Boards

ONE OF THE most urgent of the lesser needs on the campus is that of bullet in boards for the exclusive use of students, where they might found, and any other items that Techsans wish to place before the student body. It is true that all buildings contain official

bulletin boards, but most of these are constantly over crowded. Only one or two have places for the posting of student notices only. Thus, when a class president wishes to call his group together, he must place his notice on a board where it is surrounded with placards advertising various summer school trips, offi-cial notices and reports issued by different pro-fessors. In such surroundings it has little chance of being seen. For students become to used to seeing the aforementioned signs that they often tail to glance at any of them. The situation could be remedied if boards were erected where they could know only time-ly and important messages would be placed. Both professors and students would benefit a great deal if a small amount of time and money were to be spent in building such boards.

Farmer Needs Chance

THROUGHOUT the past THE TOREADOR has strongly advocated more interest in minor sports at Tech, working on the assumption that these activities attract as much attention to the college as does football. Once more the time has come when the col-lege has a chance to gain national recognition through one of its athletes—a participant in a minor sport, Marsh Farmer. His expenses should be paid by the Athletic council, the best that can be gi-ven him should be his. This is not too much to ask for one with such possibilities. Each year Wayne and Blaine Rideout bear the colors of NTSTC to every corner of the na-tion, and as a result the whole country has heard of the Denton college. Had that school depended on football it never would have re-ceived recognition outside their own confer-ence.

But it is time we stop concentrating on football. If you will remember, one of the reasons given for keeping Tech out of the Southwestern circuit was that we did not sufficiently emphasize minor sports. Here is our chance to correct that defect in our sports setup. Farmer has earned his spurs, has proved his worth beyond a shadow of doubt. THE TOREADOR requests that he be given the reward he deserves, a chance to run against bigtime competition at the National AAU meet.

Parade Of Opinion Associated Collegiate Press

Firm in their demands for world peace, but divided in their views as to how the U.S. should work for it, an estimated 100,000 students held peace rallies on many college and university cam-puses last week. Abandoning the "strike" idea of former years, the meetings this year were quiet and nild. The split in views came over the question of neutrality versus collective security. No figures are available to tell which opinion drew the largest number of ad-herents. Despite the many editor-ials in the college press urging students to face the facts of the present international situation, the demonstrations this year drew the smallest crowds in years.

However, in a majority were the comments in favor of the President's appeal. The Kollins Colege Sandspur summarized the position of the supporters of the President in this fashion: "Roose-velt has taken a momentous step in attempting to force the hands of the dictators. Although it may fail, such an attempt is better than for the most powerful nation of futility toward a world war. Every protest against domination by force will swell the tide of control opinion for peace." 
